TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

A Sensational Story Denied.

HALIFAX, June 2.

This morning a statement was published in the London papers, to the effect that, owing to a recent outrage by the commander of the French warship Ladre upon the helpless fishermen of Bay St. George, the imperial authorities had ordered four ships of the North American Squadron, under Admiral Watson, the West Riding Regiment and two batteries of artillery to proceed immediately to Newfoundland and assist British sovereignty over the whole of that Island. The story is purely sensational. A reporter called upon General Sir John Ross and the Commander-in-Chief said he had never heard of such an order. P. R. Bowers, editor of the St. John's Colonist, who is here en route home, doesn't think there is any need for reinforcements. There will be no conflict between France and England in Newfoundland. He takes occasion to point out the utterly defenceless condition of the Island, and while he hopes that Britain will come to the rescue of her ancient Colony and that she will remain an independent government, partially admits that Confederation is within measurable distance.

The Experimental Farm.

OTTAWA, June 2.

The Central Experimental Farm has sent out this season 12,000 packages of seed grain to applicants from various parts of Canada. The latest addition to the seed department is a sample of Grecian or fifty-day corn, which it is claimed will ripen in fifty days from date of seeding. If the experiment proves successful it will be the popular species in Canada. Prof. Robertson intends visiting the Maritime Provinces next month, and will deliver a series of lectures in the interest of the dairying department.

An Islander Drowned.

PORT HAWKESBURY, C. B., June 2.

Yesterday afternoon a man's body was found in the harbor by two boys and taken ashore, where it was identified as that of Jeffrey McIsaac. He was last fall discharged here from the schr. Lilla Linwood, and provided with a railroad ticket to Gloucester, which was found in his pocket along with a baggage check. The captain thought he had gone home, but it appears he got drunk and fell over the wharf during the night. An inquest was held and he was buried to-day. He is a native of P. E. Island, but his family are now in the States.

Gladstone's Denial.

LONDON, June 2.

Gladstone denies that he ever stated the shooting affair at Mitchelltown, Ireland, and the Siberian outrages were parallel outrages, he says he spoke of them together, but did not desire the inference to be drawn that he regarded the Mitcheltown affair equally as bad as the outrages perpetrated by Russian officials in Siberia.

Royalty in Montreal.

MONTREAL, June 2.

The Royal party arrived to-day and received an enthusiastic welcome. The Duke reviewed the Cadet Corps and fire brigade, viewed a lacross match, drove through the city to the Mountain Park and took part in a private dinner party at Sir George Stephen's.

The Bank of Montreal.

MONTREAL, June 2.

The annual meeting of the Bank of Montreal was held to-day. Ten per cent. dividend was paid, equal to \$1,200,000 during the year. On account of the prospects of the coming year stock dropped three points since the meeting.

The Crop Outlook.

WINNIPEG, June 2.

Figures carefully compiled and fairly accurate, place the acreage under crop in Manitoba and the Northwest, at 1,230,000, of which 870,000 acres are wheat, and 360,000 oats and other grain. The crops are looking magnificent.
