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Castro Faces Grim Fight to Preserve Red Regime

Fidel Castro appears to be in the middle of a grim struggle to keep his Communist regime from breaking into two hostile factions.

His crisis revolves about the role of old-guard Communists in Cuba before 1959. Castro, badly in need of Soviet economic and military aid, is looking for a power, can hardly afford an explosive purge—but a showdown may be on.

The Cuban premier has improved the two factions in a situation in which his revolution—like so many Communist revolutions before it—would "devour its own children."

The crisis was touched off by disclosures in the trial of a Communist accused of helping Fulbright to his own children.

NEW JOINS OLD
After Batista fled, Castro's "new Communists" joined with the old-guard Communist Party.

let them dominate the Cuban labor movement in return for military aid. Castro's military pressures against his regime.

Frictions between the "new" and old Communist became evident even in 1959, and were clearly visible by 1963, when Castro denounced Amal Escalante and relieved this old-guard Communist of his job.

The new charter concerns a "new Communist" named Marcos Rodriguez Alfonso, who was a member of the young Communist Party.

He was arrested in 1959, accused of having told Batista police the names of the revolutionary student directorate who attacked the presidential palace in March, 1957.

He was dismissed for lack of evidence. He—as had Escalante after him—went to Czechoslovakia for schooling. He returned in 1962.

Subsequently, Rodriguez Alfonso was re-arrested and sentenced to death this month. By implication, the trial struck at old-guard Communists.
