



**FOUR NURSING SISTERS**

The fourth member of the family of Mr. and Mrs. D.H. Gallant of Miscouche entered the nursing profession this month. Irma (left) and Mary Elaine (right) are student nurses at the Charlottetown Hospital School of Nursing. June (centre) is a staff nurse in the surgical division of the hospital and Mona (insert above) is an industrial nurse in Labrador with the Drake Merritt Construction Company. Generally speaking requirements for admission to an approved school of nursing in the Province may be divided into educational and age brackets. Applicants must have junior matriculation for registration in the Association of Nurses. However, as some universities admit conditionally candidates with one failure, approved Nursing Schools here do likewise. Applicants from other provinces will have to have matriculation standards as required where they write matriculation examinations. The preferred minimum age is 18 years but an applicant is accepted at seventeen years on condition that her parents sign a statement indicating that she cannot be registered as a nurse until she is twenty-one, and must do nursing under supervision during the period that she is a graduate nurse and is underage for registration. While there is no maximum age limit, the director of the school will use her own judgment. The same applies in the case of married applicants.

**4 In Lake Are Saved**

Front page headlines in a Toronto newspaper read as follows: 4 in lake saved, boat sinks mile off Long Branch, two swim mile to the shore, pals rescued. The article continues: Two men swam a mile to safety through 60-degree water and another two were rescued by harbor police after their outboard-powered boat sank off Long Branch today. Dave McLean, 25, of 17th st., and Warrior Fisher, 23, of George st. who swam ashore, were taken to Long Branch police station and then to hospital with shock. Jack Burke, 26, of New Toronto was picked up by lifesavers as he swam towards shore and John Bilokie, 25, of New Toronto, owner of the boat, was rescued as he still clung to the sides of the submerged craft. Spectators watched from the shore as the boat sank and the occupants were thrown, screaming, into the water. Fog at first handicapped the rescue boats as they sought the sinking craft. Police and life-saving stations were swamped with dozens of calls as crowds hurried to the waterfront between 25th and 27th sts. The rescued men were all able to swim, police said. The half-submerged boat was towed to the Humber life-saving station. Dave McLean is a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. D.L. MacKinnon 232 Richmond Street.

**Diefenbaker To Accompany Queen In U. S.**

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker will be in attendance on the Queen during most of the Washington engagements of her forthcoming Canada-United States visit, his office said Wednesday. Buckingham Palace announced in London that Mr. Diefenbaker and Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd of the United Kingdom will accompany the Queen during her state visit to the United States next month. Mr. Diefenbaker's office said that the Canadian prime minister will not be present at the Oct. 16 ceremonies in Jamestown, Va., commemorating the 35th anniversary of the first British settlers' landing in what now is the United States. The Queen goes directly to Jamestown from Ottawa, where she opens Parliament Thanksgiving Day, Oct. 14. Mr. Diefenbaker will be at the airport in Washington Oct. 17, when the Queen arrives, and will be in attendance as senior minister throughout that day and part of the next, returning then to Ottawa.
