**SPENCER TRACY IN POWERFUL SUSPENSE DRAMA AT CAPITOL SUMMERSIDE**

Every now and then a motion picture comes along so permeated with suspense and emotional impact as to make the spectator sit tense in his seat from opening scene to final fadeout. Such a picture is M-G-M's "Bad Day at Black Rock," filmed in CinemaScope and color, with Spencer Tracy and Robert Ryan at the head of a distinguished cast co-starring Anne Francis, Dean Jagger, Walter Brennan, John Ericson, Ernest Borgnine, Lee Marvin and Russel Collins.

"Bad Day at Black Rock" tells the story of the suspicion, contempt and hatred facing a single man by an entire town, of the attempt of its hoodlum leaders to first frighten him off from his mission, then to liquidate him.

The man is John J. Macready, who has come to the isolated Western town of Black Rock to deliver a medal to Joe Komako, whose son had saved Macready's life during the war. His quest for the Japanese farmer meets with evasions and lies from the townspeople, all of whom are in deadly fear of a man named Hans Smith. When Smith tells Macready that Komako had been shipped to a relocation centre, the former is unimpressed. And it does not take him long to discover that the Japanese farmer had been made the victim of a hill murder.

Members of the Provincial Executive and officers of the local Associations met with Dr. L. DeWolfe for a buffet supper at the Highfield Tourist Court.

**DR. DEWOLFE'S ADDRESS** Judge J. S. ResRoches introduced Dr. DeWolfe last night by saying that Dr. DeWolfe before the age of 12 earned his education working in a blacksmith shop, in the tanneries and the mines. "He is of the old school," he said, and not of this generation where things are made as easy as possible.

Dr. DeWolfe began by saying that the school must come to the people rather than waiting for the people to come to the school. The most important part of education begins before the school years, and parents are the first teachers as well as the first examples of children. It is here that the early training is important, for "it is easier to build boys than mend men."

The school should only do what can't be done by home and community. We learn by imitation, by seeing and hearing and by doing as well as by reading. The people who first influence us, the magazines, films and radio, we see and hear and the activities we enjoy doing are important along with the books we read. Because so much of learning comes by experience, instruction should follow and not precede it.

The aim is to help people be "publicly useful and privately happy." With people as with trees, decay sets in when growth ends; education must help growth after school as well as before. The school is rich, said Dr. DeWolfe, who "has plenty to do when he has nothing to do."

It was also suggested that there should be three main associations between parents and teachers in Charlottetown. The first would be for ages 1-6, before the school years; the second for ages 6-12, and the third including high school and graduates who would be encouraged to take part in proceedings. That way there would be more and smaller groups, and on the whole a larger attendance.

Other points mentioned were: the handling of teen-agers who have left school and do nothing but "hang around"; the teaching of useful hobbies to both adults and children; the encouragement of people to work on the farms by publicizing the joys of farm work; and encouraging people to teach each other.

"You can't kick and pull at the same time," said Dr. DeWolfe, "so when you stop kicking you can start pulling — and vice versa." He warned the committee not to be discouraged if no notice is taken of their work, but to remain optimistic.

He was adequately thanked by Mr. K. A. Parker, and the audience separated for discussion groups. This was followed by the installation ceremony for new executives.

The house was filled with smoke following the blast, but fortunately no fire was started.

# Que. Man New President Of Fox Breeders Ass'n

—Alan M. Hooker of Ormstown, Que., was elected president of the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders Association at the 35th annual meeting which concluded at Summerside yesterday.

Directors meeting on Monday afternoon preceded the annual general meeting which began yesterday morning and continued throughout the afternoon.

These meetings were presided over by the retiring president, Ernest T. Mill, of Kensington, who was presented with a wrist watch in appreciation of his service to the Association.

Interesting discussions were held on the marketing of fox pelts, and ideas to promote the use of Canadian fox furs in the fashion industry.

The meeting voted \$25,000 for advertising, in addition to the money remaining from an advertising budget which was approved two years ago.

The greater portion of the advertising allotment will be used in the advertising of fox furs in Canada and in Europe.

The Association will also be exhibiting pelts and fur garments at fashion shows during the year.

At the present time there are more than 60 registered fox breeders in Canada, and these fox ranchers raise about 6,000 foxes per year.

Dr. C. K. Gunn, superintendent of the Dominion Government Experimental Fur Farm at Summerside, was present at the afternoon meeting and gave a talk on fox and mink ranching, the value of selective breeding, vitamin feeding, and proper care.

In addition to the directors from the province there were two visitors at the meeting who are associated with the fur industry. They were Mario Coniglio, representative of the Canadian Fur Trade Review from Montreal; and Paul Reinhardt, secretary treasurer of the American Fox Breeders Association.

# Fisheries Act Case Heard

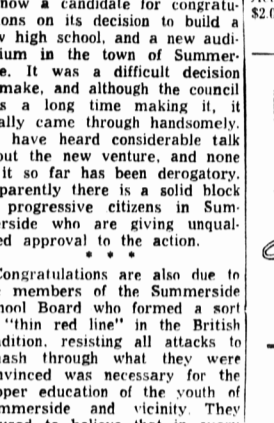
