PERSONAL.—Mr. Schrieber, Chief Engineer of Government Railways in Operation, reached Moncton yesterday morning, and proceeded to Halifax. By same train, from Quebec to River du Loup, the Princess Louise was a passenger, travelling in the Brydges Palace Car, also Lewis Carvell, Esq., Chief Superintendent Pottinger, Alfred Peters, Esq., and other prominent individuals. Mr. Schrieber will, we understand, pass over the whole line, and endeavour to ascertain the causes of complaints, which, it appears, have reached the Department.
