Invite Eight Drama Groups To Dominion Finals

CALGARY, April 2—(CP)—A list of eight Canadian drama groups is invited to compete in the Dominion Drama Festival to be held today by the Western Canadian governors of the festival, to be held here May 8-13.

On the basis of recommendations by the adjudicator at regional festivals across the Dominion, Maxwell Wray of London, England, out of 15 submissions the eight chosen are as follows:

London Little Theatre; La Section Dramatique de Conventaire Nationale de Musique de Quebec; Everyman's Theatre of Vancouver; the Toronto Belmont Little Theatre; Calgary Workshop Fourteen; Brockville Theatre Guild; Le Cercle Moliere of St. Boniface, Man., and the Regina Canadian Legion Players.

The invitations were officially extended today to the eight groups by D. Park, James of Sarnia, Ont., chairman of the Dominion Drama Festival. The groups have until April 4 to accept the invitation and if any drop out of financial or other reasons, their places will be filled from the remaining seven who were recommended to the selection committee.

A tentative schedule was drawn up for the Dominion Festival as follows: May 8, "Thunder Rock" by the London Little Theatre; May 9, "Quand Le Chat Nest Pas La" by the Montreal group; May 10, matinee, "Noah" by the Vancouver Everyman's group; May 10, evening, "Awake and Sing" by the Toronto Belmont Little Theatre; May 11, "The Rivals" by Calgary's Workshop Fourteen; May 12, "Our Town" by the Brockville Theatre Guild; May 13, matinee, "L'Avanture" by the St. Boniface Players; May 13, evening, "Present Laughter" by the Regina Canadian Legion Players.

In submitting his recommendations Mr. Wray reported to the committee that "The best work I have seen here in Canada was at good as I have ever seen in Great Britain." He was impressed with the quality of the Canadian productions.

Mr. Wray, who had been heckled on two occasions for his adjudication at Montreal and Toronto—said his trip had been a "strenuous one, but I enjoyed it" and he said he was treated with great kindness from all sides.

This pinch now is severe enough so that many union workers are ready to defy both the Government and the leaders of the Trades Union Congress by pressing wage demands that have been pending quietly for months.

The Government still is repeating its demand that both wages and industrial dividends be kept at 1948 levels unless highly-improved efficiency allows them to grow without boosting high prices still higher.

Rebellion against this policy has been growing for more than a year. Two unions spearhead it.

One is the giant Confederation of Shipbuilding and Engineering Unions with about 2,750,000 members. The other is the National Union of Railwaymen with about 400,000 members.

expedite the standardization of military equipment.

The plan adopted was drafted earlier last week by the military committee, joining in one instrument a strategic program prepared by the five regional sectors of the alliance and assigning to each member the role it is to play in countering any aggression.

Without mentioning Soviet Russia by name, Defence Secretary Louis Johnson of the United States, who presided as chairman, laid down the three-fold objective of the 12 member countries in a speech.

"First we seek to deter aggression, second to defend ourselves, and finally to defeat the aggressor if he forces war upon us."

Deny Strachey Rumor

THE HAGUE, April 2—(CP)—A report that War Secretary John Strachey of Britain would be bypassed in a new system of exchanging Atlantic Pact top defence secrets was firmly denied today by the United States and British Defence Ministers.

Defence Secretary Louis Johnson of the United States said in an interview: "No such policy has been discussed by my Government and the question has never been raised here."

Britain's Defence Secretary, Emanuel Shinwell, termed the report "sheer nonsense."

In London, the report was denied on the authority of Prime Minister Attlee. Strachey was not immediately available in the British capital for comment.

Strachey was transferred from the Food Ministry to the War Office when Attlee revamped his cabinet after the Feb. 23 general election. At that time, Lord Beaverbrook's Evening Standard charged that Strachey had never disavowed a belief in Communism.

Strachey denied that he is or ever has been a Communist.

Report On Ice Patrol Yesterday

With a strong north wind the steamer track from the St. Lawrence River to the sea should be open in two days, reported Chief Officer Angus Brown last night following a survey of ice conditions for the Department of Transport.

Only 18 miles of the track remain to be open.

Chief Officer Brown made a shorter flight than usual yesterday covering 80 miles in his sweep.

He reported that the ice was pretty heavy off the East coast of Cape Breton and that Sydney Harbour was still closed.

All harbors along the Northumberland Strait are frozen solid but three or four holes near the block house in the Charlottetown Harbour indicate an early break-up.

The Strait west of Charlottetown is navigable and east of the City on the Island side the break up is beginning.
