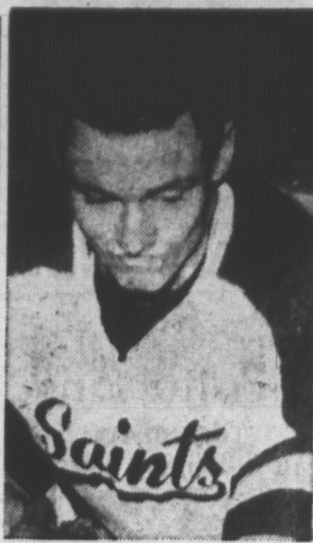


Saint Dunstan's Varsity Bombs Moncton U 10-2

The Saint Dunstan's Varsity Saints bounced back from their 5-4 defeat at the hands of the Mount Allison Mounties last weekend and routed the University of Moncton, 10-2, at Saint Dunstan's Saturday afternoon. This was the Saints' second win in three starts this season. They defeated the Dalhousie University Tigers, 7-0, in their league opener.

The Saints were led to their overwhelming victory by Gordie Whitlock, who scored three goals, Maurice Roy, Dave O'Brien, who each scored two goals. Vince Mulligan, Art LeClair, and Rick O'Donnell got the other Saints goals.

Therault and LaForge got the U of M's only points. LaForge also collected an assist.

The first few minutes of the first period gave the spectators the impression that the Saints were going to spend all their time in the penalty box. At the 2:40 mark the Saints had two men sitting out rule infractions. However, Moncton failed to capitalize on this opportunity but when it came the Saints turn to have the odd man advantage they were determined to make use of the situation. At 9:31, seconds after Moncton gained one of their two penalized players Maurice Roy scored his fifth goal of the season and put the Saints ahead 1-0.

Gordie Whitlock finished the scoring in the first period at 11:50 when he shot the puck, which had rebounded off the Moncton goal post, over the sprawled Moncton goalie.

AGAIN AND AGAIN

It appeared as if the second period was going to be a carbon-copy of the first, when in the first eight minutes there were five penalties given out. On two occasions players from both sides went off together.

Again things settled down and at 8:55, when both teams were short-handed O'Donnell took the puck directly from the faceoff and backhanded a hard shot past Basque, who was playing brilliant hockey.

The Saints came alive after O'Donnell's goal and completely dominated the last part of this period.

Shot after shot was steered away by Basque, but he couldn't take on the whole Saints forward line, who at this point seemed to have Moncton a bit disorganized, and at 15:38 O'Brien banged the puck into the net on a pass from Kelly.

Whitlock scored his second goal and put the Saints five points ahead when he finished a play that had started deep in the Saints zone.

The third period opened on a sharp note. At 55 seconds Whitlock sent a screen shot hurling into the net.

Moncton was determined not to give Carl MacQuaid the satisfaction of a second shutout for the season. Therault put Moncton on the score board when he shot a hard shot at a sharp angle which seemed to surprise MacQuaid.

From here on it looked as if the Saints were going to blast

Moncton right off the ice but spectacular goal tending by Basque kept SDU in check until 9:20 when Mulligan backhanded a shot over the top of him, into the net.

Basque received a minor injury on this goal and after a few minutes' rest he was ready to continue.

From the faceoff at centre ice the puck went into the Moncton end but LaForge, who had been a powerhouse for Moncton all afternoon, stole the puck from a Saints defenceman and skated down the ice all alone and fired a shot past MacQuaid.

The Saints retaliated with three goals in four minutes. LeClair flipped a high shot from outside the Moncton blue line which took a bad sideways hop and trickled into the net.

Again the Saints applied the pressure and again it paid off. O'Brien scored at 14:15 and then at 16:09 the Saints came speeding back and Roy, who had opened the scoring in the first period, shot a rebound into the Moncton net.

This game marked the end of SDU's schedule until after the new year. Their next game is Jan. 10, '66 when they host St. FX.

Chicago, Detroit Triumph; Habs, Boston Deadlock

NEW YORK (AP) — Scoring champ Stan Mikita fired three goals and assisted on a fourth as red-hot Chicago Black Hawks whipped slumping New York Rangers 6-2 in a National Hockey League game Sunday night.

