An Improved Patent Fishway.

The Amherst Gazette thus describes a new fishway, the invention of W. H. Rogers, Esq., Inspector of Fisheries for Nova Scotia:—

Mr. Rogers' fishway starts at the bed of the river, right under the dam, and in a dam ten feet high extends up the pond 80 feet, with a slope or rise of one foot in ten, or until the bottom comes within two or two and a half of the surface, when the pond is full. This slope or floor is five feet wide, then the sides extend above the highest freshet, so that no water can get into it except at the upper end, which is 14 inches wide by three feet high.

The peculiar form of the brakes or buckets on the inside causes the water to pass down in a clear, unbroken stream at the rate of not over one and a half to two miles per hour while they supply a full pool of water at about every six feet, where two or three barrels of fish may rest or play as they please.
