Pro-Western Premier Of Thailand Dies At 55

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP)—Premier Sarit Thanat, one of the closest friends of the West in southeast Asia, died Sunday. His government immediately was turned over on an interim basis to an equally staunch supporter of the West, Thanom Kittikachorn, deputy premier and defence minister.

A medical bulletin said the 55-year-old premier died of kidney and heart complications following aggravation of an old liver disorder. Only hours before his death, Sarit's American

had seemed to be responding to treatment. But there was a sudden change and Sarit died in his wife's arms at a Bangkok hospital late in the afternoon. He was under the care of a team of American army doctors, headed by Lt. Gen. Leonard Heaton, U.S. Army surgeon-general, who flew here after Sarit's liver condition took a bad turn Nov. 28. Sarit had been under treatment at his residence since Nov. 11.

Heaton had treated Sarit extensively in the United States. Sarit, an army man since the age of 20, had been in the government actively since 1947.

In September, 1957, Sarit led a military coup that overthrew the government of Field Marshal Pibul Songgram and drove him into exile in Japan, where he remains today.

Dealers Feel Concern At Spud Price Cutting

Returning from a market survey in Florida, where he visited numerous dealers, Reid Sangster said that considerable concern has been expressed by seed potato dealers in that state over the price cutting tactics by some operators to gain control of the seed market in Florida.

"At the beginning of the seed export season," Mr. Sangster said, "a reasonable price was agreed on by dealers here and in Florida. Soon after the agreement, however, some dealers submitted prices lower than in the agreement."

"This put most Florida dealers at a disadvantage, as other dealers there were able to sell seed potatoes at a lower price. Dealers sticking to the original price, which helps keep the price structure on seed potatoes stable were put in a money-losing position."

Mr. Sangster said the department of agriculture here will watch closely price negotiations

Commenting on his visit to some areas to which Island seed is shipped, Mr. Sangster said "there are good possibilities for further sales of seed, particularly in the Indian town area, where potato acreage has been given over to the growing of sugar cane. In the Homestead area, near Miami, however, 5,000 to 6,000 acres of potatoes are still grown."

Mr. Sangster said that some dealers and farmers plan to be in this province next year when they hope to meet with Island farmers and dealers.

The marketing director said all dealers contacted in Florida agreed that a price range on seed potatoes could be worked out early enough in the year, and agreement reached as to what price should be set, to maintain a price structure through the seed buying season.

WILL CO-OPERATE
"As fantastic as this may seem," he said, "the large percentage of Florida dealers and farmers proved to me that they are keenly interested in a price structure which will give our farmers a decent price. I am certain the Florida people are willing to co-operate in this direction."

"It has to be realized, of course, that we have a narrow range between maximum and minimum prices for seed potatoes, as we are in a competitive position with American seed that can be shipped to Florida. I see no need, however, of pushing this price below a good, sound, sensible minimum."

Survivor Of 3 Shipwrecks Dies In Bed

HALIFAX (CP)—Capt. William Joseph Emberley, 71, survivor of three shipwrecks, died in hospital here Friday.

A native of English Harbor on Fortune Bay, Nfld., Capt. Emberley was the sole survivor when the coast guard schooner Wally G. was battered by high seas near Canso, N.S., Oct. 7, 1943.

For 12 hours he clung to a small piece of wreckage in 25-foot waves before being rescued by a merchant ship. His 17-year-old nephew and two other crew members died.

Capt. Emberley was also a crew member of a freighter wrecked in the Gulf of St. Lawrence in the 1920s and he survived a sinking in 1931.

His wife is the former Sarah Cox of Harbor Breton, Nfld.
