Parkdale Royals' playing coach Angie Carroll is top scorer in the Island Senior Hockey League race with 9 goals and 10 assists. Angie's 19 points were amassed in games up to Friday December 4. Each player had 15 points. Arsenault scored 6 goals and set up 9 others and Burke made the red light glow on 8 occasions and drew 7 assists. Two members of Summerside's P.E.I. Aces had 13 and 12 points. Hard working Coke Grady had 6 goals and 7 assists and Benny Grady had a 7-5 mark. Merrill Pineau of the Perfection Penguins was one point back of Benny. Pineau sank 7 tallies and drew a total of 4 assists.

Wilt's Injury Not Serious

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Philadelphia Warriors were cheered Monday by a medical report that the towering, lath-like Wilt Chamberlain has neither fractures nor dislocated bones.

The seven-foot one basketball player suffered an injury to his left foot in a roughhouse game in St. Louis Saturday night. He said the foot had been stomped on several times, but did not feel enough discomfort to leave the game.

But the foot was badly swollen Sunday, obliging Chamberlain to miss Sunday night's game with Detroit Pistons, which the Warriors won 118-115.

After x-rays were taken Monday, Dr. Si Ball, team physician, said Chamberlain has severe contusions and bruises of the metatarsal bone. Diethermy and whirlpool treatment were prescribed.

It is doubtful whether Chamberlain will be able to play in Boston Wednesday.

Rangers Demote Earl Ingarfield

NEW YORK (CP)—New York Rangers Monday sent centre Earl Ingarfield to Springfield Indians, their American Hockey League farm club.

Ingarfield, 25-year-old native of Lethbridge, Alta., joined the Rangers midway through last season. Ranger officials said he was sent down to make room for Bob Kabe, called up recently from Vancouver of the Western Hockey League.

The National Hockey League club also said Ron Howell, star backfielder with Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Canadian Big Four Football League, will join the team today to work out.

Howell, a native of Hamilton, probably will go to Vancouver after about a week's practice, officials said. His brother Harry is a Ranger defenceman.

AL Fails To Reach Expansion Decision

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—The American League Monday failed to reach a definite decision on expansion, and invited the projected Continental League to continue its organizing activities to qualify for major league status.

A National League spokesman said there was no sentiment in that circuit for expansion. Both leagues are meeting here.

American League president Joe

Cronin said his league had discussed the possibility of expanding from eight to nine teams for 1961, but decided it would not be

feasible without similar action by the National League. "The only feasible way to expand at this time," Cronin said, "would be to possibly go to nine clubs. We received word that the National League was not interested in expansion. In order to go to nine teams, you have to have inter-league play and since that was impossible, we decided to postpone action."

Baseball commission Ford Frick had requested both leagues to take a definite stand on expansion at their current meetings, he said.

Frick said then he would have a statement to make following the majors' decision. He was not at once available for comment after Monday's actions by both leagues.

Cronin said "we cannot just take the position that we're never going to expand. We believe that expansion is inevitable and we're saying to the Continental League 'go ahead'."

Cronin said the report of the

American League's three-man fact-finding committee, appointed last October to study expansion, was considered in an executive session of the league. The committee reported that the problems involved were complicated and could not possibly be resolved at this time, Cronin said. "I want to make it clear that our action should not delay the Continental League from going forward with completion of its organization and making the necessary arrangements to fulfill requirements to qualify as a major league," Cronin added.

This was in accord with the National League's statement earlier reaffirming its resolution at a May meeting that the major leagues will favorably consider application for major league status by an acceptable group of eight clubs which meets specified major league standards.
