

Women Picketers Struck By Patrol Car, Is Charge

GRAND FALLS, Nfld. (CP)—H. Landon Ladd, president of the International Woodworkers of America (IWA), said Tuesday a RCMP patrol car sideswiped women picketers and that the RCMP are being used as an arm of the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company.

The charge was denied by Inspector Arthur Argent, in charge of the RCMP force in this central Newfoundland area since IWA loggers went on strike against the company Dec. 31.

Mr. Ladd called for a complete investigation into the incident from the attorney-general's office in St. John's and from the national headquarters of the RCMP in Ottawa.

SHOCKING AFFAIR

He termed the incident "a shocking affair... not alone because of the disregard for life and limb but in that the RCMP spearheaded a drive to take outside strikers through the line. This incident proves conclusively that the RCMP are being used as an arm of the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company."

Loggers struck the company to back demands for higher wages and a shorter work week.

Inspector Argent said union statements prompted an incident reported early Tuesday morning in the Millertown area about 40 miles from here.

A patrol car spotted a group of taxis on the Badger highway. RCMP knew that several carloads of IWA men were parked along the road. The patrol car followed the taxis which were reported to contain non-striker loggers wishing to enter Anglo-Newfoundland woods camps.

Inspector Argent said "the police patrol car following behind the taxi noted the other cars, three or four of them, that were parked on the side of the road, fell in behind the police car and trailed them to the vicinity of Bushan's Junction without incident."

Then a car approaching from the opposite direction got stuck across the road in an attempt to turn around. Men in the first taxi helped get the car under way.

"When the car arrived at the (Millertown) picket line, it stopped and blocked the highway. The taxis stopped and the RCMP patrol car stopped about 100 feet behind, while the other cars halt on the public highway."

"Two policemen got out of the patrol car and walked over to the picket shack. They reported they saw no women at that time. But later the women arrived from the cars parked out in the highway."

Blasting Operations Planned At Hillsboro Bridge Project

Some 8,000 pounds of explosives will be used early in March to remove a 14-foot layer of mud underlying the northern extremity of the Hillsboro Bridge approach now under construction.

At this point of the new construction some 18 "h" piles, each over 120 feet long are going to be driven and a solid bottom is essential if the weight of the northern abutment is to be carried safely.

Following the blast engineers will make tests to assure that the piers of the old bridge have not been affected before it is re-opened to traffic. No appreciable delay in the movement of traffic is anticipated.

Thirteen of the 23 holes required for the explosive have already been drilled and when the time comes for the blast to be set off, the present bridge will be closed to traffic.

LONDON (Reuters)—The total of unemployed in Britain has increased to 630,000—the highest figure in almost 12 years—Labor Minister Ian Macleod announced Tuesday.

Macleod told the House of Commons that the total number of Britons out of work was 2.8 per cent of the employed population.

The figures released Tuesday are the highest since a fuel crisis hit the country early in 1947 and forced several factories to close. Unemployment totalled 1,874,000 in February, 1947, but dropped quickly below the 500,000 mark when fuel became available.

Kelly's Cross Airman Helps Keep NATO Forces Flying

METZ, France. — Keeping aircraft in first class flying condition is the responsibility of the ground crew in the RCAF and one such airman is Corporal H. James Matters, 23-year-old electrical technician from Kelly's Cross, Prince Edward Island, who is serving at No. 2 Fighter Wing, at Grosstenguin, France, within the RCAF's NATO Air Division in Europe.

Located approximately 30 miles southeast of Metz, the headquarters of the Air Division, Grosstenguin was the first RCAF operational base opened on Continental Europe in peacetime and has been an active NATO base since the fall of 1952.

With two Sabre day-fighter and one CF-100 twin-jet all-weather fighter squadrons constantly flying, maintenance is continuous in order to ensure that the aircraft are in the best flying condition.

Working with airmen in related trades, Cpl. Matters is employed on the electrical maintenance of the Wing's aircraft. Born at Kelly's Cross and educated at Kirkcraigh School and Charlottetown Normal School, he joined the RCAF in 1953 at Summerside, P. E. I., and was trained at St. Johns, P.Q., and RCA FStation Camp Borden, Ont.

After graduating, Cpl. Matters served at Clarendon, Alberta, from 1954 until 1957 when he was transferred to No. 2 Fighter Wing.

Cpl. Matters is married to the former Lois McKay of Jaffray, B.C. They have one child. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Aeneas Matters, live at Kelly's Cross.

Church's Role In Industry Is Speaker's Topic The role of the church in industry in Scotland was graphically illustrated in an address to the men of Trinity by Rev. Foster E. Hall Monday evening.

Rev. Hall, minister of the United Church at Hunter River, told the group that until the turn of the century the Scottish people had been industrious but not industrial.

He said noon hour lunch was often spent in singing psalms and listening to a recitation or an explanation of Scripture. It was a common sight to see the working man with a Bible, reading as he worked.

He said religious influence waned with the coming of industry and communism spread, having a disastrous effect on relations between labor and management and resulted in many walkouts, strikes and hunger marches.

The common cause facing both sides during the Second World War halted the encroachment of the Marxist doctrine for a time but it flared anew at the end of the war. For a time, he said, it appeared as if 50 per cent of Scotland's industrial firms would transfer factories or establishments across the Atlantic.

However, Christian influence exerted by the laymen of the churches, helped greatly in stemming the communistic tide.

Senior and junior communicants classes will be conducted at Trinity United Church. Rev. Robert S. Latimer will conduct the junior classes and Rev. A. Frank MacLean the senior classes.
