FUNERAL AT GLEN WILLIAM. The funeral of the late Mrs. Allan MacDonald, who passed away at her home in Glen William, November 10th, was held yesterday afternoon with a short service at the home at 1.30 thence to the Caledonia Presbyterian Church for service at 2.30. Service was conducted by Rev. E. S. Hales, assisted by Rev. Wallace MacPherson, Murray Harbour and Rev. A. C. Fraser, Valleyfield. Mr. Hales, used for his text Matt. 5. A duet "Lights of Home" was very beautifully rendered by Mrs. William Bruce and Miss Margaret Cameron. Pall bearers were: John K. MacDonald, Gordon MacDonald, John Bruce, Colin McInnis, Lester McInnis and Angus Matheson. Interment took place in the church cemetery.

Montague Town Council Meeting

The final outstanding debentures of \$1300 on the Montague Main Street concrete pavement construction in 1931 will be cleared off the book this week, it was decided at the Town Council meeting last night. This includes one debenture of \$1,000 and another of \$500. The original town debt for pavement was approximately \$8,000, one-quarter of the total cost of the pavement.

Other matters considered at the meeting, presided over by Mayor B. H. Yeo, were routine. Present were Councillors Reynolds, McGowan Jamieson and Nicholson. The clerk informed the council that approximately 60 per cent of the taxes had been collected, and that at present finances stood at \$5,756.83.

Reports from committees were received which showed that affairs were well in hand. A motion was passed that all transient contractors who had been employed in the town, and who had not paid their license fee, should be contacted for payment. Several other matters were discussed before the meeting adjourned.

Sunday School Convention At Lower Montague

Mr. Whitney Dalrymple, B. A., acting general secretary of the Maritime Religious Education Council, Saint John, was the leader of the district Sunday school convention held in the United Church, Lower Montague, yesterday afternoon and evening.

The afternoon session opened with a worship period led by Rev. J. M. Fraser of Trinity United Church, Montague, who chose for the Scripture lesson the 6th chapter of Isaiah, the theme of his address being "reverence." The hymn "I Am Thine, O Lord" and "Oh Master, Let Me Walk With Thee" were sung. Mrs. J. M. Fraser was the organist.

Mr. William MacLeod of Valleyfield, district president, welcomed the new members and introduced Mr. Dalrymple, who gave an outline of the work being done. "Teaching Of The Bible" is the theme of the convention this year, which coincides with the fact that this is the 500th anniversary of the first printing of the Bible which was in 1482 in Germany. On September 30th last, a standard revised version of the bible, in modern language was released.

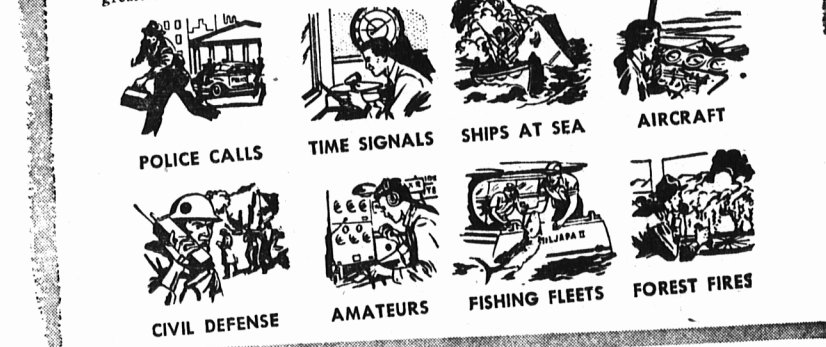
