

New Hope Seen For Disarmament

TORONTO (CP)—The Cuban crisis has created new hope for general world disarmament, Lt.-Gen. E. L. M. Burns, Canada's Geneva disarmament negotiator, said here. Gen. Burns told a press conference only the CBC network can ensure national coverage. The BBG handed down its solution of the problem after the networks could not reach a voluntary agreement.

United States, Russian and British leaders had made this plan in statements following the U.S. moves to force the Russian missiles out of Cuba, he said. Gen. Burns said he expects disarmament talks to resume at Geneva within a week. "I feel that discussions in the United Nations have paved the way for at least an interim agreement (on a nuclear test ban) with the safeguards the West requires," he said. Gen. Burns warned the Cuban crisis was far from over, but said he saw no prospects of a third world war.

Validity Questioned Of Grey Cup Ruling

OTTAWA (CP)—The publicly-owned CBC has claimed that the Board of Broadcast Governors' controversial Grey Cup television regulation places commercials "in the same category of national importance as the program itself."
The CBC comment came in a statement which questioned the validity of the BBG regulation requiring the CBC TV network to carry the private CTV network's telecast of the Dec. 1 football game in Toronto—complete with CTV commercials.
The CBC said it will assess the situation "with respect to matters of principle and the public interest" and that its 11-member board of directors will meet here Nov. 15 to discuss the issue.
The BBG regulation was enacted Wednesday as the board Canadians in all parts of the country.
CTV holds the TV rights to the Grey Cup but the board

CALLED IT LOGICAL
Spencer Caldwell, president of CTV Television Network Limited, welcomed the board's move as the "only logical action."
The CBC did not declare whether its network will or will not carry the Grey Cup. The BBG stated Wednesday that it would regard non-compliance of the regulation as "a deliberate infringement of the law."
Maximum penalty for an infringement of the regulation under the Criminal Code is \$900 fine and six months imprisonment. The BBG could also suspend the license of a station or a group of stations.
The controversy arises out of the expressed wish of the BBG that the Grey Cup, as a matter of public interest, be seen by

Ecumenical Council Prepares For Liturgy Reform Debate

VATICAN CITY (Reuters)—The ecumenical council has advanced proposals to reform Roman Catholic liturgy and prepared to move on to a debate seen as crucial in steps toward understanding and unity among Christian churches.
The debate, next item on the agenda, will be on a draft decree on the sources of Christian revelation—the scriptures and tradition.
Observers from other Christian churches attending the Roman Catholic world assembly here, which began Oct. 11 and is expected to continue until at least next fall, told reporters they regard this issue as of maximum importance for prospects of promoting understanding and unity.
Announcement of the Christian revelation decree as the next agenda item was made as prelates were speeding conclusion of a debate on a draft decree on liturgy which began Oct. 22.
