MONDAY

George MacDonald who escaped from the Prince County jail on September 15th was returned to jail at Summerside yesterday by members of the Summerside R. C. M. P. detachment.

Austin Smith who accompanied MacDonald on his jail breaks was originally serving 15 days on a minor charge. He was given six months for his first jail breaking offence, and now having also escaped for the second time is still at large, although police expect that he too will soon, as a result of police co-operation, rejoin MacDonald in Prince County Jail. It is known that he accompanied MacDonald to New Brunswick, and police expressed confidence that he would soon be re-captured.

Two persons walked away from the wreckage of a small private two-seater plane that crashed in a field at Mills Point, a few miles from Summerside on Friday evening.

The plane, CP-DHL, a red Tiger Moth was piloted by Flying Officer Ralph Emery, staff pilot at R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, who was taking Elwin Mill of Mills Point, near Clermont, along on his first plane ride.

Mr. Mill is said to have suffered a nasty cut on the lip, but apart from this, neither man was seriously hurt in the crash, although the plane was badly damaged.

Construction of a new curling rink at Alberton was started last week. It is situated on Main Street between the Hillside Restaurant and the West Prince Dry Cleaning Plant, and by the weekend the cement work for the club room basement and the two sheets of ice was completed. The club room is to be two stories with a large basement, size 40 x 20 and the total length of the building is 170 feet. A special insulated roof will be built by the County Construction Co. of Summerside. The work is being done by local carpenters with Mr. Hunter Weeks in charge. It is expected to have the rink completed in plenty of time for the season's curling activities.

Barry Carr, eight-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Roland Carr, 161 Water Street, received injuries from an explosion on the City dump on Saturday morning which necessitated 21 stitches in his forehead.

The boy, accompanied by his father, after walking around the shore in the vicinity of the old shooting range, stopped to talk to an attendant at the dump. A number of fires were smouldering and the father cautioned the boy not to go near them. The boy was standing about 10 feet from one such fire when the explosion occurred which ripped two long gashes in his forehead, one slightly above the eyes, the other at the hairline.

TUESDAY

Mr. Alexander Lingard, secretary of the L.U.A.C. was the guest speaker at a special meeting of the P. E. Island branch of the Association at a luncheon meeting held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday at 1 p.m., over which Mr. Roy MacGillivray, president of the branch presided.

In his address Mr. Lingard dealt with the development of life insurance and the success of its salesmen in assisting the public in determining the type and value of insurance best suited to their circumstances and prospects.

It was learned yesterday that the Provincial Government is not interested in purchasing the old post office building in Summerside on which the Government had priority rights to buy. The Town of Summerside would thus become next on the priority list and in the event that the council decides not to purchase the building it can then be sold to a private party or parties.

Up to the present, the Town of Summerside has not reached a decision on the matter although it is understood that the council will meet this week to decide if the building shall be purchased for the Town of Summerside.

Following a special meeting of the Summerside Town Council held last week at which the Water and Sewerage Commissioners were authorized to spend up to \$18,000 to install a water and sewerage lines in the east end of the town, the commission announced yesterday that a contract had been awarded to Morrison and MacRae for this work. Amount of the contract is \$16,917.90.

Two lines will be laid, one in the vicinity of the Hall Manufacturing Co. Ltd. property leading into the harbor, to service homes on Water Street East, as far as the Eastern Brook and the other connecting Ottawa Street with Harvard, east of the electric plant.

Mr. David L. Mathieson, one of the most prominent attorneys of the city, is leaving here this week to take a post with a pipe line company in Edmonton, Alberta. Mr. Mathieson will be the senior solicitor for the oil concern.

A native of Georgetown, where he was born in 1903, he is a son of the late Chief Justice and Mrs. A. J. Mathieson.

Mr. Philip MacKinnon, B.Sc. (Agr.), son of Mr. John S. MacKinnon of Grand River and of the late Mrs. MacKinnon, left recently for the University of Wisconsin where he is to take up post-graduate studies in plant pathology under the famous Dr. Larson, an expert in that field. Mr. MacKinnon was recently awarded a three-year scholarship by the Dominion Laboratory of Plant Pathology in Fredericton which enables him to continue his studies.

The navy tug "Glenside" is scheduled to take the minesweeper "Westmount" in tow from the Bruce Stewart Co. wharf today to go on the slip at Pictou where underwater fittings will be overhauled. The "Westmount", along with a sister ship the "Malpeque" has been undergoing a thorough overhauling here for almost a year, although a major portion of the work has been done on the "Malpeque". Present arrangements with the return of the "Westmount" in about three weeks, when the interior alterations will engage the attention of a working unit of approximately 150 men during the winter months.

Mr. Harold Behm, of Kinross, was rushed to the P. E. Island Hospital by Cutcliffe ambulance at 8:15 last evening to be treated for injuries sustained as a result of an accident just east of Pownal on the Montague highway at about 7:30 last evening. Cuts on the face and possibly a broken nose, was the extent of the injuries reported until a more thorough examination is possible.

Mr. Greg Mulholland, chairman of the sponsoring committee of the R. C. A. F. Wing Association, Summerside, has been advised that, as a result of the annual inspection, the Air Cadet Squadron which is sponsored by the local Wing, has again been awarded the Group Captain Lewis Trophy for general proficiency. This squadron took top honors last year and also two years ago, this being the third time it has won the trophy since it was placed in competition. — S.