Mikita's 12th, 13th and 14th goals of the season—his second three-goal performance in as many nights—helped the Hawks to their sixth victory in the last seven games and extended New York's winless string to six.

The Hawks, hottest road club in the NHL with nine victories in 10 starts away from home, roared from behind as New York took the early lead. It was the fifth straight game in which the Rangers blew an early margin.

HULL SCORES

Bobby Hull sent the Hawks in front in the second period after the teams had traded goals during the opening 20 minutes. New York's Arnie Brown scored first, rapping Rod Gilbert's rebound home. Doug Mohns tied it with the Rangers two men short late in the period.

Then Hull, killing a penalty, let go with a 35-foot slap shot that beat Ed Giacomin cleanly. The Hawks scored two more goals quickly. Phil Esposito connecting from a scramble in front of Giacomin less than three minutes after Hull hit and Mikita's back-hander making it 4-1 another three minutes later.

Mikita scored again in the first minute of the third period and then completed his three-goal night with just more than three minutes to play. He scored three goals in the Hawks' 10-1 romp over Boston Bruins Saturday night.

Lou Angotti scored the Rangers' second goal with his team short-handed midway in the last period.

Hull thought he had another goal in the first period when his scathing slap shot beat Giacomin, bounced off the left post and back out on the ice. The red light never went on and play continued as Hull and Pierre Pilote argued with referee John Ashley.

Ashley consulted with goal judge Lee Stark and the no-goal decision stood. Pilote rapped at

Detroit and Toronto traded goals in the first period with Norm Ullman scoring on a power play and Eddie Shack tying the score for the Leafs with less than three minutes remaining.

Alex Delvecchio put the Red Wings ahead for good at 6:42 of the second period.

Howe got his first goal with 56 seconds gone in the third period and his second completed a three-way play between Doug Barkley, Ullman and Howe.

Ab McDonald added to the Detroit lead with a goal at 3:55 of the third period.

Detroit goalie Roger Crozier turned in one of his best performances of the season, making 33 saves to 24 for Toronto's goalie Terry Sawchuk.

Shack, in the penalty box when Ullman scored his goal, took Orland Kurtenbach's pass from the right boards while skating full speed up the middle and beat Crozier with an ice-skimming shot from about 30 feet out.

Ullman's tally, his 11th of the season, came just 13 seconds after Shack was penalized for slashing.

Doug Barkley shot the puck into a maze of players in front of the Toronto net and Ullman beat teammate Floyd Smith to the puck and backhanded it past Terry Sawchuk.

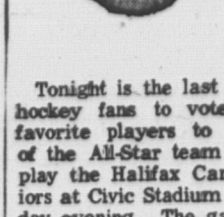

Rampaging Bears Tighten Up Race

Chicago Bears jolted Baltimore 13-0 Sunday, sent Colt quarterback Johnny Unitas to hospital for an operation that will sideline him for the season and tightened the National Football League's Western Conference race into a three-way struggle.

Gale Sayers raced 61 yards for a touchdown and his rookie teammate, Dick Butkus, led a fierce Chicago defence that trimmed the Colts' lead to one-half game over Green Bay Packers, with the Bears 1 1/2 behind.

Each team has two games remaining.

The Packers, who meet the Colts at Baltimore next Sunday, closed in on a 24-10 win over Minnesota Vikings.

In other games, Eastern-champion Cleveland Browns defeated Washington Redskins 24-16, New York Giants took over second place in the East with a 35-10 victory over Pittsburgh Steelers, Los Angeles Rams crushed St. Louis Cardinals 27-3, Dallas Cowboys edged Philadelphia Eagles 21-19 and San Francisco 49ers edged Detroit Lions 17-14.

WHIPPED OILERS
In the American League, Eastern champion Buffalo Bills whipped Houston Oilers 29-18 and Oakland Raiders kept the Western title hopes alive by downing Denver Broncos 24-13.

San Diego Chargers moved within one victory of the Western crown Saturday by thumping New York Jets 38-7, Boston

Patriots and Kansas City Chiefs did not play.

