

Local and Other Items.

The overflow of the river in Upper Albania has inundated large tracts of country in that region.

The Scott Act does not appear to be well received in Ontario. At Welland, on the 10th inst., it was defeated by over eight hundred of a majority.

Two drunks, one case of assault, and a number of prosecutions for non-payment of the dog tax, composed the docket at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon.

S. S. "PRINCESS OF WALES" carried goods from Summerside to Point DuChene to the value of \$1,811.00, on Thursday, the 3rd inst; 4th, \$900.00; 5th, \$1,434.00. "St. Lawrence" on the 7th, \$1,240.00; 8th, \$2,099.00; 9th, \$1,369.00.

The New York Commercial's Washington special says 100 witnesses have been summoned for Guiteau's trial on Monday, half for the Government and the remainder for Guiteau. The trial will probably last four to six weeks. Scoville says Guiteau is in excellent spirits and is confident he will be acquitted.

Y. M. C. A.—A very good meeting was held last evening in the Ladies Parlor—the attendance so large that the room was uncomfortably crowded. The meeting to-night will be held in the Hall up-stairs. All are invited. Topic:—"Pride a Hindrance to Blessing"—2 Kings, 5:9-14.

DR. CARVER, at Hendon, Eng., on the 10th inst., on a wager, killed 83 out of 100 pigeons. The challenge was that he would not kill 70 out of 100, and the stakes were £100. On this part of match, 70 birds having been killed, £50 a side were betted on each additional bird up to 80. Carver killed these without a miss.

The Caledonians will hold their annual dinner at the Rankin House on the evening of St. Andrew's Day—the 30th Nov. inst. Mr. Davies is, we learn, getting up the dinner in his best style. "The great chieftain of the puddin' race," immortalized by Burns, will be among the dishes served up on the occasion. Those who wish to spend a pleasant evening and see Scotsmen at home, should not fail to be present.

The pastor of one of the largest Methodist congregations in New Brunswick, has greatly offended his people by, it is said, championing the Rev. Dr. H. W. Thomas, late of the Centenary M. E. Church, Chicago, who was recently convicted of heresy and suspended from the functions of his office. It is not unlikely that the N. B. and P. E. I. Conference will be called upon to adjudicate in the matter at its next annual meeting.—St. John Sun.

We learn with pleasure, that the staff of the Charlottetown Post Office has been enlarged by the appointment of Mr. J. C. McMahon. Mr. McMahon was, as a compositor, in the employ of THE EXAMINER, for some years. He was a steady, capable and obliging printer; and we have no doubt that he will bring to his new duties the same characteristics.

Dogs.—From the tone of the debate regarding a dog By-law, at the City Council meeting last evening, one would be led to believe that a heavy tax placed upon dogs would abate the nuisance complained of by farmers living near the city. If a dog is inclined to kill sheep, the tax imposed would not prevent him doing so. The muzzle or the dog are the only remedies, and we would advise our City Fathers to compel owners of dogs to pay a heavy tax and also muzzle the dangerous canines.

THE Patriot, as we anticipated, tries to be witty over our remark that when last heard from Sir Charles Tupper was in British Columbia discharging the duties of his high office on the shores of the Pacific Ocean. The remark was not, of course, as every reader of THE EXAMINER knows, intended to be accepted as literally true. We all know that Sir Charles has travelled about a great deal, and performed a large amount of public business since he was in British Columbia; yet it seems only the other day that Sir Charles was there.

BRITISH COLUMBIA (parts of it at least) does not appear to possess such a mild climate as many suppose. From a letter just received by Mr. Theo. L. Chappelle from his brother, dated "Nicola Valley, B. C., Oct. 21st," we glean the following:

"Go off to-morrow morning on what may be a 500 mile round. Have had the thermometer down to 13 deg. below freezing. Winter has come earlier than usual. It may be mild however. . . . If you just step in for a minute where I am I will show you the skins of nine kites, and the carcass of an eagle seven feet across the wings."

THE market to-day was small. Sales brisk as follows: Beef (small) per lb. 5 to 12 cents; do, (quarter) 4 to 8 cents; Mutton per lb 4 to 8 cents; Lamb per lb 4 to 8 cents; Veal per lb 3 to 7 cents; Ducks each, 20 to 23 cents; Fowls each 15 to 20 cents; Chickens per pair 30 to 50 cents; Butter (fresh) 20 to 22 cents; do (tub) 18 to 20 cents; Eggs 22 to 24 cents; Hay per cwt 35 to 50 cents; Potatoes per bush 40 to 45 cents; Flour per cwt \$3.25 to \$3.50; Oatmeal per cwt \$3.25 to \$3.50; Out per bush, 36 to 40 cents; Geese each, 40 to 60 cents; Sheepskins, 70 to 85 cents; Pork per carcass, 7 to 8 cents; do, small 8 to 11 cents; Turkeys each 60 to \$1 cents; Turnips, 18 to 19 cents per bushel.

