Anti-Polio Shots Given To 228 Adults Here Yesterday

Anti-polio shots were given to 228 employed adults yesterday at a clinic set up in the Department of Public Works drafting room located on the sixth floor of the Confederation Building. This was the largest number to receive initial inoculations of the Salk vaccine since the temporary clinics commenced operations in the city several days ago. The majority of those inoculated were members of the staffs of the several federal government departments which are housed in the new federal building. Others attending yesterday's clinic included employees of the Royal Bank of Canada, the provincial Motor Vehicle Branch, Moore and McLeod Ltd., and several persons who had been unable to attend the prior clinics held at S.A. MacDonald's, and R.T. Holman's. The inoculations were administered by Dr. J.L.F. Burge, assisted by Mrs. Margaret Turner, R.N. Mrs. (Dr.) J.E. Fleming, a member of local Foundation's Board of Directors, assisted Mrs. Rose Savage, executive secretary with the necessary documentation, with the necessary documentation. The next clinic in the current series will be held Wednesday morning in the premises of the New Way Furniture Co. This clinic is designed to reach all employed adults in the business area facing Kent St. from the corner of Prince to the corner of Queen, and that area of Great George St. lying between Fitzroy and Kent.

Bright Color Scheme Features Decorations At Tax Office

Extensive alterations which for the past weeks have been taking place at the City Tax office and in the City Clerk's office are now nearing completion. When completed the rooms will present a very attractive appearance. A feature of the alterations will be the lowering of the ceiling by 36 inches. The walls are finished with buff masonry in a realistic wood pattern. Above the masonry and about three feet from the ceiling will be a canary yellow wall board which blends harmoniously with the lower portion of the wall. The floor has been redone with foot square green and buff tiles. The ceiling will be finished in acoustic tile with concealed lighting. The radiators will be enclosed in attractive case enclosures and complete new counters and shelves will be supplied throughout. In connection with the renovation of the Tax Office, a new walk-in vault has been constructed for the storage of city records. The safe, constructed of steel and cement, is supported on steel piers and features a safety release catch on the inside of the door which prevents the possibility of a person being locked inside. The construction of the vault was carried out by County Construction. The woodwork is being done by Chandler Bros.

Rev. J. D. Nelson MacDonald Addresses Men Of Trinity

Speaking on the subject, "The basic needs of the World," Rev. J.D. Nelson MacDonald of Woodlawn United Church, Dartmouth, told the Men of Trinity last night that many of the institutions which the democratic world enjoy today are being gravely threatened. He said this threat was being created by a spiritual impotency which is prevalent throughout the Western Civilization at the present time. "We are indeed our brother's keeper," he said. Dr. MacDonald who for many years has been prominently associated with the Credit Union Movement and at present is vice-president of CUNA Mutual Insurance Society, said a credit union was actually Christianity in action. **THREAT TO FREEDOM** Speaking of the starving and illiterate millions throughout the world, he said these people were prone to follow any ideology which will give them a little more to eat or a better standard of living. "This is why Communism has made such inroads in some many of the nations of the world today and the credit union movement is doing its part in helping to stave off Communism. "These freedoms that we enjoy today...the freedom of speech, the freedom of organization and the freedom of religion did not come by chance they were dearly won but if we are to preserve them we must be willing to help our fellowmen," said Dr. MacDonald. "We cannot have one part of the world over stuffed while the rest of the world is half starved."

Speaks On "The Devil's Angels"

Last night at Central Christian Church a large audience was in attendance as evangelists E. B. Benoit and W.O. Weale brought gospel messages in word and music. Mr. Weale, who for the eighth time in recent years has led the singing at Central Christian's evangelistic services sang a beautiful hymn entitled "I'm Not Dreaming". The subject of Mr. Benoit's sermon "The Devil's Angels," was described by him as a message of warning to be heeded by the people of God. Properly translated, he said, an angel is a messenger. He strongly urged his hearers to search the scriptures, as did the noble Christians of Berea, to see for themselves whether or not the things which were preached unto them were in agreement with the word of God as revealed in the Holy Scriptures. The choir was under the direction of Mrs. Allison MacRae. Mr. M.D. Dunbar conducted the service and extended a welcome to those present.
