Island Role In Nuclear Defense Planning Noted

"The apathy of the public generally across Canada in the matter of Civil Defence" was noted by those attending the recent conference of Canadian Mayors called to discuss this problem, according to a report delivered to the non-target area, by Councillor F. G. O'Neill, who represented Mayor Stewart at the Annapolis, Ontario, meeting. "It was evident," said Councillor O'Neill, "that the urgent task required to be done was to impress upon all the citizens that each one is responsible for his own and his family's survival should attack come."

RECOMMENDATIONS Following are the recommendations proposed at the Annapolis Conference, as outlined by Councillor O'Neill: 1. That this conference has demonstrated the imperative necessity of organizing and training an effective local Civil Defence Organization in every community throughout this nation. 2. That it has dramatically underlined the central fact that modern airpower, weapons, and the continuing crisis in world affairs, have created new dimensions with respect to both the purpose and means of Civil Defence, which as never before, must be directed to human life... and also restore and reinstate local and national survival in the wake of any future attack. GRAVE RESPONSIBILITY For these reasons asserted Councillor O'Neill, this Conference took the following views: 1. That the Municipal Governments of Canada have a grave and direct responsibility for establishing and maintaining a well trained Civil Defence Organization. 2. That while Municipal Government should expect and be willing in the interests of their own citizens to share the local costs of Civil Defence, the major costs of Civil Defence in all its aspects should be the responsibility of the Federal Government. 3. That because the impact of disaster is likely to fall heaviest on the cities and towns of the nation, it is desirable that direct municipal representatives should be appointed to speak for and represent the Municipal Governments of Canada on the Federal Provincial Coordinating Committee for Civil Defence, and that this Committee should meet regularly. NATIONAL PROGRAM NEEDED 4. That because human survival in cities and towns will be highly dependent on quick and orderly evacuation of the civilian population should attack be imminent or in the wake of an attack, it is clear that all levels of government, local provincial and federal must give high priority to the need for removing existing bottlenecks and the construction where necessary of additional traffic arteries. 5. That in view of the immensity of disaster which would be occasioned by a thermo nuclear attack, it is the view of this Conference that all levels of government, federal provincial and municipal give earnest consideration to ways and means whereby there can be brought about a greater decentralization of the urban economy of Canada. 6. That in order to maintain throughout the country a sustained concern and informed interest in Civil Defence particularly by the elected officers of municipal government, it is recommended that an occasional briefing conference on Civil Defence be organized by the Federal Civil Defence Authorities.

Report Says Relations With Russia Took Turn For Worse

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian relations with Russia took a turn for the worse in the wake of Soviet armed intervention in Hungary, says the 1956 report on the external affairs department. The report, published Thursday, says relations between the two countries had been improving gradually since the death of Stalin in 1953 and particularly because of closer contacts following External Affairs Minister Pearson's visit to Russia in 1955. But all that was ended when the Red army put down the Hungarian rebellion. Mr. Pearson said in a foreword to the report: "Through the tragic sufferings of the Hungarian people, the entire free world and, surely, those nations which are somewhat curiously described as 'uncommitted,' must have come to a final realization that the amiable facade of Soviet co-existence conceals the brutal Soviet conception of international relations as a jungle where the strong do what they will and the weak suffer what they must. But the agony of Hungary has been a bitter price to have this evident truth demonstrated again."

Nicholson, former pastor and now of Rexton, N.B., who was introduced by Leith Brown. He delivered an address dealing with the opportunity of the laymen to serve the church and all good causes. Fremont Archer, chairman of the Red Cross Blood Donor Committee for Charlottetown, when he speaks to the students at Prince of Wales College with regard to membership in the "Life Saver" Club. The trophy will again be up for competition between St. Dunstan's University and Prince of Wales College at special clinics to be held for the students on April 29th. When St. Dunstan's won the trophy last December, they had 85 per cent of the eligible students registered as Blood Donors. These students, under the leadership of George Mullyally, will make every effort to retain the trophy by having another all-out response at the April Clinic but it is expected that there will be stiff competition from Prince of Wales College this time. The special clinic, to be held at St. Dunstan's on Monday morning, April 29th, will be the initial one in the series to be conducted in Charlottetown on April 29th and 30th, May 1st and 2nd, with a respective of 1500 donors the most ambitious quota ever attempted in the city.

Shipping Conditions Improve Off Cape Breton Island Coast

HALIFAX (CP)—Adverse shipping conditions off the Cape Breton coast eased somewhat Thursday as four sealing vessels drifted slowly toward open water after being trapped in ice for two weeks. A spokesman for Karl Karison Ltd., Halifax shipping agents, said the sealers Thea, Tem, Curling and Polar Star are drifting towards Cape North on the tip of Cape Breton Island and are expected to reach clear water today. Earlier in the week the D'Iberville and the scalper Theron and Orel, sister ships East, other fur, from ice in the same region. A department of transport spokesman said the icebreaker will return to the area to give further assistance if it was needed. D'Iberville was reported to be taking on bunkers at Sydney after escorting the tanker Elmbranch into port. The Elmbranch ran into trouble while the icebreaker was returning to Sydney for fuel prior to making another attempt to free the four sealers. The freighter Federal Explorer, docked at Louisbourg, N.S. on the Eastern Cape Breton shore, plans to take advantage of the break in the ice to haul 2,300 tons of coal to St. John's, Nfld. Officials at Louisbourg figure the winter boom is over. Coal ships have been using the port for several months because North Sydney harbor has been blocked. Sydney harbor carrier St. Address is due in North Sydney shortly, after making repeated attempts to break through the ice barrier. The Fort Avalon was scheduled to sail from Corner Brook, Nfld., with 2,200 tons of newsprint for Philadelphia. The Margaret Bowater is waiting for ice to clear to enter Corner Brook to pick up a load of newsprint. She stopped during the weekend at the edge of the ice field.

Find Woodcock Killed Child While Insane

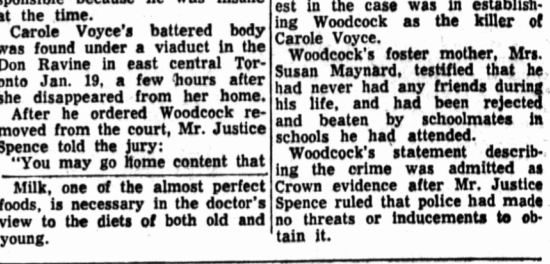
