The Player: He lives clean and plays hard. He plays for the love of the game. He wins without boasting, he loses without excuses and he never quits. He respects officials and accepts their decisions without question. He never forgets that he represents his family, league, community and country.

The Coach: He inspires in his boys a love for the game and the desire to win. He teaches them that it is better to lose fairly than to win unfairly. He leads players and spectators to respect officials by setting them a good example. He is the type of man he wants his boys to be.

The Official: He knows the rules. He is fair and firm in all decisions. He calls them as he sees them. He treats players and coaches courteously and demands the same treatment for himself. He knows the game is for the boys and lets them have the spotlight.

The Spectator: He never boos a player or official. He appreciates a good play no matter who makes it. He knows that the team, league and community get the blame or the praise for his conduct. He recognizes the need for more sportsmen, and strives to set an example of fair play in every thought and action.

Annual Can. Professional Golfers Tournament Today

EDMONTON (CP)—Some \$3,000 in prizes will be on the line today when Dick Borthwick of Hamilton Ancaster leads 30 odd entrants off the tee to open the two-day annual Canadian Professional Golfers Association tournament over Edmonton's plush Mayfair course.

The country's big-name golfers got in their last practice licks Thursday.

In tune-up rounds so far over the par-70 course, three-time CPGA champion Stan Horne of Montreal Islesmere has hit 68. The 1953 Alberta open champion, Frank Willey of Edmonton, Riverside, and young Buddy Loftus of Calgary Regal, who won the provincial open a few years ago when only 19, both fired 69s. Defending CPGA title holder Henry Martell of Edmonton Highlands equalled par.

Stan Leonard of Vancouver, who lost to Martell by a single stroke at Quebec City last year, and 1952 CPGA champion Pat Fletcher of Saskatoon country club spent a lot of time on the putting green before shooting a practice round Thursday.

LAST MINUTE RUSH
Only 23 golfers were officially registered Wednesday but a rush of post entries came in before Thursday night's deadline.

The west has dominated the tournament for the last four years, Borthwick being the last eastern champion, in 1949. Until recent years, the east dominated.

The annual meeting of the CPGA in the morning precedes today's 1:30 p. m. MST tournament opening.

Fifth trio off the tee, and the group expected to attract the largest gallery, consists of Leonard, Martell and Jules Huot, three-time CPGA winner from Montreal Laval Sur Le Lac.

The second and third 18-hole rounds of medal play are scheduled for Saturday.

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McCluskey Gains Split Decision Over Gary Simon

Cobey McCluskey of Charlottetown, in one of the toughest fights of his career withstood a whirlwind finish by Gary Simon of New Glasgow to gain a split decision over the German born fighter in a bitter ten-round slugfest at the Forum last night.

McCluskey piled up points in the middle rounds to win the favor of the officials. He fought a good counter punching fight and scored repeatedly with lefts on the jaw and nose of his aggressive opponent.

The official verdict was received with mixed reactions from the crowd. Simon won the approval of the fight fans with his bulldog-like attack in the late rounds.

Referee George Stewart and Judge Earl Smith voted four rounds for McCluskey, three for Simon and three even. Judge Randy Edwards voted six rounds Simon, two McCluskey and two even. The Guardian score card read three rounds McCluskey, three rounds Simon and four even.

There were no knockdowns during the thrilling encounter. McCluskey weighed 154 pounds and Simon 154. By winning the fight McCluskey qualified to meet the winner of the Charlie Chase-Lou Lawrence fight for the Dominion middleweight championship.

McCluskey was at his best in the sixth and seventh rounds. He had a big sixth round when he had the German in trouble during the last minute but could not find the range for decisive blows.

Simon piled up his points during the eighth and tenth rounds. He forced McCluskey along the ropes during the eighth round and scored with both fists as both fighters stood toe to toe.

The ninth round was a repetition of the eighth with honors about even. Both fighters scored with solid punches.

The tenth was the best of the fight for Simon. He enjoyed a big edge as he put on a three minute attack that brought the crowd to their feet with his intensity. He scored often but could not get a clear shot for the knockout.

Simon kept on the offensive throughout the ten rounds. He showed a disregard for McCluskey's punches as he kept boring in on his Charlottetown opponent.

McCluskey started finding the range with lefts on Simon's jaw in the third round. The fourth round was a thrilling affair with Simon landing some telling body blows.

Simon connected with lefts and rights and landed the harder punches. McCluskey, the better boxer, scored more often but mostly with lefts. Both fighters were in superb condition.

Don "Duck" Trainor won an unanimous decision over Freddy Stewart of New Glasgow in the six round semi-final. Trainor, the aggressor most of the way, piled up points in every round except the first.

He started a flow of blood from Stewart's nose in the third and had Stewart bleeding again in the fourth. Stewart was content to fight a defensive battle throughout the first five rounds and landed few good blows on his adversary.

Trainor beat Stewart to the punch on most of the flurries and scored with several solid lefts and rights. There were no knockdowns.

Rugged Gaston Roy of Quebec City pounded Bob Ledley of Dartmouth for six rounds to win a unanimous decision over his Nova Scotia opponent.

The fight was a slugfest from start to finish. Roy was the aggressor most of the way but Ledley opened up in every round to slug it out with his younger foe.

Roy smashed Ledley through the ropes in the second round but in the early part of the third Ledley knocked Roy's mouthpiece flying with a solid smash on the jaw.

Roy put Ledley through the ropes for a three count in the fourth and had the Nova Scotian down as the bell rang to end the round. Roy had a good margin in the fifth and won the quieter sixth round.

"Bubbles" Quinn had too much power for game young Roy Diamond in the curtain raiser. Quinn won by a T.K.O. in the third round. He had Diamond down for eight counts in all three rounds. Diamond showed unusual gameness and courage and put up a good showing against his bigger opponent.

The preliminaries were refereed by Wilf McCluskey and the final by George Stewart.
