Downward Trend Noted In Service Manpower

OTTAWA (CP) — Strength of Canada's armed forces has fallen to its lowest figure in two years. The downward trend in service manpower comes at a time when the RCAF is looking for more personnel for three new CF-100 jet fighter squadrons and the navy needs more sailors to man its new destroyer escorts.

A defence department spokesman said the strength of the forces at the end of July—latest figure available—was 115,982. The breakdown: Navy, 18,824; army, 47,397; RCAF, 49,761.

Toward the close of 1954, service manpower stood at about 117,000. In March of the same year it was 112,500.

The manpower ceiling set for the armed forces is 120,000—20,000 for the navy, 49,000 for the army and 51,000 for the air force. At the end of March last year, the total strength stood at 118,077, the highest figure reached since the defence buildup started with outbreak of the Korean War in 1950.

The recent decline has been most evident in the navy and the air force. Since the start of the year, the navy has had a net loss of about 400 and the air force of about 600. The army has gained about 200.

ARMY TRYING HARD
An army official said the army is trying hard to recruit men, especially in the infantry, but is having trouble. He added that recruiting always appears to be slower in summer than in winter and particularly in prosperous times.

The shortage of army manpower is shown in the strength of the Regiment of Canadian Guards, which normally would have a strength of about 900 men each. But not one of the battalions has more than 500 men.

In a recent demonstration for the Toronto board of trade at Camp Pelawas, Ont., one of the Guards battalions carried out a mock infantry attack in company strength. But instead of using only one company, it had to press the entire battalion into service be-

cause of the shortage of infantrymen. The 1956-57 white paper on defence, issued by the government earlier this year, said: "Provision has been made for some increase in strength in the navy and air force."

But the figures show the strength is decreasing rather than increasing though some improvement may be made this coming winter. The RCAF particularly needs more men because the number of home defence CF-100 night-fighter squadrons will be increased from nine to 12.

Extend Daily Service To Newfoundland
ST. JOHN'S Nfld. — Continuation of daily passenger train and steamship services between St. John's, Nfld., and North Sydney, N.S. until Sunday, October 14, was announced by E. J. Cooke, manager of the Newfoundland district of the Canadian National Railways.

The daily passenger train and ship service between St. John's and the mainland was scheduled to be discontinued beginning Sunday, September 30, and to be replaced with a tri-weekly operation.

London Mansion House Funds Record Countless Disasters

LONDON (Reuters) — Although it is 44 years since the Titanic sank in the Atlantic Ocean, there is still a fund in London worth £124,262 (\$347,933) for the surviving dependents of the 1,500 who lost their lives in the disaster.

It is one of several funds which come under the aegis of the National Disasters Relief Fund. They all date from appeals made by the lord mayor of London at times when disaster and distress have shocked the British public, and made them reach generously into their pockets.

The first of the series of funds was opened 85 years ago when London's lord mayor collected thousands of pounds for the starving citizens of Paris, besieged by the Prussians in 1871.

Since then, the lord mayor has been called "the chief almoner of the Empire," and his official residence and headquarters, the Mansion House, has been described as "the world's greatest philanthropic institution."

RECORDS BROKEN
All Mansion House fund records were broken during the Second World War when the Lord Mayor's Air Raid Distress Fund (national and empire) raised nearly £25,000 (\$15,400,000).

Also during the war, the Red Cross Fund, which was started by the lord mayor and later taken over by the Duke of Gloucester, had raised £53,000,000 (\$148,400,000) when it closed in November 1945.

The biggest individual contribution to any lord mayor's fund was Lord Nuffield's donation of £100,000 for the Red Cross.

Only once in the long history of the funds has any grant been obtained by fraud, and that was the first of them.

In 1871, an English crook, dressed exquisitely, wept as he told the lord mayor of the hardships of the town of Chateaufort, near Chartres, of which he claimed to be mayor, at the hands of the Prussians.

TREATED ROYALLY
The lord mayor was so affected that he not only handed the visitor £500 but invited him to a Mansion House banquet.

It was some time before the suspected visitor was apprehended, and then he was when he attempted to engineer another fraud. He died while serving a sentence of 15 years' imprisonment.

When the reputedly "unsinkable" Titanic, with her luxury cabins carrying wealthy passengers, struck an iceberg on her maiden voyage to New York on April 15, 1912, the lord mayor within a few days had collected £50,651 for the dependents of the victims.

When the Empress of Ireland, bound for Liverpool with 1,367 persons aboard, was rammed in a fog in the St. Lawrence River May 29, 1914, and sank within 10 minutes with 984 lives lost, a similar appeal raised 45,364 lbs. LUSITANIA SINKS

On May 7, 1915, the Cunard liner Lusitania was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine off Cork with the loss of 1,196 lives. More than £25,000 was raised for this fund.

Money collected for all the lord mayor's funds is vested in a trust. The last report of the executive committee of the National Disasters Relief Fund revealed that dependent widows who are not eligible for a state widow's pension are receiving minimum weekly allowances of £3 7s (88.38) from the Titanic fund. This fund still has 83 dependents. In addition, compassionate grants totalling £1,004 (\$2,811) from the Titanic fund were made last year.

Imperial Oil Shares Offered
OCTOBER 1 (Special) — Imperial Oil plans an offering of approximately 1,500,000 additional shares of capital stock. The company announced following a director's meeting today. As presently planned, the offering will be made to shareholders on the basis of one new share for each 20 shares held.

The subscription price will be determined shortly before the offering is made. It is expected the price will be fixed at a discount from the market price. The offering will be made by means of a prospectus.

So that the offering may include United States shareholders, the company has authorized the preparation of a registration statement under the United States Securities Act, and the offering is projected for November after the registration statement is effective. Standard Oil of New Jersey has indicated that in the event such an offering is made, it is its intent to subscribe to the shares in which it will be entitled.
