Baroness Countess' Munificence.

Dinners and Distress in Ottawa.

Special dispatch to Examiner.

LONDON, Feb. 20.

The Duchess of Marlborough denies certain statements that her fund goes exclusively into the hands of the Roman Catholic Clergy for distribution. She says the fund is fairly divided. The London correspondent of the Liverpool "Courier," says "Assurance is given me that the statement of the intention of the Baroness Burdett Countess to donate five hundred thousand pounds to the amelioration of the distress in Ireland is true. Contradictions of this statement have been made in most of the London daily papers; but the fact is incontrovertible. The money will not be given in alms, but will be invested in the purchase of land in the district of Conneemara, County Galway, to be afterwards let to small tenants, at long leases and moderate rents. A committee of Irish gentlemen interested in agriculture is, it is asserted, in the scheme."

OTTAWA, Feb. 20.

The Senate sat for only half-an-hour yesterday.

There were a number of Conservative dinners last night. Messrs. J. H. Pope, Langevin, Plumb, Sir Alex. Campbell and Mr. Mousseau, respectively, entertained their friends. The Citizen says the estimates will be brought down early next week.

A second meeting of unemployed workmen took place to-day. The city members did not attend. One man declared he was living on one meal a day. A committee was appointed to wait upon Messrs. Currier and Tasse, and with them to interview Mr. Langevin, asking for work. The committee meet the city members and will wait upon the Minister tomorrow morning, and will report to another meeting of the workmen in the afternoon.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

DEAR SIR,—Efforts have been made to establish Factories, in this Province, within the past few years. Our Local Parliament has been appealed to for Acts to Incorporate a "Boring and Mining Company," a "Starch Factory," and other enterprises. Those Acts have, like many others, been placed upon our Statutes, there to remain as monuments of the ignorance or incapacity of their promoters. This, however, need not deter practical men, possessing a thorough knowledge of their business, from establishing factories in our midst. The buildings, machinery and property, known as the "Spring Park Brewery," is offered for sale, and can be purchased for less than one half the estimated amount which the promoters of the contemplated "Starch Factory" placed upon it last year. A more desirable property could not be selected for the establishment of a Boot and Shoe Factory. It is estimated that the supply of boots and shoes which our own population of 90, or 100,000 require, amount to at least \$300,000, all of which we pay to Canadian manufacturers. We have all the raw material in hides, sheepskins, calfskins, etc., required to supply a factory of this kind. There is not a city in the Dominion where a Boot and Shoe Factory could be conducted at less expense than at Charlottetown. Here we have cheap labor and all the essential facilities for efficiently and successfully conducting this enterprise. But we lack men of enterprise and public spirit, who are not afraid to invest their capital in manufacturing industries. Hence the cause why we do not realize more fully the direct benefits which flow from our National Tariff. There is no industry that could be more successfully conducted in this Province than the manufacture of boots and shoes, the growing demand for which, even by our own people, would so greatly increase every year as to place such an enterprise, properly managed, beyond the possibility of failure. Would it not then be far better for those who are constantly decrying the National Policy to advocate the necessity and advantages that would accrue to our people from the establishment of local industries, fostered under a protective tariff, rather than continuously whining over imaginary grievances existing only in the imaginations of disappointed politicians.

SIR,—It is remarkable that the mythology of the ancient Greeks teemed with the idea that the son or sons of the highest, such as Hercules, went through many labors and hardships, that they "went about doing good," and that eventually they ascended to Heaven. In this perversion of the great truth of redemption, the great evil spirit has indeed been active and indefatigable; but there are analogies between the heroes and patriarchs of the old Testament and the final fulfilment of all the types in the person and advent of the Redeemer. For instance, Samson, overthrowing the great men of the Philistines, may, at humble distance, remind us of the overthrow of Satan by the sacrifice of our great High Priest. The strange foreshadowing of Christianity and Mahometanism in Isaac and Ishmael, is another analogy. We are too apt to neglect the Old Testament, and still more apt to overlook the books of Apocrypha, which indeed contain great truths and sound wisdom; especially the Book of Ecclesiasticus, chapter 23rd from verse 20 to 23, inclusive, ought to be read and pondered by all fathers of families. If our faith were firm on the New Testament, and our worldly wisdom founded upon the Bible, including the Apocrypha, it would be a blessing to us, beyond all price.

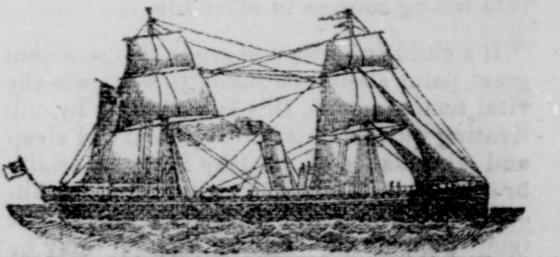
