CHARLOTTETOWN PRICES.

Slight Advance in Some Lines of Produce.
There has been very little shipping to date, consequently the demand for produce is not very great.
Oats—The buyers are offering from 27 to 29c for oats. There are few moving. At Montague and Summerside 28c is the price offered.
Potatoes—The market is dull at 16 to 18c. The American market does not show any demand as yet and very little can therefore be shipped to that quarter until later on.
Eggs—The market is steady. The prevailing price is 13c. The supply is liberal for the time of the year, and the demand is good. Most of the shipments made are for the English market.
Cheese—The buyers are offering 11 1/2 to 11 3/4; but sales are slow as salesmen are looking for a higher figure. The cheese board meets this forenoon.
Live hogs—There are not many live hogs coming in. At the pork factory \$4.25 is paid for hogs weighing 200 pounds, and for hogs ranging in weight from 175 to 200 pounds \$4 is offered.

CHEESE AND BUTTER

What is Paid for These Products in Montreal.
The Montreal cheese market, according to the Gazette, continues heavy in tone. There was, however, little doing on spot on Monday aside from the dealings at the wharf. Altogether about 4,000 boxes of cheese were disposed of, and prices varied from 11 3/8 to 11 1/2, which is a decline of 1/8 on last week's level. Western cheese were nominal between traders at 11 1/2 to 11 7/8, and eastern makes, 11 1/4 to 11 1/2. The cable was 56c for colored and 54c 61 for white cheese.
The strong tone in butter continues, but trading was rather quiet. Finest creamery ranged on Monday from 24c to 24 1/2c, with seconds 22 1/2c to 23c. Western dairy is scarce and firm at 17 1/2 to 18c. Jobbing parcels call for an advance of 1/8 on these figures.

PORK AND PORK PRODUCTS

Prices in Montreal, Chicago and Liverpool
According to the Gazette of Monday there was no change to note in the Montreal provision market, the tone being fairly steady. Trade is of a jobbing character, and the demand is chiefly for small lots. The Gazette quotes: Canadian short cut mess pork, \$16; short cut back, \$15.50; selected heavy short cut boneless mess, \$16 50; and heavy long cut mess, \$15.00 per barrel; pure Canadian lard, in pails, 7c to 7 1/2c per lb; and compound refined at 5 1/2c to 5 3/4c per lb. Hams, 12c to 13 1/2c, and bacon, 11 1/2c to 12 1/2c per lb.
The same paper reports that at the Grand Trunk-tock yards at Point St. Charles, the receipts of hogs were fair, of which the demand was good from packers and a fairly active trade was done at steady prices, sales being made at 4 1/2c for straight lots weighed off cars and 4 1/4 for selected.
Cash quotations on provisions closed at Chicago: Pork \$7.70 to \$8.25; lard, \$5.40 to \$5.55, short ribs, sides, \$5 to \$5.35; dry salted shoulders, 6c to 6 1/2c; short clear sides, \$5.50 to \$5.55.
The Liverpool provision market is reported strong. Pork advanced 1s 3/4; prime western lard 3d, and bacon 6d. Prime western pork, 25s 3/4; prime western lard, 28s 9d; American refined lard, 30s 3d; long cut light bacon, 35s; long cut heavy, 34s; short cut heavy, 33s; Australian tallow, 26s; American, good to fine, 26s.

A Toronto despatch of Wednesday says: Forty-two loads were brought in yesterday, including 628 hogs, 604 sheep and lambs. Milch cows, choice, per head, \$35 to \$45; milch cows, common, per head, \$25 to \$30; export cattle, choice, per cwt, \$4.90 to \$5.10; export cattle, light, per cwt, \$4.25 to \$4.65; butchers' cattle, choice per cwt, \$4 to \$4.25; butchers' cattle, medium, per cwt, \$3.50 to \$3.75; butchers' cattle, common, per cwt, \$2.65 to \$3; bulls, heavy, per cwt., \$1 to \$1.25; bulls, light, per cwt, \$3.25 to \$3.50; stockers, per cwt, \$3 to \$3.50; feeders, per cwt, \$3.75 to \$4; export sheep, per cwt, \$3.25 to \$3.50; butchers' sheep, each; \$2.50 to \$3.25; lambs, per cwt, \$3.75 to \$4; lambs, each, \$2.50 to \$3.50, bucks, per cwt, \$2.50 to \$2.75; calves, per head, \$4 to \$8; hogs, sangers, \$4.63; lights and fats, 4 1/2. STAKED ALIVE.
