One Year Jail Sentence Each Given On Separate Charges

GEORGETOWN — Harry Wilson Moore of Cambridge was sentenced to one year in Kings County Jail on each of two charges, one of forgery and the other of obtaining money under false pretences when he appeared before Kings County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Georgetown yesterday.

Moore, who was represented by William A. Reddin, pleaded guilty to the charges in a previous court. His attorney informed the court that restitution had been made. The sentences will run concurrently.

David Roy Jamieson of Sturgeon, charged with care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired and represented by William A. Reddin was fined \$100 and costs on the charge. The accused was not present in court and the crown's application to proceed in his absence was granted. Three crown witnesses were heard.

James Stephen Murray, also of Sturgeon had a charge of driving while impaired dismissed. His attorney informed Lester P. O'Donnell.
