

Diphtheria in Russia.

The diphtheria epidemic continues to rage throughout Russia; and at last accounts the Government has undertaken to help the poor people in their misery. The sum of \$300,000 has just been allotted to assist the hospitals which have been established by the local authorities in various districts of the Empire. The great trouble has been the neglect of the authorities to inaugurate and enforce sanitary regulations and the scarcity of physicians, growing out of the Government in discouraging the youth who would enter the medical profession, on account of its dread of the Liberal and Socialist tendencies which have manifested themselves so strongly among the medical students at the universities.

The Farm.

Judging from the active inquiry that is being made for Saed Wheat we may fairly conclude that our farmers will make the effort to produce a large increase over the yield of last year. This is a step in the right direction, and really necessary for the country's best interests. It is a good policy to labor to supply our real wants first, and if we can produce a surplus of farm produce we must exercise our judgment as to what will give the best paying results. It is not best to attempt to plough and cultivate the soil while it is wet and cold, as it is sure to become hard and cloddy when dry, comparatively worthless for the growth of vegetation, for the season at least; better to wait until the land becomes dry and warm, before working, when if it is in good heart, a reasonable fair yield can be counted on.—*Ex.*
