

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

DUBLIN, Oct. 13.

At a meeting of the Land League, Dillon, Sexton and Sullivan strongly protested against the pastoral letter of Archbishop McCabe, of Dublin, in which he deplored the silence of the Irish leaders regarding threats of violence against the landlords uttered at public meetings. The speakers characterized the letter as ignoring the sufferings of the people, and declared it untrue that the speakers had not protested against the threats of violence alluded to.

LONDON, Oct. 13.

The pastoral letter of Archbishop McCabe of Dublin, denouncing Land League in a long and solemn address is felt to be a serious blow to present violent programme of the League. Another hitch has occurred in progress of the agitation. Parnell did not attend any meetings on Sunday. Some believe he hesitates before adopting the violent programme of the Land League, which is now simply a horde of Fenians.

CASTEL NUOVO, Oct. 13.

It is reported that Riza Pasha, on receipt of an urgent order from Constantinople, sent a message to Cettinge that Dulcigno will be ceded any day after next Wednesday.

LONDON, Oct. 13.

A despatch from Vienna remarks that a question now arises as to the ability of the Porte to get the Albanians to submit to the cessation of Dulcigno.

BERLIN, Oct. 13.

A special messenger from the Sultan is now on his way here on a secret mission.

UNITED STATES.

BOSTON, Oct. 13.

The latest returns from Ohio indicate a Republican majority rising 20,000 with fifteen Republican Congressmen to five Democratic.

The Republican majority in Indiana is estimated at from 2,000 to 3,000. It is expected the Republicans have gained two Congressmen in Indiana.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 13.

Returns from 450 precincts show Democratic gains of 3,956; Republicans gain, 7,199; net Republican gain, 5,149. This result is on 37 per cent of the vote. The Republican majority on the State ticket will exceed 5,000.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 13.

Complete returns from Cuyahoga county give Charles Townsend for Secretary of State 4,051 majority; McIlvaine for Supreme Court Judge 5,937 majority, and Amos Townsend for Congress 5,239 majority.

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.

The water famine in Patterson, N. J., is assuming serious proportions. Some five thousand mill and factory operatives are out of employment, and half the city is suffering from drought, and to-morrow, it is expected the rest of the industries will be stopped, and the city will be totally without water. The only thing to prevent this is a good rain storm to-day.

NEWARK, N. J., Oct. 13.

The city election passed off quietly, resulting in an average Republican majority of about 2,500. The Republicans elect eleven Aldermen and the Democrats five. The Common Council stand eighteen Republicans and twelve Democrats.

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.

Tuesday was the second day of registration in Brooklyn, and the total number of voters registered was 48,041, making a total registration for the first two days of 91,710. The total registration for the first two days of 1879 was 62,029, and for the first two days of 1876, 71,546.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 13.

Fourteen wards in Indianapolis give the Republicans a majority of 800. Reports from the State come in slow. The Republicans are jubilant and claim Porter's majority will reach 5,000.

BOSTON, Oct. 13.

Indications are that the Republican majority in Indiana will be at least four thousand. Landers concedes Porter's election. The Legislature is probably Republican. In Ohio, the Republican majority will be about twenty thousand. Democrats concede a great defeat.
