Following the bonspiel's draw system, half the rinks are drawn for competition for the Chateau Trophy and the other half for the Omega trophy. First-round losers compete for the Francois Jobin Gold Cup.

Quarter-finalists in the Omega, Chateau and Jobin events play for the Lieutenant-Governor's trophy. The rink winning most games in these four competitions is awarded the grand aggregate bowl.

As teams lose successive games they drop to competitions for lesser awards.

The curlers compete for 15 major trophies and awards in the week-long bonspiel and 13 of last year's winners are entered.

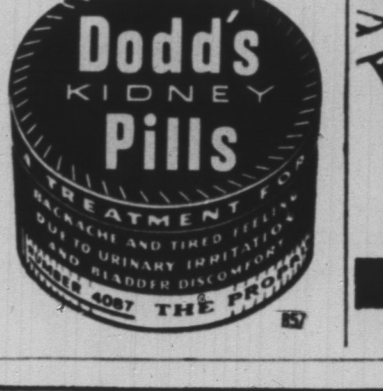

# Howard Gets Pay Hike In '59 Pact With Yanks

NEW YORK (AP)—Eliotson Howard, New York Yankees' catcher-outfielder-first baseman, wore a wide grin Monday. He had signed a contract for a reported \$25,000 salary and won the Babe Ruth Award as the outstanding player of the 1958 world series.

The award actually was voted some time ago, by the New York Baseball Writers, but it was not announced previously. It will be presented to Howard on opening day at Yankee Stadium, April 10.

Howard, who once played in the International League with Toronto Maple Leafs, climaxed his contract negotiations Sunday night at a brief session with club officials. The news was released Monday.

**SIZEABLE INCREASE**

Nobody ever announces actual contract figures. However, it was learned that Howard will get about \$25,000, a sizeable increase from last season.

Howard, 29, on Feb. 23, hit .314 during the regular season. He finished 11 points behind Ted Williams.

The husky righthanded hitter, who now lives in Teaneck, N.J., really got around last season. He caught 67 games, played the outfield in 24 games and "stood on first base" as he puts it, in five games. He also was used seven times as a pinch hitter, appearing in a total of 103 games. He prefers catching.

Howard said he believed he was qualified to do full time duty as a catcher. "But I don't know what the management thinks," he added.

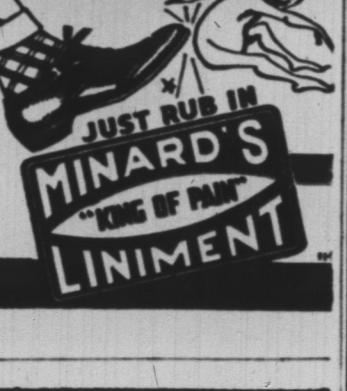

# Supple Receives Fight Offers

MONTREAL (CP)—Pat Supple, Canada's rugged little bantamweight boxing champion, said Monday his handlers are negotiating for fights in the Philippines and South Africa.

The 21-year-old Montrealese said he has received offers to meet Al Ascension in Manila and Grahame Vanderwalt in Johannesburg.

Supple, recently returned from a four-fight tour of the British Isles, has had difficult finding top-calibre opponents in Canada, where there are few fighters in the lower-weight divisions.

Ascension is the world's eighth-ranked bantamweight and Supple said he is particularly interested in a match with the Filipino because a victory would carry international ranking.

Pat's co-managers, Willie Ketchum of New York and Phil Audette of Montreal, are working on the arrangements for the overseas bouts, he said.

Should both fall through, Supple said he would like a shot at the Canadian featherweight crown held by fellow-Montrealese Gerry Simpson. He beat Simpson at Quebec City last year in a non-title go.

"But I'm not too hopeful about getting Gerry back in the ring with me," he said. "He doesn't seem to want to fight me again."

Supple resumed training last week after a brief layoff.

On his overseas tour in the final months of last year, he split four decisions. He outpointed Dai Power of Wales, former European and British Empire flyweight champion, and Eddie O'Connor of Dublin.

His losses were to Peter Keenan of Glasgow in a 15-round Empire title match and Terry Spinks of London, former O'lympic flyweight champion.
