The Eve Before The Battle.

MONTREAL, March 4.—Both parties appear ready and anxious for the fray. The result no one can foretell, but it seems probable whichever side wins their majority will be small.

The Conservatives estimate that they will have a majority of 56. The Liberals are elated over a local election Tuesday in North Bruce, Ontario. A minority of 27 in last election has been converted into a majority of 300.

It is announced to-day that the Government have promised C. P. R. the following commission:—A abandonment of a claim of one million dollars on the Northshore Railway, continuation of Government guarantee on C. P. R. stock which expires in 1893, and a settlement of the Oronook claim, \$5,000,000 in British Columbia.

Canadian Horses in England.

MONTREAL, March 4.—As evidence of the favor with which Canadian horses have been received in Great Britain just announced, a company has been organized in London for the purpose of importing Canadian horses. Capital placed at half a million dollars, and expects good profits to be realized.

The "Stanley" will resume on her route until the 1st May in each year, and will continue longer than that date if the Company's boats are not able to keep up daily communication with the Island.
