NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.

D. C. Potter, charged with seven murders, was captured on Monday in the mountains of North Carolina.

MOUNT STERLING, Ky., Dec. 3.

The Elliott Company of regulators, last Saturday, visited Morgan County to "regulate" the inhabitants. They whipped six men, named Cassidy, Perry, Edwards, and three others. They then visited the houses of seven women, five of whom they also whipped.

WILESBARRE, Pa., Dec. 3.

Lawrence Myers, an opulent banker, sued to collect a note given for a gambling debt, by W. L. Pains, a wealthy young resident. Myers swore that he did not know the note was a gambling obligation, and has been arrested for perjury.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 3.

The Treasury learns that hereafter sheep exported from the United States will not be required to be slaughtered at the place of landing in England, the restriction in consequence of the foot and mouth disease having been removed.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.

A large party of colored emigrants from North Carolina reached this city to-day en route to Indiana. About 30 of them were furnished with tickets to carry them to their destination, and the remaining 200 were taken in charge by the Colored Women's Christian Association, and supplied with the necessary.

OGDEN, Utah, Dec. 3.

The *News*, the Mormon Church organ, says: "We do not think the expressions of the President in his message will have the slightest effect towards the solution of the Mormon question or the suppression of polygamy." The *Tribune* says that if the nation permits the polygamist George L. Shannon to sit in Congress undisturbed during the present session, it deserves the contempt of the Mormons.

IRELAND.

LONDON, Dec. 3.

A Dublin special says the distress in the west of Ireland is not denied, but the Government expect to meet the emergency by facilitating the working of the poor laws, and lending money to those towns desirous of starting relief works. The Government do not contemplate starting relief works on their own account. The only remedy for the Irish land troubles which the Government believes practical is emigration. Whether the Government fears insurrection or not, precautions are being taken in various military stations of Ireland against any emergency.

Parnell says that his trip to America is yet doubtful, as he may be more useful in Ireland than America, as he intends pushing the agitation vigorously.

LONDON, Dec. 3.

Charles Stewart Parnell has issued a letter stating that the Sligo prisoners will be at Carrick-on-Shannon on the 11th inst.

THE SOUTH SEA ISLANDS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 3.

Australia advices state that her Majesty's ship "Danae" has returned from Solomon and other South Sea Islands. At Marn Island, where an Englishman was massacred in April last, a company of small armed men landed and destroyed the villages and canoes of the offenders. In the encounter with the natives, one man killed and two wounded. Her Majesty's schooner "Renard" has punished the natives concerned in the massacre of a native teacher last year. Their houses and plantations were destroyed.

Three Europeans and three Chinese, part of the crew of the trading vessel "Pride of Logan," have been murdered by the natives of Cloudy Bay, New Guinea. Her Majesty's schr. "Beagle" has proceeded to the scene of the massacre to punish the offenders.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Dec. 3.

Queen Victoria's illness is only a slight cold.

CANNES, Dec. 3.

The Czarina is confined to her bed, and her physicians are constantly in attendance.

LONDON, Dec. 3.

The *Standard's* Rome despatch announces that Italy has recognized the independence of Roumania by the appointment of an Italian Plenipotentiary at Bucharest.

LONDON, Dec. 3.

The *Standard's* Berlin correspondent says that Prince Gortschakoff is determined not to resign voluntarily.

BERLIN, Dec. 3.

The Emperor William has received a despatch announcing an unsuccessful attempt upon the life of the Czar at Moscow. "An infernal machine was exploded on his passage, but fortunately did not burst until His Majesty had passed."

MOSCOW, Dec. 3.

After the arrival of the Emperor, last night, whilst a second train containing the baggage was on its way hither, an explosion occurred. One luggage van was blown to

pieces and seven carriages thrown off the rails but nobody injured. To-day a deputation proceeded to Kremlin to congratulate His Majesty upon his visit to Moscow.

LONDON, Dec. 3.

The attempt on the life of the Czar has created great consternation and indignation in London, Paris, Berlin and Vienna.

GENEVA, Dec. 3.

A short time ago the Canadian Government placed at the disposal of the Swiss Federal Council \$1,500 to defray the expenses of any experts whom they might recommend to report on the suitability of Canada for Swiss emigrants. Grutli Verein, an important trades union, offer to send a deputation of workmen to Canada. The proposal will probably be referred by the Federal Council to the Canadian Government.

AFRICA.

LONDON, Dec. 3.

News is received at Liverpool that a war has broken out between the rival chiefs in New Calebar, West Africa, and two hundred persons were slain, and wounded and prisoners slain and eaten. Europeans in New Calebar have requested the British naval officer to interfere. It is apprehended that the outbreak will spread from New Calebar to Brass.

Western Notes.

(From the *Summerside Journal*.)

R. T. Holman is loading the topsail schooner Adah E. with white oats for the West Indian market. The Adah E. will take a deck load of sheep.

We learn that the members of "King Hiran" Lodge, F. A. M., assisted by a number of the fraternity in Charlottetown, intend giving a grand entertainment in Ludlow Hall, on the evening of the first day of the New Year.

A REMARKABLE RIDE.—A man by the name of C. C. Gardiner, belonging to Charlottetown, on Saturday, the 22nd inst., rode from Charlottetown to Hunter River on the truck bars of a passenger coach, on the evening train. After the Conductor discovered the fellow at Hunter River, he was obliged to use physical force to rouse him from the dangerous position which he occupied. It is a most remarkable thing how the man escaped being killed, as any person who knows anything about the construction of a car, knows what travelling on a truck bar would be like.

Mr. Narrel, representing the firm of C. L. Brown, of Portsmouth, N. H., has been here since early in November, and purchased a cargo of potatoes to ship to the above port. The schooner "Gibson," by which Mr. Varrel hoped to ship his cargo, was unaccountably delayed, having left Portsmouth sometime in October, with a part cargo of apples, kerosene, and other articles. Last Friday Mr. Varrel received a telegram from Canso, stating that the vessel was seized by the Custom authorities for smuggling. From all we can learn it appears that the captain undertook, without owner's instructions, to sell cargo on his own account, and defraud the revenue by not paying duty on the same. The captain is said to have decamped. On Friday, Mr. Varrel left for Canso, where we trust he may succeed in getting the vessel released, and yet bring her to Summerside to take in the cargo prepared for her.
