ISLAND DESCENDANTS

"This was a gathering of Prince Edwards Islanders and the descendants of an Islander. The sons and daughters, grandchildren and great grandchildren of the brothers and sister, James Hector, John Daniel and Dorothea Jane Munn. Many of them met for the first time as John Daniel Munn remained all his years on Prince Edward Island where he raised a large family and where he died in 1939. James Hector Munn came west in the 1890's making his home west of those years on Lake Leland, State of Washington. He died in 1925. Dorothea Jane, who married Alex Stewart, also of Prince Edward Island came west with her husband and family from Boston in 1906 and settled in Seattle, Washington, Dorothy Jane died in 1930.

Present also was William Munn from another branch of the family, whose mother's maiden name was White of Prince Edward Island. He came west after the death of his parents, when but a small boy, to make her home with James White, who had left the Island in the early 1800's and had settled near Port Townsend, Washington.

Invited, but unable to attend, was Murray Young of Port Townsend. He grew up on Wood Island, P. E. I. but left there around 1908. He lived with the James Munn family for a while after he first came west.

Also, invited but unable to come was Ethelyn Lumaden Taylor,

whose father William Lumaden was born and raised around Murray Harbor.

"Honored by all present was Ana Mae Munn, 83 years old, widow of James Hector and the only living member of the family of her and her husband's generation. She wrote the report for the "Port Townsend Leader" just as she has written her community news items for the past fifty years.

"The date for the family picnic had been set a month in advance which was a very optimistic gesture, as there had not been a cold or winter summer in the Puget Sound County for forty-two years, according to statistics. But fortune smiled and it was the one perfect day of the summer. The sun shone brilliantly, the lake sparkled, all the flowers opened and poured forth their best colors and perfumes. The trees and grass were lush and green from the abundance of moisture they had received. Even a couple of wild deer stood unafraid at the edge of the forest, as tables, laden with picnic foods, were spread beneath a big walnut tree. The buzz of voices was the buzz of bees as cousins became acquainted with cousins and exchanged the stories of the histories of the families which all goes back to that little band of hardy Scotch people who left their beloved Scotland and sailed on the "Good Ship Polly" to the strange shores of Prince Edward Island."

The bride, given in marriage by her step-father, chose for her wedding a street-length dress of powder blue wool, fashioned in princess lines, with navy and white accessories and wore a corsage of Pink Delight Roses.

Miss Kitty MacFarlane was maid of honor and wore a street-length dress of navy blue, bengaline the same as the bride's, with coral accessories. Her corsage was of white carnations.

Mr. Carmen Woodside, friend of the groom, acted as best man. The bride's mother chose for her daughter's wedding a navy blue suit with navy and white accessories. She wore a corsage of pink roses.
