

Track Meet At Dundas

The Dundas Plowing match is in full swing and we visit at the scene of the fair yesterday afternoon to witness the men's open track and field competitions.

The meet was held under very trying weather conditions with light rain falling throughout the afternoon. Despite a small entry list officials in charge of the meet have acknowledged the meet as a big success.

This was the first year that the track events were held on a track. Officials of the annual fair constructed a quarter mile track previous to the meet, while in previous years the running events were staged in a field.

We think the construction of a new track was definitely a step in the right direction and with some added polish this meet could very well attract the Island's top track and field performers.

The new track could stand some work on the surface as there were several holes in the surface yesterday and officials could also obtain some type of white marker to line off the track with finish lines and lanes for the competitors.

Heather MacLean, Rhoda MacLeod and Francis Whitlock, all from the capital city, made a clean sweep in the female events. Heather led the way in the running events while Miss MacLeod was practically untouchable in the standing and running broad jumps.

In the men's division the Conahan brothers (Billy and Wally) from Montague were the dominating figures, with Charlottetown's Frank Ross coming in for his share of the awards in the events in which he took part.

The Conahan boys took part in every event on the program. The meet was very capably handled by Alan Andrews and George MacMillan. Andrews took care of the starters duties while MacMillan handled the finish line.

Also on the sports scene, but separate from the track and field action St. Peter's Bay defeated Souris Line Road in a tug-of-war to advance against Red Point lightweights in the final which will be pulled today.

Track and field action resumes at Dundas today with the junior performers holding the spotlight.

Can. Horse Meadow Court Gets Upset At St. Leger

By RON HOWARD DONCASTER, England (CP) Provoke, a 28-1 shot, scored one of the century's biggest upsets Wednesday by defeating Bing Crosby, said in an interview his horse ran well considering the condition of the rain-soaked Yorkshire course but there were no excuses.

The winner, owned by British publisher J. J. Astor, pulled away from Irish-bred Meadow Court with about 2 1/2 furlongs remaining in the race over one mile, six furlongs and 132 yards. At the wire, Provoke was 10 lengths in front and still gaining ground on the 11-to-4 favorite. No time for the winner was announced.

U.S.-owned Solstice was third. The victory earned Provoke £42,431 (\$127,293).

Max Bell, Calgary publisher and joint owner of Meadow Court with Vancouver industrialist Frank McMahon and singer Bing Crosby, said in an interview his horse ran well considering the condition of the rain-soaked Yorkshire course but there were no excuses.

"I was told by the course manager that the track hasn't been this bad on St. Leger day for 39 years," Bell said. "The horses were sinking into the turf up to their fetlocks."

McMahon said Meadow Court's showing would have no effect on plans to enter the colt in the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe in Paris Oct. 3 where he is expected to renew his rivalry with Sea Bird II, the classy French speedster that beat him by two lengths in the Epsom Derby.

Meadow Court's owners shared £4,815 (\$14,445) for second place while Charles Engelhard of New York City picked up £2,487 (\$7,461) for Solstice's third, five lengths back of Meadow Court.

Trainer Paddy Prendergast echoed McMahon's and Bell's sentiments, saying that while Provoke revealed in the going, Meadow Court just did not seem to like the ground.

Bret Hanover Equals Record But Loses Race

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP)—Adios Vic won two of three heats and captured the three-year-old Horseman Futurity Pace Tuesday despite a world record-equaling performance by Bret Hanover.

Bret Hanover, driven by Frank Ervin, matched the world record for the mile of 1:55 in his first heat victory at the Indiana state fairgrounds, but Adios Vic swept the next two.

Trotting Record Equaled At S' side Racing Oval

SUMMERSIDE — Two trotters threw a scare into the 23-year-old track trotting record of 2:08 here last night, both taking new lifetime marks in doing so.

In the fifth dash of the night Singalong, a 6-year-old owned by C. O. Smith of Kinkora and trained by Basil Whelan, equalled the mark set in 1942 by Watchin and later equalled by Squire Hanover.

In accomplishing this feat, the trotter lowered his lifetime mark by 4.2 seconds. He was chased all the way to the wire by Little Art who was beaten by a whisker.

In the first dash of this event Little Art, a 6-year-old bay gelding driven by Alyre Pineau and owned by G. Semple of Kensington, did the twice around the oval in 2:08.3 with Singalong a close second. This was also a new mark for Little Art.

The fastest mile of the night was stepped by Mountain Marie, a roan mare owned by George Power of Miscouche, in 2:07.3.
