PRIVATE EXCURSION.—There was a very enjoyable private excursion on board the Jacques Cartier last evening. There was a large number of invited guests (17 sent, and all had a good time. The promoters are to be congratulated.

THE MARKETS.—There was a fairly large attendance at the market to-day, and business was brisk. New potatoes brought from 80 cents to \$1, and new hay from 25 to 35 cents. Oats sold at from 27 to 28 cents, and black currants changed ownership at from 9 to 10 cents per quart.

TEA AT BLOOMFIELD.—There will be a grand Tea Party at Bloomfield on the 15th of August. Besides the customary amusements, a great attraction will be the Cruciform Church of St. Anthony's. This Church is divided in different kinds of handicrafts. Further particulars later.

MANITOBA CROP PROSPECTS.—The last weekly crop report issued by the Northern Pacific officials is of a similar tone to those of the past few weeks. The crops are setting in nicely in most places. In some districts a little damage is done by rust. Threshing will begin towards the end of August or early in September. The yield will run about ten and twenty per cent. less than last year.

THE NEW ST. PAUL'S.—The consecration of the new St. Paul's church will take place to-morrow morning at 11 o'clock. The service will be presided by the Bishop of Nova Scotia. Immediately after the service the congregation will withdraw to the schoolroom where lunch will be served and the people addressed by the Bishop and others. In the evening at 7:30 there will be a confirmation service.

THE BOAT RACE.—The boat race yesterday was concluded shortly before five o'clock in the afternoon. The Pathfinder, owned by James Taylor of St. Peter's Island, took first money, and the Moschier, owned by Mr. Daniel Taylor of the same place, second money. Mr. Van Kirk's boat captured third money. There was not much difference between the boats. The other boats also made a good race.

THE IRISH CONVENTION.—A meeting of representative Irishmen was held in Halifax on Sunday afternoon, to consider the question of sending delegates to the Irish Federation convention at Dublin on September 1st. The object of the convention was endorsed, and Michael Dwyer, J. J. O'Brien, Colonel McShane, P. O'Malley, T. E. Kenny, M. E. Keefe, Rev. Drs. Murray and Foley, Senator Power and Dr. Farrell were appointed delegates. Archbishop O'Brien stated that the scheme for holding this convention, the object of which is to attempt to reconcile the various factions in the Irish party and promote the cause of home rule, originated with the Archbishop of Toronto.

GREAT HISTORICAL GATHERING Will be the Irish National Convention at Dublin in September

LONDON, July 25.—The Irish National Convention, which opens in Dublin on Sept. 1, is shaping toward becoming a great historical gathering. Throughout Ireland and in the populous centres of England and Scotland the nationalist societies are appointing delegates and discussing the probable platform of the convention with the keenest enthusiasm. Advisors from South Africa and Australia are like those from the United States and Canada. From every quarter of the globe where a nucleus of Irishmen can be found suitors to form an association, delegates are coming. The convention will not only represent the mass of the Irish race, but will also have, besides the representative power of numbers, a working leverage of money toward the organization of the great united party. That the convention will hold existing schisms and regenerate home rule enthusiasm, Mr. Healy and his followers will be present at the convention as friends to its aims. Outside the English press no one yet credits Mr. Redmond and his section with any desire or design to thwart this great national movement.

SHOOTING AFRAY.—The Summerside correspondent of the Guardian says: Yesterday evening about 7:30 o'clock by a shooting affray which occurred near the Market House. It appears that a man named John McLean, of Lot 12, recently returned from Boston, meeting William McLellan, of this town, asked him to direct him to some residence of which he was in search, upon which McLellan struck him in the face. McLean drew a revolver and fired, presumably to frighten him, the ball striking the ground near McLellan, who was then standing some ten feet distant. Policeman Peters, who had arrived in time to see the whole affair, arrested both and lodged them in jail. They will come up for trial to-day.

SUPREME COURT.

July 27, 1896. Smith vs. Stearns.—This is a case stated on an appeal from the decision of a judge of the County Court of King's County. The question for the decision of the court is whether in order to issue a writ of habeas corpus it is necessary to allege in the affidavit that the debtor's parting with the property has been for the purpose of evading payments of debts, and also whether an assignment in trust for the benefit of creditors is such a parting with or assigning property as to render the debtor liable to arrest under the County Court Acts. THE CANADIAN TEAM GETS SECOND PLACE IN MCKINNON CUP MATCH.—The Smith Match.

LONDON, July 25.—At the annual meeting of the National Rifle Association at Bisley, Surrey, the Queen's West-midland regiment, was St. George's van to-day, with a total score of 198. The scores of the members of the Canadian rifle team for this prize were as follows: Huggins 104, won a National Rifle Association badge and £10, Ross 89, Weller 94, Neill 95, Mugo 63. The four last won small money prizes. In the shooting for the McKinnon cup, for the international teams of ten men each, rapid volleys, at 300 yards range, the Irish team won with a score of 40. The Canadian team was second, scoring 34; England third, with 21 points. Second place was given to the Canadians because of the greater number of hits by their team. This team consisted of Hayhurst, Harp, Lieut. Mitchell, Sergt. Mitchell, Munroe, Armstrong, Weller, Ross, King and Huggins. At the Alexandra contest, Armstrong, Lieut. Mitchell, King, Rannion, Campbell, Harp and Hayhurst won small money prizes. In the Martini-Henri Association cup match, Campbell of the Canadian team won a first prize. The first corporation of London prizes have been won by Oge, of the Canadian team, with a score of 312 points. In the final stage shooting for the Queen's prize, the following scores at Bisley were made by Canadians: Munroe, 30; Hayhurst, 38; Sergt. Mitchell, 24; At 900 yards: Hayhurst, 31; Sergt. Mitchell, 32; Munroe, 29. Lieut. Thompson, of the Queen's Regiment, Eimburg, won the Queen's prize, with a total of 273. In the shooting at Bisley for the Queen's prize, the Canadian marksmen attracted considerable attention. Hayhurst won £15, Munroe, £5, and Mitchell £25. The following scores of the Canadian marksmen decided the winner of the Smith cup: Queen's cup, Martin, St. Georges

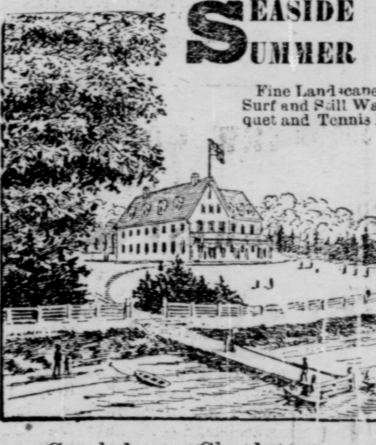
