

Braves Beat Phils Twice; Yanks Split; Cards Drop 2 To Brooks

Milwaukee's powerhouse Braves ripped off seven home runs, sweeping both ends of a Sunday doubleheader from Philadelphia, 8-7 and 16-5, to widen their National League lead over Cincinnati to three games.

The Redlegs had to bounce back with a 9-2 second game victory to gain a split with Pittsburgh after the Pirates had won the opener 8-4. Brooklyn's third place Dodgers remained six games off the pace by downing the St. Louis Cardinals twice 5-3 and 4-3.

In the other National League twin bill, the Chicago Cubs climbed into sixth place by vanquishing the cellar-dwelling New York Giants twice, 4-1 and 3-1.

The New York Yankees' first place lead in the American League was reduced to 9 1/2 games when the Kansas City Athletics held them to a split while Cleveland was polishing off Baltimore 8-0. The Yankees bounced back with a 13-4 triumph after Alex Kellner and Al Dittmar combined to pitch the A's to a 7-4

win. Boston outslugged Detroit 8-4 and the Chicago White Sox defeated Washington 6-1 in the other games.

BRAVES LET LOOSE
After a close first game slug-fest in which they handed Robin Roberts his 11th defeat, the Braves really went to town in the second game. Led by Eddie Thomason, Joe Adcock and Eddie Mathews, the Braves unleashed an 18-hit attack against seven Philly fingers including Granny Hamner, the veteran infielder-turned-pitcher for one inning.

Thomason had two homers in the nightcap and Adcock and Mathews had one in each game. Adcock now has hit 11 home runs in his last 15 games. His season total is 21.

Home runs also helped Cincinnati gain its split with Pittsburgh. Gus Bell and Bob Thurman rapped two-run homers and pitcher Joe Nuxhall helped his cause with a four-bagger, his second of the season.

Carl Erskine and Sandy Koufax

pitched the Dodgers to their sweep over St. Louis. Erskine permitted seven hits in the opener for his sixth victory in succession. His batterymate, catcher Rube Walker, helped him considerably with a home run and double that drove in three runs

against loser Bob Blaylock. Early Wynn hurled a six-hit shutout for his 11th Cleveland victory as the Indians pounded three Baltimore pitchers for 17 hits, including Vic Wertz' 23rd home run. Mickey Vernon pounded across five runs with a home run and

single to lead the Red Sox to triumph as Tom Brewer registered his 13th triumph. On Saturday, temperamental Ted Williams drove in four runs with a homer, double and single as Boston Red Sox battered Detroit Tigers 9-3.

S'ide Raceway To Be Torn Down If Not Sold By Aug. 1st

The Summerside Raceway is to be offered for sale and if it is not sold by August 1st, it will be dismantled, according to an official announcement made at Saturday night's eight dash card attended by a carnival crowd of over 2,000 spectators, many of whom were shocked to hear that the modern raceway may have had its last racing card.

No other details were released. The Summerside Raceway is owned by limited company composed of G. B. Sheen, H. E. Gaudet, Andrew Perry and J. K. Curran.

It was constructed four years ago and officially opened on July 1st, 1953 by the Prime Minister of Canada Louis St. Laurent.

The grandstand has a seating capacity 2,500 persons and stable accommodation for about 150 horses. When built the Raceway was worth close to \$15,000.

It is used primarily for racing but also has been used for stock car racing on a track constructed on the inside of the half-mile oval and dare-devil shows.

Neilsen Out For Three Months

COPENHAGEN (AP)—Gunnar Neilsen, Denmark's four-minute miler and chief olympic hope, suffered a leg injury Friday night and must take a three-month rest. The hurt was described as the rupture of a blood vessel in his right thigh.

Neilsen already had won the 400, 800 and 1,500 metre races in the Danish-Iceland track duel when he returned to the field as the third man on the 1,000-metre relay team.

He took the baton and made up the 10-yard handicap but slipped to the turf as he handed the stick over to the final Danish runner.
