## NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

**Training of Fishery Protection Crews.**

**ST. VINCENT DE PAUL PENITENTIARY.**

**Excitement in the Civil Service.**

OTTAWA, Jan. 27.—It is proposed to ask the Government for the use of a British man-of-war, so that the crews of the Fishery Protection vessels may be drilled during winter.

St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary commissioners have presented their report. They recommend many changes.

Civil servants here think they have fallen on evil days. Besides not receiving the annual increase in salary, officers of the customs service have been ordered to report for duty at 9 a. m., and work until 5.30 p. m., with one hour for lunch. The Liberal Party managers in Ontario are in a blue funk about the Government's decree not to give the statutory increase to the civil servants again this year. They fear a complete slump of the civil service vote to the Conservatives.

William Mackenzie and David Mann have put up deposits with the government and signed a contract to build a railway from Glenora to Tielin Lake, whence is uninterrupted navigation to Dawson.

## SITUATION IN CHINA.

**Russia Preparing for War.**

LONDON, Jan. 27.—A despatch to the Daily Graphic from Sebastopol, says it is rumored there that a portion of the Black Sea fleet will be despatched to China.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

Rome, Jan. 26.—The Italian armored warship Marco Polo sailed for the far east today. King Humbert granted an audience to the captain of the Marco Polo, with a view of expressing his wishes and defining the policy of Italy in the far east. His Majesty intimated that Italy's interests lay in the direction of trade expansion, and were therefore akin to England's.

BATHURST, Jan. 24.—The Roman Catholic church at Pokemouche was totally destroyed by fire about ten o'clock Saturday morning. The fire originated in the vestry, and was caused by a spark from the stove pipe during Mass, but was not observed until too late to save the edifice the building was an old one, but valuable. The loss will be severely felt in the parish.

LONDON, Jan. 24.—The Cairo correspondent, on the Daily Telegraph says: "General Sir Herbert Kitchener, commander of the Anglo Egyptian expedition in the Sudan, has telegraphed the officers here that it is needless that they should ascend the Nile, as the Dervishes are quiet. The scare is over and no movement is now expected before the next high Nile."

BOSTON, Jan. 25.—Charles Brown the principal witness in the Bram murder case, was brought from the Charles street jail today to the office of United States District Attorney Casey regarding what he knows of the circumstances attending the death of Captain Nash, his wife and the second mate of the bark Herbert Fuller. PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 24.—The steamer Oregon sailed for Alaska last night with 450 passengers and 1,250 tons of general merchandise and baggage. Fifty head of live stock was also part of the cargo. No less than 300 people who applied for passage were refused, and hundreds of tons of freight were lying on the docks awaiting transportation to the gold fields. The demand for lumber in Alaska is enormous, but steamships refuse to carry it, preferring to take less bulky freight, leaving the lumber for sailing vessels.

PARIS, Jan. 24.—The military club today was guarded by the police, who were also stationed within the Palais Bourbon (chamber of deputies), while a reserve force of 100 policemen was drawn up in the courtyard of the ministry of foreign affairs. There was another body of police in the garden of the Tuilleries and a detachment of the republican guard was stationed in the courtyard of the ministry of the marine. There were big crowds of people in the neighborhood of the chamber of deputies.

ALGIERS, Jan. 24.—Further rioting occurred at 9 o'clock this morning, when it was learned that a Hebrew had stabbed a Spaniard. A mob gathered, attacked and looted the Hebrew stores. Governor Lepine personally intervened in order to induce the rioters to desist from further disorderly conduct. During his efforts to restore quiet the governor general narrowly escaped being struck by a chair which was thrown at him from a store. At the head of six Zouaves, with fixed bayonets, preceded by military drummers, traversed the street appealing for quiet. He was followed by a mob of about 3,000 people who shouted: "Down with the Jews," "Resign," intermingled with cries "vive la gouverneur generale." The governor general finally retired to the winter palace escorted by detachments of police and Zouaves. As this message is forwarded a large crowd of natives are trying to join the rioters and participate in the work of pillage. Several Hebrews have been assaulted and a score of arrests have been made.
