Lough Mask Murderer Sentenced. DUBLIN, Dec. 21. Michael Flynn, has been sentenced to be hanged on January 17th, for participation in the Lough Mask murder.

The Alexandria Massacre. CAIRO, Dec. 21. The participants in the Alexandria massacre, will be tried by Court Martial to-morrow.

The French Controller. PARIS, Dec. 21. M. Brediffe, French Controller, has resumed his functions at Cairo.

The New Archbishop of Canterbury LONDON, Dec. 21. The Rev. Dr. Benson, Bishop of Truro, has accepted the Archbishopric of Canterbury.

Overdank Executed. LONDON, Dec. 21. Overdank was executed at Trieste yesterday.

The "Union Generale" PARIS, Dec. 21. Bontoux and Federe of the Union Generale, Paris, were yesterday sentenced to five years imprisonment and two thousand francs fine.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS. LONDON, Dec. 19. Postmaster-General Fawcett is now fairly convalescent.

PARIS, Dec. 19. M. Victor Florence Pollet, the eminent designer and engraver, is dead.

LONDON, Dec. 19. The storm in North-Eastern Scotland which began yesterday, continues. Three vessels have gone ashore. The crews of all were drowned.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 19. The British barque "Lennox," from Glasgow for this port with coal, has been burned at sea. Crew saved.

BOSTON, Dec. 19. Henry James, Sr., the able and original writer on Theology, died in this city yesterday, aged seventy-one years. He was the father of Henry James the well-known novelist.

CONCORD, N. H., Dec. 19. Two shocks of earthquake were felt in various places in southern New Hampshire to-night. Buildings were shaken, and in some instances crocks and pictures were jarred from shelves and mantels. Interruptions lasted about ten seconds and people were considerably frightened.

BERLIN, Dec. 10. Metz Antonio, a member of the protest party has been elected to the Reichstag.

PARIS, Dec. 19. Gambetta has again been confined to his bed, owing to an intestinal trouble, which necessitated the consultation of several doctors.

BERLIN, Dec. 19. Despite the visit of DeGiers, the Russian Foreign Minister, the relations between Germany and Russia are very mysterious and unsatisfactory.

LONDON, Dec. 19. Later Advice from Madagascar contradicts the report telegraphed from Durban yesterday, of the murder of an Englishman by natives.

LONDON, Dec. 19. The Daily News Vienna correspondent reports that Herber Bismarck has arrived there with despatches in connection with the proposed Austro-German Alliance.

PARIS, Dec. 19. The Franco commenting on the election of Herr Antoine to the German Reichstag, says:—"Antoine's success is a new protest against Bismarck's attempt to Germanize Alsace and Lorraine."

DUBLIN, Dec. 19. Mr. Biggar, member of Parliament, in a speech at the inauguration of the National Club at Waterford yesterday, denounced Earl Spencer, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, as a blood-thirsty English Peer, who had hanged Hynes and Miles Joyce, although satisfied of their innocence, in order to gratify English Whigs. Biggar's remarks were loudly cheered.

NEW YORK, Dec. 19. An immense assemblage gathered at the Cooper's Union last night to greet the German Socialist, Herr Johann Most. The platform was crowded with Socialists, and Herr Most was received with a storm of applause. Most upon being introduced delivered a short speech in German, in which he described the spread of the revolutionary movement.

DUBLIN, Dec. 19. At a meeting held last night to form a branch of the Irish National Land League, Mr. Harrington, in his speech, said the more prosperous farmers must be told that if they did not throw themselves into the new movement, they would have the whole force of labor agitation directed against them.

In the police court to-day, Westgate was charged with participation in the Phoenix Park murders, and remanded.

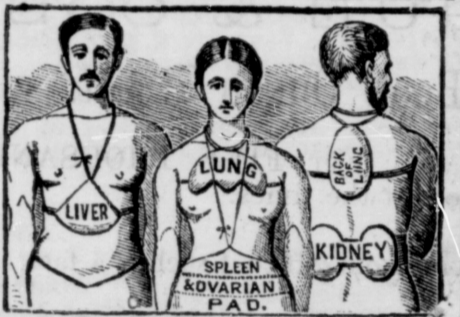
