KILLED AT SHEDIAC.—An unfortunate fatality occurred at Shediac yesterday afternoon by which Mr. Gregoire M. Boudreau, farmer of Barachois, lost his life. Mr. Boudreau was driving into Shediac from his home with a load of potatoes in barrels, and when almost one mile from town he accidentally dropped his whip which in attempting to recover cost him his life. In attempting to pick up his whip he lost his balance and fell of his seat and the wheels of the heavily loaded wagon passed over him. Death was almost instantaneous. Deceased was a married man, 40 years of age, and leaves a wife and three children.—Moncton Times.

DIED ABROAD.—All who knew him will hear with regret of the death of Mr. C. Perley Welsh, the well-known electrician. Mr. Welsh had been in ill health for about two years, and during the summer was compelled to completely abandon work. Thinking that a change of air might prove beneficial he left in company with his mother about a month ago for the Catskill Mountains, New Hampshire. But last night brought a despatch from his bereaved mother, telling of his death and stating that the remains would leave New York that night for Charlottetown. It is expected they will arrive here tomorrow night. Mr. Welsh was for two or three years manager of the Full Electric Light Company, in which position he gave the fullest satisfaction. At the time of his death Mr. Welsh was in his 23rd year. His early death is deeply regretted. His mother, father and sister have the sympathy of all.

**ENANGELIST IGALE ON WATCHING.**

"Watch ye therefore for in an hour that ye know not the Lord cometh."  
After Mr. Greenwood had sung "I once was away from Jesus," Mr. Gale preached on the text given above. Most people, said he, think that there is plenty of time to decide for Jesus. I have been here two weeks and a great many of you still seem as if you could never die. You are so indifferent to your soul's welfare. God's today and man's tomorrow can never agree.
