THE ARTILLERY INSPECTION.

The P. E. I. Battalion of Garrison Artillery, was inspected yesterday at Victoria Park by Lieut. Col. Montzambert, R. C. A., Assistant Inspector of Artillery. The Battalion was drawn up in line and received the inspecting officer with a general salute. It then marched past by the right, changed ranks and marched past on the double, then advanced to review and presented arms. The Battalion presented a most creditable appearance and performed the various evolutions in a manner which certainly attracted careful attention to drill. The companies underwent a close inspection in arms, clothing and accoutrements, which were found in good condition. The twelve men were inspected in general drill and infantry, and acquitted themselves in such a manner as to call forth the hearty approbation of the inspecting officer and the D. A. G., who was present at the inspection. Never since the organization of the battalion did it present such a fine appearance at parade. The band of the battalion was present and under Band Master Worth played beautifully. The band was highly appreciated by all present, among whom were many of the elite of Charlottetown. Capt. Rutherford, of "B" Battery, R. C. A., and Staff-Inspector Bottlinger, of the same corps, who were attached to the camp as instructors, were indefatigable in their exertions to promote the efficiency of the battalion. Lieutenant-Col. Moore and officers are to be congratulated on the efficient state of the corps.

POLICE COURT.

Lester and the Powers Sent Up for Trial.—Other Cases Disposed Of. At the police court yesterday afternoon William Lester, arraigned for procuring ergot for Damaris Watts McEachern with intent to effect abortion, was sent up for trial in the Supreme Court. The witnesses examined were Drs. Morris and Warburton, and Mr. Fred. Davies, druggist. Dr. Morris testified, in addition to his former evidence, that Lester offered to pay him well if he would perform an operation. This forenoon Michael Power, sr., and William Power were again arraigned to answer the charge of assaulting Officers Taylor and Bradley while in the discharge of their duty. The witnesses examined were James Burns, James Callaghan and one of the prisoners, Michael Power. Power said that he did not assault either of the officers, and was quite willing to go with the officers when arrested. His Honor, after some remarks from Power's counsel, ordered that the two Powers be sent up for trial in the Supreme Court, Michael on a charge of assaulting Officer Bradley, and William for assaulting Officer Taylor.

William McCabe, arrested on complaint of William H. Irving, for being drunk and disorderly on Grafton Street east last evening was fined \$30 or 90 days. William was also arraigned on complaint of Elizabeth Ryan for smashing the windows and door of her residence last evening and was fined \$10 and \$2 damages or one month's imprisonment.

Sarah Bell, who lives on Pownal Street, had her son John arrested last evening on a charge of being drunk and acting in a most disorderly manner at her residence. John was sent down to work out an old sentence of a month's imprisonment standing against him for some time. When he is through with that little job, the charge preferred against him today will likely be disposed of.

Three countrymen, for disorderly conduct on the streets, were each fined \$1 or 4 days.

We are asked to state that Mr. John Drake paid the fine imposed upon him in the recent assault case under protest, as he claims the proceedings were irregular.