Unitas, who hurt his back playing against the Bears a month ago, was dumped after letting go of a pass near the end of the first half and suffered torn ligaments in his right knee. He was scheduled for surgery.

Sayers, held 17 yards rushing in his first try against the Colts, surpassed that with his touchdown run in the first period and wound up with 118 for the game. Roger Leclerc booted field goals for the other points.

Trailing 19-14, the Packers moved ahead on Zeke Bratkowski's 27-yard touchdown pass to Bill Anderson, then clinched it on a 25-yard field goal by Don Chandler that brushed the upright before falling over the crossbar.

The Browns also trailed Washington 16-10 in the fourth quarter. But Cleveland pulled it out on Frank Ryan's 14-yard pass to Tom Hutchinson and Jimmy Brown's four-yard touchdown scamper after a fumble recovery by Jim Houston.

Tucker Fredrickson had the biggest day of his rookie season for the Giants, scoring three touchdowns against the Steelers on runs of 13 and three yards and a 19-yard pass from Earl Morrall.

Roman Gabriel passed for two touchdowns, hitting Billy Truax on a 59-yard play and Dick Bass on a 16-yarder, as the Rams walloped the Cardinals.

Don Meredith's 21-yard touchdown pass to Frank Clark proved decisive for the cowboys, who got possession of the ball when Jethro Pugh broke through and blocked Sam Baker's field-goal attempt.

John Unitas Out For Year

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP)—Johnny Unitas suffered torn ligaments in his right knee in Sunday's game against Chicago Bears and is lost to Baltimore Colts for the remainder of the National Football League season.

Unitas' loss was a crippling blow to Baltimore's hopes for a Western Conference title. The Colts lead Green Bay Packers by only one-half game with two games remaining.

The Colts can fall down their second straight conference title by beating the Packers next Sunday.

Whether the career of Unitas one of the greats in NFL history, is ended depended on the outcome of an operation scheduled Sunday night.

Unitas was injured with 4:42 to play in the first half against Chicago Bears, the second time this season they have laid him low. He also had to leave the game in the first half at Chicago Nov. 7 with a sprained back and missed the next tilt with Minnesota.

CAN DO JOB

Both coach Don Schula and Gary Cuozzo, under study to Unitas, expressed confidence the substitute could fill in adequately.

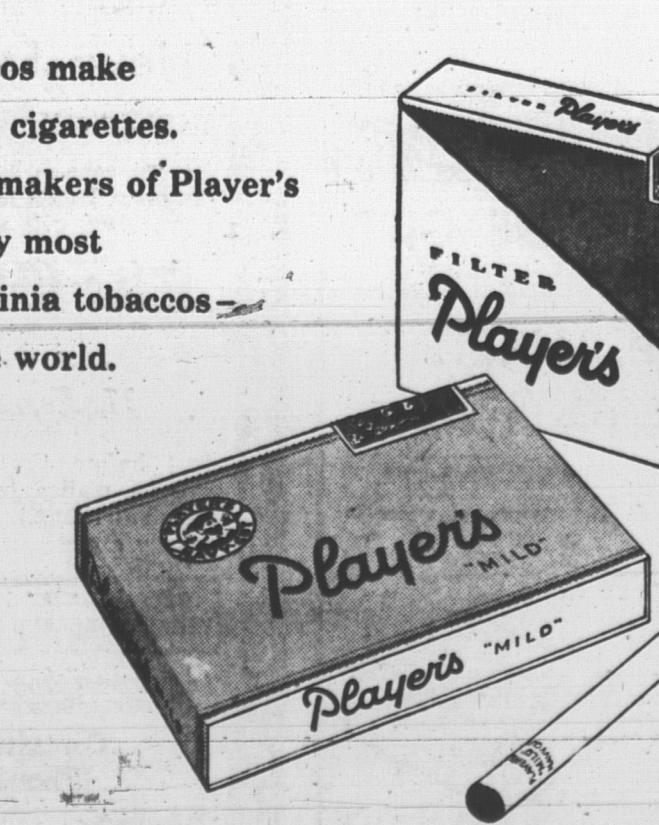
"He's not a rookie," said Schula. "I definitely think he can do the job and so does everyone else on the team."
