Lifting Of Rural Life Is Seen Through ARDA

"A general uplifting of rural life from one end of the province to the other" as a result of this province's participation in the federal-provincial ARDA program signed recently, was predicted yesterday by Premier Walter D. Shaw.

Premier Shaw forecast the long range effects of the program would be great. "We anticipate that this will mean a step-up in forestry activity... recreational facilities... adult education... (and) opportunities for employment in the province."

Under the ARDA plan the Island has received \$1,450,000 from the federal government. This total is matched dollar for dollar by the provincial government.

The ARDA funds will be used for improvement of marginal lands, for alternate land use, water resources projects, or what is called "rural community development." The premier said in a prepared statement to the press.

The premier explained that while many of the projects will concern alternate use of marginal land, primary emphasis will be placed here on supporting local groups to encourage them to develop their communities to the highest possible peak.

BACKED FULLY

He said these groups would be backed fully — financially, morally and technically — by the two governments.

"We think this will go a long way toward the improvement of the entire economy of the province."

The premier said his office is awaiting Ottawa approval on a number of projects already conceived and approved by local groups. "We have every reason to believe that in the immediate future some of these will be underway."

"One of the most promising of our projects is in the field of handicrafts where we will be training a large number of people during the coming winter to supplement their incomes by making handicrafts."

Fund Drive Is Planned For Hospital

MONTAGUE — At a recent meeting held in the Nurses Residence, which included both the trustee board and advisory committee members of the Kings County Memorial Hospital, Montague, it was decided to have a campaign for funds this fall in aid of the hospital.

This campaign is made necessary in order that the hospital can pay for capital costs expenditures and purchase of new equipment as the cost of these items is not assumed by the P.E.I. Hospital Service Commission.

The campaign will also assist in starting a reserve fund for hospital construction which will soon have to be undertaken. The canvass will start Nov. 15 and close Nov. 30, and will have as its objective \$50,000.

Vandalism And Thefts Investigated At Souris

SOURIS — The Souris detachment, RCMP, is investigating two cases of theft and one of vandalism. One of the thefts and the vandalism occurred sometime Thursday night, and the other theft Thursday forenoon.

The theft of Thursday night took place at the salt fish plant operated on Souris wharf by the Eastern Packing Company and involved the loss of approximately \$150 worth of salt fish.

The contents of the purse were found dumped on a table and a small amount of money taken.

NET DAMAGED

The vandalism took place on the dragger Fan and Joanne on board which the drag nets were attached with a knife and the nylon cod end, the portion of the net into which the fish are finally swept, was cut off and thrown overboard.

The fish was apparently transported to the main door, taking about two or three trips with a handcart, and as far as can be determined at the door it was loaded into either a truck or car.

The salt cod was owned by Eastpack, the salt hake by Wilfred Peters and the hake fillets by John Grant.

The other theft took place at the home of Adolphus Cheverie, Bloomfield Street, in broad daylight.

Mr. Cheverie had apparently gone uptown and when leaving his home had left one door unlocked. The intruder is thought to have walked into the house and taken two packages of cigarettes from the kitchen table and in the living room found the purse of Mrs. Theresa Wright, daughter of Mr. Cheverie.

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Damage to the net, which is repairable, is estimated at about \$100.

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Rev. Clarence Murphy, curate, addressed the meeting and urged the people to support the credit institution they own and control.

Master of ceremonies for the celebration program was Norbert Fraser, president of the local credit union. The ladies of the CWL were in charge of the banquet.

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MCA Reduces Sun. Flights

Maritime Central Airways will reduce Sunday flights from two to one, starting Oct. 28, a spokesman for the airlines said yesterday.

Leaving the Charlottetown airport at 4:55 p. m., the aircraft will land at 5:40 in Moncton, where it connects with TCA flights to Montreal and Toronto.

The flight does not connect with planes, trains, or buses to Saint-John or Boston, however. The last Boston flight leaves Moncton at 4:25 p. m. on Sundays.

Change in flight times are made to tie in with TCA schedules, the spokesman said. Ordinarily, there is only one Sunday flight from Charlottetown, but this was increased to two, at 11 a. m. and 3:15 p. m., to accommodate tourist traffic during the summer months.

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Vernon River Credit Union Honors Charter Members

VERNON RIVER—Over 100 members of the Vernon River Credit Union observed the silver jubilee of their organization with a banquet and presentation of certificates of merit to seven of the original 25 charter members.

Banquet speaker was Urban LeBlanc, of the extension dept., St. Dunstan's University, who was introduced by Peter Curran, local school teacher. Mr. LeBlanc spoke on the "Challenge Facing Credit Unions in the Next 25 years."

Commenting on the future development of credit unionism in this province, Mr. LeBlanc predicted four geographical areas of credit union development and expansion. These he noted to be Charlottetown, Summerside and Summerside RCAF Station; Tignish and Souris. These would be the four major areas of credit union influence, he said.

There would be as few as 15 credit unions strategically located to provide better credit union service to a larger sector of the population.

Greg T. Kelly brought greetings from the P.E.I. Credit Union and showed a film "We Stand on Guard" depicting the service and growth of credit unions during the past 25 years.

On behalf of the people present, Mr. Kelly presented certificates of merit to Augustus Callaghan, Herman Gill, Daniel O'Donnell, James O'Donnell, Clarence Redmond, Edwin Trainor and Louis Trainor. James O'Donnell gave a very concise and complete history of the Vernon River Credit Union which opened its doors for business in 1936.

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
