China and Japan.—It is announced that the Manitoba creameries have begun shipping butter to China and Japan. Regular shipments packed in French tins will continue all through the fall and winter by each C. P. R. boat.

A Suit for Damages.—Dr. Beynon, who shot Mr. N. B. McKenzie Newcombe, has begun a civil suit for damages against Messrs. MacKenzie, McKane and Hall. He claims damages for the assault and for loss of time. The suit will probably be fought to a finish.

Sudden Death.—We regret to learn from the Premier that Mr. Frank Barry of Egmont Bay, died quite suddenly at his home last Wednesday morning. Mr. Barry was apparently in the best of health on the previous day. It is believed that the cause of the death was the effect of his sudden death.

The score card will include races for 2.20 and 2.40 trotters and paces, and a 3-minute class for trotters. A purse of \$100 will be hung up for each race. The races will be started at half past one.

A Bad Accident.—The New Glasgow Enterprise says: On Thursday evening Charlie Maynard, the nine year old son of Mr. R. Maynard, strayed into D. R. Munro's yard next door, where there was a young horse loose. The horse kicked the boy on the temple, breaking in the skull a piece 2 1/2 inches by 1 1/2 inches, and knocking the boy senseless. Surgeons were summoned, and they succeeded in the very delicate operation of cutting out the little braincase and raising the skull. The boy is bright and doing excellently.

Thursday's Storm.—The storm of thunder, lightning, rain and hail that passed over the eastern part of the Island on Thursday morning last will not soon be forgotten by those who witnessed it. At South Lake it was especially severe. A little after 5 o'clock hail or pieces of ice, some of them two inches in length, fell in large quantities, covering the ground to the depth of three or four inches in some places. There was a constant roar of thunder for an hour accompanied by vivid lightning. A large hail of fire came down out of two black clouds that came along blizzards fashion past Mr. A. Fraser's dwelling house, in front of John Jones McDonald's barn, which caught fire a few moments afterwards and soon burned to a cinder. The contents, which consisted of hay, harness, wagon, etc. Several old residents who saw the storm as it passed over that section of the country, say the like of it they never experienced, and do they wish to see it again. If a high wind had prevailed when the hail stones came, damage to houses and crops would have been, in all probability, very great.

OBITUARY.
