

Local and Other Items.

THE Quebec police have arrested several of the sneak thieves and pettyburglars infesting the city.

THEIR Lordships the Bishops of Charlottetown and Chatham sailed this morning in the "Northern Light."

THE storm warning which should have reached here on Saturday evening, did not arrive until this morning, in consequence of the absence from his post of the Sackville operator.

WE regret to learn that Robert Orr, Esq., of this City, died at Colorado on Saturday last. Mr. Orr was a diligent and successful merchant. He had been in delicate health for some time; and a few weeks ago he went to Colorado, in the hope that change of air would effect an improvement.

FOUND DROWNED IN THE MORELL RIVER.—Our correspondent at Morell reports: "The body of James Mitchell (Indian), who has been missing since Thursday last, was found drowned in the Morell River yesterday afternoon. An inquest will be held on the body to-day."

LOSS OF THE SUSAN.—The brig, "Susan," Capt. Daniel Hogan, coal laden, from North Sydney, C. B., for Harbor Grace, N. F., went ashore (as reported in Monday's Halifax "Herald") at the Barrasois, near the north head of Lingan, in a snow storm on Friday night, 13th inst. She is a total wreck. Crew saved. The above named vessel was 140 tons register, built and hails from P. E. Island, and is owned by Mr. Green, of Harbor Grace, N. F. Cargo, hull, sails, rigging, &c., will be sold at public auction for the benefit of all concerned. The outfit and advances were insured in Halifax for \$750.

The McCarthy Murder.

Another jury has failed to render a decision in the McCarthy murder case—one of the most remarkable cases that ever came up for trial in any country. On this occasion the prisoners had a larger number of the jury in their favor than on the first occasion. The verdict, or rather the failure to find a verdict, fully illustrates the state of public opinion in the matter. It would not be too much to say that there is a popular theory in the case; but the difference of opinion as to the value of the testimony on which the Crown most relied is certainly fully expressed in the attitude of the jury. It is faint praise to say that the case has been ably tried on both sides. It is too bad that the murderers of the man should escape, but better that than that the innocent should suffer. We suppose that the prisoners will eventually all be discharged to await the developments of the future.

THE New York "Herald" reports that there is an increasing feeling in both Houses that the whole sum which may remain after all strictly entitled under the Geneva award are paid shall be returned to Great Britain. The bill referring the claimants to the Court of Claims is meeting with strong opposition, the exculpated cruiser claimants and war premium people opposing it vigorously. If the bill should reach the Senate, an amendment will be offered to remit to Great Britain the unexpended balance. If such action should be adopted, we may look for justice in regard to lobsters cans and New York canals, and then the millennium.—Mail.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

PICTOU, Dec. 22.

The steamship "Northern Light" arrived at 11.30 a. m., and left Pictou for Georgetown at 2 p. m. to day.

OTTAWA, Dec. 21.

The stay of Chief Justice Richards in Europe is likely to be indefinitely prolonged, and, as it has been decided that Justice Taschereau cannot be sworn in until the Chief Justice is present or a substitute appointed. It is improbable that there will be a sitting of the Supreme Court in January. In order to relieve the difficulty, one of the earliest acts of the Government on the assembly of Parliament will be the introduction of a measure permitting the Administration of the oath by the Senior Judge of the court in the absence of the Chief Justice. After Judge Taschereau is sworn in, there will be a special sitting, probably in March.

At the close of the first session of Parliament, Sir John McDonald will, it is rumored, proceed to England in order to be sworn in as a Privy Councillor. On his return, the retirement of Richards will be announced. It is believed that Sir John will be nominated as his successor.

LONDON, Dec. 22.

General Grant contemplates visiting Ireland about Christmas, accompanied by Ministers Welsh and Noyes. The ill health of the Minister to England has delayed the journey somewhat. The General goes to Ireland, as his last jaunt before his departure.

A Vienna special states that twelve Turkish battalions have been ordered to Podgoritza, to prevent the Albanians from resisting the cession of the place to Montenegro.

A correspondent with General Browne reports that the British are on the march from Jellalabad. He repeats the story of the Ameer's flight in a more positive form.

A special cable says that Gen. Browne occupied Jellalabad yesterday.

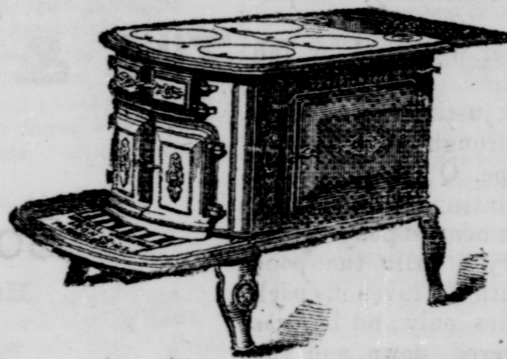
