Stanley Notes.

The Patriot, we are glad to notice, informs us of the safe arrival of the celebrated Dr. M. K. y at San Francisco.

The Division of Sons of Temperance in this place had their organ stolen feloniously, taken and carried away on the 29th of last September. They obtained a search warrant and found the stool at New London Point. The evidence taken showed the thief had gone away to the States. Recently a letter came from the "stool kliept" saying, "I took the stool, but it was the organ I wanted. I lent them \$10 and they would not pay me, so I was bound to have something." Loading a Gun on a Modern Ship of War.

(From Harper's Young People.)

When we are ready to load a modern gun, the second gun captain turns a little crank on top of the breech, which revolves the breech plug, thereby unfastening it. He then takes hold of a handle and pulls, and the breech of the gun opens on a hinge like a door. The sponge is run in from the breech, and plenty of water is thrown in, thus quickly and thoroughly cleansing the chamber of the gun. Two men come up with the shell in a pair of tongs like an iron's. They insert the nose of the shell in the gun, and another man steps up with a rammer and pushes it in. Two more men come up with the powder charge, and it is pushed into the chamber in the same way. The man at the breech plug chases it, turns the crank and it is locked. The gun captain opens a little flap in the gunlock, which is in the centre of the breech, and inserts a primer. He cocks the lock, which works with a spring, and steps back with the quick spring. The second captain sets the breech sight to the proper range. On top of the sight is a little sliding leaf which can be set so as to allow for the speed at which the ship is passing the object to be fired at. Now the trainers take their places, one on each side of the carriage, at the training cranks, by means of which the breech of the gun is raised or lowered. The gun captain steps back, and, glancing over the sights, directs the trainers to move the breech right or left, as he desires, and the elevators to raise or lower. The instant that the sights are on the object, he fires. No one needs to move away from the gun, and it can be fired even while the training and elevating gear is in motion. The moment the gun is discharged, the order is given to sponge, and the operations above described are repeated.

Deserted Towns in Kansas.

(Boston Globe.)

It is not pleasant for Massachusetts people to realize that there are many deserted farms within her borders. But at any rate she is much more comfortable than Kansas, in which the Bay State has never known, we think, a deserted town, while the State of Kansas numbers no less than twenty boroughs, quite forsaken by human kind.

These abandoned towns appear to be all built places. One of them, which retains the name of Saratoga, possesses a thirty-thousand-dollar opera house, a large brick hotel, a twenty-thousand-dollar school-house and a number of fine business houses. Yet, says a correspondent, there is nobody even to claim a place to sleep.

Nor is this the only town where money has been lavished to establish a monument of human folly. South Hutchinson is named by this correspondent as a city with buildings that cost more than \$300,000, yet without man, woman or child to walk its silent streets.

The craze for town site and bond "booms" is of course responsible for this anomalous condition of affairs. When every cross-roads village aspired to be a metropolis, it is not strange that fate was sometimes very cruel to local ambitions.

News Notes.

It seems by recent correspondence from Constantinople that the hopes entertained immediately after the accession of Abbas to the throne of Egypt that the Sultan, who had given his cordial assent to the accession by Abbas of his father's power and dignities, had come to the conclusion that it was needless to re-open the question of evacuation, is likely to be disappointed. The representatives at his capital of the powers hostile to the British occupation, by constantly harassing His Majesty with questions as to the date of the evacuation have apparently unsettled his resolution and given him the impression that he must, out of self-respect, espouse their side of the controversy. This is considered unfortunate especially as the Sultan's advisers must be aware that any thought of the departure of the British troops at the present juncture is simply out of the question, and the wisest policy for the Sultan is to be patient and trust in England's integrity.

After spending over \$4,000,000 for the promotion of immigration, the Argentine Government has to acknowledge that a movement which began so hopefully is ending in disappointment. First, dissatisfaction arose among the European settlers, then the influx began to fall off, and, finally, last year showed a very perceptible decline. Instead of a continuance of immigration, recent returns show a loss of 28,000 persons by emigration in a single year. This is undoubtedly discouraging and shows that either the country is not suited for Europeans or that there is some thing wrong in the administration.