A sweeping endorsement of the actions and orders of the P. E. I. Potato Marketing Board was registered last night at a public meeting of the P. E. I. Federation of Agriculture held in the Prince of Wales College Auditorium.

It was one of the largest meetings of farmers ever held in this Province as estimates of the attendance ranged over the 1,200 mark. The Auditorium was jammed to the doors with people sitting around the floors and filling the aisles.

The large throng repeatedly applauded the remarks of Mr. D. A. MacDonald, chairman of the Board, when he was called on to answer the questions from the floor.

THURSDAY

Hon. R. H. Winters, Federal Minister of Resources and Development, arrived in the city last night for a brief visit. He stated that there was no particular significance in his call as it was primarily to keep in touch with the people of the Province.

Mr. Winters stated that in the Cabinet he spoke for Prince Edward Island and he wanted to find out just how the people want their business handled.

The opening business meeting of the season for the Camera Club was held Monday evening in the Y.M.C.A. Hobbycraft Room, with president Frank Tinney in the chair.

Vic Pepper, Montague, gave an interesting and informative talk on camera types, their structure and their uses, the first in a series of addresses with various speakers to cover many phases of photography.

Increased interest was shown with the vote of the members to hold meetings twice monthly, the next meeting on the 30th, in place of monthly as at present.

The Centennial Y's Men's Club after hearing a report from Ralph Manning, chairman of the finance committee at their first Fall weekly meeting last night, voted \$500 to the Y.M.C.A. building fund.

Mr. Arthur Duvar, Past Maritime District Governor of Y's Men installed the new president and the executive with due ceremony. Following the routine meeting, entertainment was supplied by Mr. Robin Houston and the Prince of Wales College quartette.

Lieut. Colonel Russell E. Clarke, dean of Salvation Army division commanders in America, was honored recently by Los Angeles civic and business leaders at the Billmore Hotel upon his retirement after forty-five years of service, the last ten as the organization's head in Southern California.

Lieut. Col. Clarke was born at Union Corner, near Summerside, the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Clarke. At the age of four he moved to Charlottetown where his father was engineer on the "S. S. Stanley." After completing his education at West Kent School, he was employed with the Marine Department until the age of 18 when he entered the Staff College of the Salvation Army at Toronto.

Red-headed Wimpy Stevenson, a 200 pound defenseman out of Rosetown, Saskatchewan, yesterday became the second hockey player to sign with the Charlottetown Islanders for the coming night by Club President, Dr. F. C. Dougan.

Stevenson, who was signed by coach Murph Chamberlain, is the property of Buffalo Bisons and played several games with the Bisons last year.

In addition to Stevenson, Chamberlain has reached agreements with at least four other hockey players who are expected to arrive in the City early next week. He would not release names for publication, however, until the players had either been signed or had reached here.

Major Otto W. Campbell, retired director of Old Age Assistance and for many years prominent in military and athletic circles, died at the Prince Edward Island Hospital yesterday morning after an illness of almost three years.

The late Major Campbell was born in Montague in 1897, a son of Captain William Campbell and his wife, the former Mary Jane Jackson.

Hon. R. H. Winters, Federal Minister of Resources and Development, returned to the mainland yesterday to fill a Halifax engagement after inspecting the work done on the Trans-Canada Highway here and conferring with Premier J. Walter Jones and other members of the Provincial cabinet and Liberal party.

Before leaving Charlottetown for Souris yesterday Mr. Winters called upon His Honour Governor Prowse at Government House.

At Souris, accompanied by Mr. T. J. Kichham, M.P. the Minister inspected the railway wharf and watched the processing of fish meal and packing of fresh frozen fish. He also saw the new draggers which are being operated out of Souris and other evidences of business activity.

Former University Naval Training Cadet, John Nash, son of Major and Mrs. F. M. Nash, 33 Upper Prince Street, City, has been promoted to the rank of Acting Sub-Lieutenant in the Royal Canadian Navy, it was learned here last night.

Sub-Lieutenant Nash received his early education at West Kent School and Prince of Wales College. Later he went to Mt. Allison University before going to Sir George William's College, Montreal, where he is completing his final year for his Bachelor of Commerce degree.

A rousing reception was tendered National President Walther Gaudet last evening at the first meeting of the local Kinsmen's Club since the highest honour in the gift of Canadian Kinsmen was extended to Mr. Gaudet recently in Vancouver. The meeting was held at the Charlottetown Hotel and was fully attended.

The newly elected President gave an interesting account of the Vancouver convention which he attended along with other Charlottetown Kinsmen who were also honored by election to high offices. They are Messrs. Stewart Ives, National Secretary, Ian Rankin, National Co-ordinator, Fremont Sinclair, National Registrar, Ivan Sinclair, National Treasurer, Mr. Alfred Cordell was introduced as a new Kinsman.

Four-year-old Brenda Annette Ellis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Milford Ellis, West Cape, is a patient in the Western Hospital, Alberton, suffering from severe burns to her face and body. The burns resulted when a can of sulphur exploded.

Although still in a very critical condition the child was reported making progress last night and it is expected she will make a complete recovery. The sulphur was being used in the fumigation of a hen house. It exploded when, it was reported, some gasoline was being poured from a can. The can of gas caught fire, and was tossed through the door, falling on the little girl.
