RESTORE SHIP TO RUN

### KEEP IN TRIM

#### Suggestions Given For Hip-Slimming Problems

Whip out the tape and measure your hips—circling tape around the biggest area. In figure fixing, symmetry is the aim, and the hip measure should not exceed the bust measurement by more than two inches, three at the most.

Next, a leg swinging exercise that is simple yet amazingly effective. Position: Standing erect, hold on to chair back for support. Movement: Swing leg forward, then back, bringing it as high up in back as possible. Bend forward from the waist as leg swings to the rear. The aim in this exercise is to get the leg up in back to an angle of 45 degrees to tone the muscles of the buttocks. Swing 20 counts with each leg, later more.

Our Mystery Model needs to slim five inches off the hip measurement with her loss of 35 pounds. Her figure problem is not at all uncommon. Many of you complain bitterly that the bulk of your weight is concentrated between the waist and the knees. Diet plus well directed exercise is the answer. A few specific hip slimming exercises taken daily can work sheer magic. Take it away . . .

Position: Sitting on floor, leaning back to bring weight to bear on hip bulge, palms of hands on floor at sides, slightly back. Movement: Keeping legs together, knees straight, raise legs off floor and swing over to the left, rolling along that thighline. Swing legs in an arc toward right side, rolling across hips and over to the other thighline. Keep the roll slow and heavy. Repeat a half dozen times.

Position: Lie on right side, head resting on folded right arm, palm of left hand braced on floor in front of chest, legs stretched straight down. Movement: Leading with the heel, move left leg in large circles. Circle 6 times in one direction, rest, and then 6 times in the other direction. Roll over to left side.
