Broadcast Gobs. Launch New Practice This Week

OTTAWA (CP) - The Board of Broadcast Governors launch a new regulatory practice this week by hearing public representations from seven radio stations whose licences are up for renewal this month. The stations are among a clock of applicants, including the CBC, appearing before the board to seek new radio and television licences, power increases and authority to set up a private regional radio network in the Maritimes. Dr. Andrew Stewart, BBG chairman, said in a letter Feb. 18 to the seven radio stations: "Members of the board want to hear from you something about your philosophy of broadcasting. We are seeking an expression of their philosophies from stations in various parts of Canada." He said the board wants to know the stations' ideas on time allowed under present regulations for advertising announcements, record programs as against live performances, giveaways to attract listenership, marathons by announcers and similar matters. The stations asked to appear Wednesday, the last day of hearings beginning today, are: CIPA Port Arthur, Ont.; CHUM Toronto; CKEY Toronto; CKNW New Westminster, B.C.; CKOY Ottawa; CKWS Kingston, Ont.; and CRN Rouyn, Que. They are among the roughly 75 per cent of existing stations whose licences are up for renewal by March 31. Dr. Stewart said last month that not all could be called, so

the board made a selection. The other licences would be renewed without the stations' management having to make public appearances before the board. **WERE PRIVATE** Under the old CBC board of governors, former regulatory authority over Canadian broadcasting, any stations appearing before it in the matter of licence renewal did so at private hearings. The BBG also will hear representations this week on a proposed amendment to transport department regulations, permitting issuance and renewal of broadcasting licences for periods of less than five years. At present, licences are issued and renewed for fixed periods of five years. Dr. Stewart said a change would permit the staggering of renewal dates, so that a roughly equal number of licences would come up annually instead of in a big lump as is the case this month. The board has no power to suspend or refuse renewal of a licence, but is empowered to make recommendations to the transport minister. **MARITIMES NETWORK** A bid will be made before the board for the establishment of a network of six Maritime radio stations consisting of CHNS Halifax; CJCB Sydney, N.S.; CFBC Saint John, N.B.; CFNB Fredericton; CKOW Moncton, N.B.; and CFCY Charlottetown. The board will also hear applications for new private TV stations in Cornwall, Ont., and New Glasgow, N.S.; a TV satellite in

New Pipeline Is Planned

MONTREAL (CP) Quebec Natural Gas Corporation has announced plans for a \$5,000,000 program for construction of a natural gas pipeline to the South Shore opposite Montreal Island. The announcement was made at a press conference Saturday by Col. Maurice Forget, corporation president, and Leonard Milano, vice-president. Major consumer of the new service is to be the Steel Company of Canada plants at Contrecoeur, 25 miles southwest of Montreal, the officials said. First delivery to the Steico plant is expected to be made in late August. **FAMOUS TUNNEL** The Simplon Tunnel runs 12 1/2 miles through the Alps between Switzerland and Italy.

Princeton, B.C., linked to station CHEBC-TV Kelowna, B.C.; and five CBC low-power TV repeater stations in Corner Brook, Nfld., Moncton, Kenora, Ont., Winnipeg and Trail, B.C. The Moncton and Winnipeg stations would operate in the French language, the former linked to the CBC French TV network, the latter using mostly tapes and recordings on a delayed basis. Winnipeg's neighboring city of St. Boniface is largely French-speaking. The other three CBC TV outlets would be linked to the English network.

B.C. Iron Ore Sales To Japan Become Large Scale Business

VANCOUVER (CP) - Details of the latest deal with Japanese importers and steel smelters indicate the movement of British Columbia iron ore to Japan is nearing proportions of a \$300,000,000 to \$400,000,000 business. Nimpkish Iron Mines Limited will be shipping iron ore in July or August from its properties in the Nimpkish Lake region of northern Vancouver Island. It will spend about \$2,000,000 in bringing the property to production and shipping and the project will employ 35 to 50 men on a year-round basis. Vernon Wines, project manager says construction will employ

probably another 100 men. The Nimpkish program might mean \$6,000,000 to \$10,000,000 worth of business to the mine and environs during the contract years. Nimpkish already has proven about 1,000,000 tons of iron ore and expects to prove considerably more through an exploration program. The Nimpkish company's contract is the third firm deal to export B.C. iron ore to Japan. A fourth is shaping up. Texada Mines Limited has shipped considerably more than 1,500,000 tons since 1952 from Texada Island in the Gulf of Georgia and its deal is reported to be worth at least \$10,000,000. Empire Development will ship some \$10,000,000 to \$12,000,000 worth of iron concentrate to Japan during a three-year period from its property at Port McNeill on Vancouver Island.

HIGH-GRADE WORKINGS Pacific Quarries Limited and Cascade Lode Mines have plans to develop more than 300,000 tons of high-grade ore near Zeballos, also on Vancouver Island, and spokesmen say arrangements for shipments to Japan have been made. Nimpkish Iron Mines is the operating company in the new project. It is owned by Standard International Mines, a Canadian subsidiary of Standard Slag Company of Youngstown, Ohio, and International Iron Mines, a Canadian company. The Japanese steel companies involved are only buyers and Japanese interests have no financial interest in the Nimpkish operation. Initial contract is expected to call for about 1,000,000 tons and, depending on fluctuations in demand, the deal might run two to five years. **GOOD FISH** Atlantic pollack, a food fish of considerable value, is a relative of the codfish.