THE Temperance meeting last night was one of much interest. The different speakers handled the question of total abstinence and prohibition with much ability, and enjoined upon temperance men unity of action in the enforcement of existing laws. "Go Ahead" was well sang by one of the members, and as an encore "Put your Shoulder to the Wheel" was given. A Dialogue in three parts, "The Rejected Drinker" was well received. "Hold the Fort" and other pieces were sang by the audience during the meeting. We hope the Sons of Temperance may be induced to continue those meetings once a month during the winter.

A LARGE seizure of sheep was made at Vancouver, B. C., on Monday, by Custom House officer Stephens. The sheep were about 600 in number, and were being shipped by their owner from New Brunswick to the States over the European and North American railway. The seizure was made on a claim of undervaluation. It is said at St. John that the owner is an Ontario man, who purchased them in Prince Edward Island, and shipped them through St. John on Saturday. The amount at which they were entered at the Custom House is stated to have been \$1 60 each. Had they been entered as \$2 each they would no doubt have gone all right. Bargain dealers have been complaining about provincial shippers entering their stock under value.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

DENVER, Col., Nov. 13.

Two passenger coaches on the Colorado Central Railway were blown down an embankment by a severe wind storm, yesterday, and demolished. Thirteen passengers were injured, none seriously.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 13.

A five story business block, occupied by several firms, was burned to-day. Loss, \$36,000.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.

Lewis Morris & Co., importers of drugs, have failed. Liabilities, \$110,000. The firm is one of the oldest in the trade.

EAST SAGINAW, Mich., Nov. 13.

Ten boilers in the lumber and salt manufactory of Hamilton, McClure & Co., exploded, killing four firemen and damaging property valued at \$25,000. Low water was the cause.

STREATOR, Penn., Nov. 13.

The bed of Prairie Creek broke through into one of the soft coal mines of the Chicago, Wilmington & Vermilion Coal Company, on Friday. The loss is estimated at \$100,000.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.

Guiteau's trial will begin to-morrow.

BOSTON, Nov. 13.

Schooner "Amos Walker," Bland, of Friendship, Me., and brig "Jeremiah," Capt. Blanchard, of Searport, Me., both coal laden, collided near Minot's Light, in this harbor, on Saturday evening, and both sank. Four of the crew were thought to be drowned, but were subsequently picked up. Others took to the boats and reached this port to-night. The cause of the collision is not definitely known, as the captains' stories differ.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13.

A number of whalers arrived from the Arctic to-day but bring no later news.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.

Schr. "Luella A. Snow," arrived from St. Marie, reports: Barque "Island Bell" arrived at St. Marie Oct. 26th from Port Au Prince. When the captain came ashore he was arrested for putting a man in irons at Port au Prince. He was denied a trial and received no satisfaction. The British Consul was insulted whilst doing his duty in the matter by the authorities. He wrote to the British Minister of Port au Prince and received an answer that proper steps for redress would be taken.

Disturbances have occurred in Vidiqueria. During the progress of the municipal elections the police thwarted an attempt to murder the mayor. Forty arrests were made. A secret depot of arms and ammunition has been discovered.

IRELAND.

DUBLIN, Nov. 13.

The Land Commission set last night until midnight. The number of applications before it now has reached fully 45,000.

An armed band dragged a farmer named Gavin from his bed in Castle Island, County Kerry, and questioned him. Gavin acknowledged having paid rent, whereupon he was fired at five times and severely wounded.

A party of 20 attacked the house of a man named Curtin, at Mount Mary, near Killavallen. They beat Curtin to swear to stop proceedings against a tenant under notice.

EUROPEAN.

PARIS, Nov. 13.

The Journal de Paris states that Defreyne, Ferry and Leon Say will not join the new Cabinet.

A duel, which took place between Paul de Cassegnac and M. Adrien Montebello, lasted twenty-five minutes. M. Montebello was wounded in the right arm.

No progress made in the formation of the new ministry.

ROME, Nov. 13.

By an explosion of gas in the sulphur mine at Gessoburgo, near Cantanissetta, forty persons were killed and forty-one injured.

ADEN, Nov. 12.

The captain and thirty-eight passengers and crew of the Dutch steamer Konigder Nederland, foundered in the Indian Ocean, have landed here. The search for the remainder continues.

BERLIN, Nov. 13.

It is now decided that the Emperor will open the Reichstag in person.
