Service Stations, Store Closing Problems Discussed

A special meeting of the Montague Town Council was held last night in the council room to meet two delegations from the gasoline vendors and merchants of the town of Montague. His Worship, Mayor B. H. Yeo, presided.

The gasoline vendors presented their case, stating that it had been the custom for the service stations and garages to close on Wednesday afternoons, Sundays, and holidays with the exception of one station which remained open to service the travelling public. This agreement had been drawn up by the operators on question, and a schedule had also been drawn up so as to rotate the stations which would remain open. This year, however, some difficulty has presented itself in that full cooperation from all the operators has not been forthcoming.

The operators therefore felt that some by-law might be passed by the Town Council prohibiting one or more stations remaining open continuously, so that the operators would then be forced to observe the schedule drawn up. It was pointed out that such an arrangement would be to the advantage of the operators who would thereby be able to have some free time off on these days, and still remain assured that there would be one station which would be looking after the travelling public.

The delegation presented the following resolution: "That gasoline service stations and garages with one exception be closed Sundays, Wednesday afternoons, and holidays during the summer season commencing June 1st to Dec. 1st, one station being open on a rotation basis, each station taking its turn, a schedule to be drawn up by garage and service station operators and presented to council for approval."

The matter was discussed at some length by the operators and the members of the council, and it was expected that the council would meet at a later date to take the matter under further consideration.

The merchants delegation informed the council that it also was preparing a similar resolution respecting the closing of stores on Sundays, Wednesday afternoons, and holidays, and would present this resolution, after it had met with the approval of the town merchants, to the council at the next meeting in conjunction with the consideration to be given to the resolution presented by the gasoline vendors. The meeting was then adjourned to a later date.

Trout Famine In Montague Area

Well, the first two days of the new fishing season have come and now the followers of Isaac Walton of the Montague district, who religiously adhere to the principles proposed in his "complot" caught perhaps the same number of fish, practically none.

A more dismal showing has scarcely been made before, but it would seem that either the trout are on holidays, or had fed too well the previous week. The many who arose in the cold bleak dawn to get a head start on their fishing might as well have remained where they were, for after hours of bitter cold, they returned with nothing.

It was noticed that several were whipping the south stream which at present seems to be troubleless except about two miles up-stream where a few were caught. At the broken dam fishermen had varied luck with the first arrivals getting the catch, but not too many at that. Those who went to the Montague electric dam had better luck, though they were only fresh water trout, and returned home, some with fine catches.

At MacRae's Dam and Dewar's Mill the results were practically the same, with on the whole varied results, some having good luck, others poor. It would seem that the washing of gravel into the Valleyfield stream has wrought considerable damage to the productivity of the stream, which previously was one of the best streams in the Province. Several fishermen have commented that it will take three years after the cessation of gravel washing into the stream to bring it back to normal productivity.

The formerly familiar gravel bottom has now been covered with a heavy silt fill-in, and considerable time will be required to remove it. Deep holes where fish formerly lay are almost non-existent. However, having covered the lower end of the stream, it was noticed that several pieces of developing and by the time the first sea run is on, there will be many shady spots for the fish, provided always that gravel washing is not resumed on the stream.

Although the results have been relatively poor for the past two days, local fishermen will continue to try for the elusive trout, always with that hope that the big one is just around the bend, or in the next big hole.

Calls King's The Forgotten County Of P.E.I.

Refers To Debt Figures

Mr. Hughes confined his remarks to generalities dealing with the election. He spoke briefly later in rebuttal in answer to Mr. MacMillan who was supporting the Conservative candidates, Reid Underhay and Temple MacDonald. Mr. Hughes read briefly from the 'Blue Book' in answer to charges that the Liberals had exaggerated the debt of the Province at the time the Conservatives resigned in 1935. He confirmed the statement of Mr. MacMillan that the debt was approximately five million dollars at the time rather than the eight million as claimed by Liberal in recent remarks.

Mr. MacMillan was the principal speaker for the Conservatives as the candidates spoke very briefly in order to leave their time for him. He suggested that if Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, former Conservative leader, and William Hughes were not on different political sides they might be able to get the claims of this Province recognized at Ottawa. "They are the only two men we have who know enough about them," he said.

The meeting presided over by Russell Moore as chairman, was well attended and all speakers were given a fair hearing.
