Funded Debt and Treasury Maturities OTTAWA, May 1.—Funded debt and treasury bill maturities the Dominion government will be called upon to meet in 1936 amount to \$221,164,670 with annual interest charges totalling \$7,583,153, according to the budget review presented today by Finance Minister Dunning. The maturities, all payable in Canada, are: July 1, \$33,293,470 at five per cent; Sept. 15, \$45,000,000 at 1 1/2 per cent; Oct. 15, \$73,336,000 at two per cent; Nov. 15, \$79,535,200 at five per cent.

Specialties Gain On N. Y. Exchange (By Frank MacMillan Associated Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, May 1.—While recent stock market leaders lacked speed and consistency in today's session, specialties attracted buyers for gains of one to around four points. Weakness of American Telephone, which finished off 3 1-8 points at 18 7-8, helped to keep the general run of shares within bounds. On the other hand, a late demand for several agricultural and aircraft issues was a bolstering influence and enabled the Associated Press average of 60 stocks to close with a net gain of 1.1 of a point at 58.6. It was the slowest trading performance since March 31, last, transfers totalling only 1,158,300 shares against 2,328,670 in yesterday's upturn. The news was more optimistic than otherwise and first quarter earnings statements made fairly good reading. General Motors, the most active stock of the day, ended with an advance of 1 point at 62. J. I. Case jumped 4 5-8 points to 149 1-2, and International Harvester and Deere were up one each at 81 and 76 1-2 respectively. U. S. Steel and Bethlehem were backward, the former off 7-8 at 56 7-8 and the latter down 1-2 at 49 3-8. Curtiss-High "A" moved up 1 5-8 to 15 1-8. Dome Mines at 52 7-8 showed the most progress among the Canadian list, with a gain of 1 3-8 cent. The balance of the list showed fractional upturns.

Big Increase In Automobile Sales (C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, May 1.—An increase of more than 32 per cent in volume and almost 28 per cent in the amount of financing was shown in automobile sales in the three months ended March 31, compared with the corresponding period last year, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported yesterday. Motor vehicles financed totalled 16,768 at \$7,823,480 compared with 12,668 at \$6,129,094 in the first quarter of 1935. New vehicles financed numbered 6,091 at \$4,220,067 compared with 5,017 at \$3,544,442 and used vehicles totalled 12,675 at \$3,608,413 compared with 9,146 at \$2,584,652 last year.

Stresses Advantage of Loan Council (C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, May 1.—Optimistic regarding the influence which establishment of a loan council will exercise on the domestic economic situation was voiced today by Finance Minister Dunning in his budget speech. It should provide a method for reducing interest burdens in a way acceptable to creditors, he said. The minister believed the Council would provide a means whereby cooperating provinces might restore their credit and place themselves in a position gradually to obtain necessary funds for justifiable capital purposes. "It should make for an avoidance in future of the costly mistakes made by the Dominion and provincial governments alike in the past, the continuing burden of which has made it so difficult to assume the new burdens of the present prolonged depression," he said.

Anglican Endowment Funds Restored (C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, May 1.—All the funds originally lost in western Canada in 1933 had now been restored, according to a report of the restoration fund committee to the Anglican Synod of the Ottawa diocese. The meeting is under the presidency of Rev. J. C. Roper, Lord Archbishop of Ottawa and Metropolitan of Ontario. The original loss of endowment funds, on which depended much missionary work in western and northern dioceses, the pensions of aged clergymen, widows and orphans, and the work of St. John's College, Winnipeg, was approximately \$760,000. When the restoration fund campaign was launched, \$300,000 was added to the sum appended for, to augment the general Synod pension fund. A report to Synod stated that for the whole of Canada \$885,080 had been pledged of which \$754,665 was paid in cash.

Thinks Regimentation Will Spoil Quints (C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, May 1.—If the Dionne quintuplets turn out to be "attractive and likeable when they are 20 years old it will be a marvellous thing," in the opinion of Dr. Gary C. Myers, United States child psychologist, a visitor to Toronto. Head of the parent education department at the Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Dr. Myers thought the world's most famous babies would miss a great deal if they have to grow up "like hot house plants." "I wish the quintuplets would quit being specimens," he said. "It doesn't make any difference up to a year, but from now on they'll be conscious they're different. It's a pity the five little sisters are dressed alike, and that they aren't spanked. They're old enough to be taught the meaning of 'No'." All the same, Dr. Myers thought the quints had been the greatest object lesson in child care the
