Local and Other Items

MONEY FOR MISSIONS.—The general board of the Methodist mission, during its three days session at Kingston, passed appropriations devoting \$89,000 for home missions and about 190,000 for Chinese, Japanese, Indian and French work.

FOR SYDNEY.—The scho Avon cleared from Stanley Bridge for Sydney yesterday. She had 1800 bushels oats, 600 bushels potatoes, 250 bushels turnips, 30 barrels apples and other freight. Wedlock Bros. were the shippers.

A SUCCESSFUL TEAM.—A Picton dispatch says: The test of the artesian wells which have been bored to supply the town with a system of water works, ended on Saturday, and has been very successful. Over 500,000 gallons have been obtained daily.

MISCOUCHE CONVENT.—A bazaar and social will be held in Miscouche Hall, on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, the 16th and 17th inst., in aid of the convent. There will be a basket social in connection with the bazaar. Revs. P. P. Arsenault and John A. Macdonald will give an account of their recent tour in Europe, illustrated by limelight views.

A CLEVER ISLANDER.—Speaking of an entertainment given in Sackville a few evenings ago the Post says: The reading by Miss Gertrude Davies, of Charlottetown, were well received, and her impersonations of Mr. Peggety and the various characters in her selections from David Copperfield were exceedingly clever as was also her selections from Josiah Allen's wife.

IMPROVEMENTS AT CHATHAM.—Freeman C. Coffin, civil and hydraulic engineer, of Boston, (well known in Charlottetown) is now employed on the working plans for the water and sewerage system of Chatham, N. B. The plans will include an electric plant for the street lighting, and the total cost of the work will probably be in the vicinity of \$130,000. The plans will be ready by December, and contracts for the whole work, in sections, will be let in January or February of next year.

POLICE COURT.—This morning a man named Joseph Adams, about 27 years of age, was sentenced to six months imprisonment with hard labor for vagrancy. Adams landed in Charlottetown from Nova Scotia the night before last, and has since been making himself obnoxious in liquor saloons and other places. This morning, when asked what he had to say for himself, Adams said he supposed he was a "bum". The magistrate agreed with Adams' estimate of himself, and sent him to jail for the term previously mentioned. An abusive language prosecution brought by Mrs. McNeill against Michael Weatherbie was continued until tomorrow for the production of material witness.
