It is said that there is £150,000 behind Searle. Not half that amount will be taken at the present odds as the Americans and Canadians who are backing O'Connor have nothing like as much money. SHEEP AND LAMBS.—The Pioneer says: As many as 1,280 sheep and lambs were taken away by the steamer last week, the value being \$2,668. Of these 210 were shipped by Messrs. Avard and Drummond for Watertown, Mass., on Thursday, and 240 by Mr. John O'Brien for St. John, on Saturday, the shippers' names of the remainder we did not ascertain. BIG GUN COMPETITION.—The Garrison Artillery competition began at Quebec to-day. The Island team will leave to-morrow morning. Lt.-Col. F. S. Moore will be in command. The team is made up as follows: Captains H. M. Davison and Brennan; Lieutenants E. D. Sterns; Sergeants Thomas Dover, A. Alley, Offer and Connolly; Corporals R. Macdonald, C. Murray, Quigley and J. F. Wheat; Bomb. Brebant; Gunners John Gillis, Geo. Scantlebury, Wm. Hearst, John Proud, A. McAree, A. McLeod, R. Bear, D. Cameron, D. McLaren, J. Lane, H. R. Ramsay and Chandler. The team has been practising hard for some time past, and feel confident that they will give a good account of themselves. METHODIST CHURCH.—A large congregation in the Prince Street Methodist Church last evening had the pleasure of listening to the Rev. Wm. Ryan, of the conference of Nova Scotia. The sermon was full of the best thought and was delivered with characteristic earnestness and power. The rev. gentleman has been stationed on this Island, in the United States and Bermuda and has visited the Australia and the Fiji Islands. He stated that it was twenty years since he last stood in that pulpit, and commenced the service by announcing the appropriate hymn, "And are we yet alive, and see each other's face." The organ was played by Mr. Hearst, of Boston, and the choir, rolling out the voices of the congregation, called up memories of other days, and reminded one of the invocation of the Psalms, "Let the people praise thee O Lord, God of the people praise thee."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. The Wanderers' Sports. HALIFAX, Sept. 8. Notwithstanding the beautiful weather on Saturday afternoon, not more than 500 people turned out to witness the Wanderers' annual games. In the 100 yards dash, Brady finished first, time 10 1/2 seconds, knocking the local record to pieces. The one mile run had but two competitors, W. W. Walsh, scratch, and H. W. Mackintosh, 30 yards handicap. On the last quarter Walsh stopped, and Mackintosh finished as he pleased, in 4 minutes and 48 seconds. In the 220 yard dash, Brady finished first, in 23 1/2 seconds; Bauld second, and Bowen third. George Tracey attempted to break the Canadian amateur record for the half-mile run. He covered the distance in 2 minutes and 1/2 seconds, a second behind the record he was running against. More Annexation. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 8. Advice from Honolulu by s.s. Austra-Asian state that the British man-of-war Espergle returned there Aug. 28, after an absence of a month. She visited Humphrey's Island and Vernon Island, and annexed them to the British Dominion. The islands are 20 miles apart, and supposed to be on the route of one of the projected Trans-Pacific cables. While at Humphrey's Islands the Espergle took on board twenty men of the British ship Garston, from Sydney to San Francisco, which was wrecked near Starbuck Islands on July 17th. The ship was abandoned. One boat, containing Capt. Pye and eight of the crew, was lost sight of and has not been seen since.
