THE BINDER TWINE RING.

(Montreal Star.)

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has a beautiful theory to account for the rise in the retail price of binder twine in Canada. He says: "The fact that the Philippines were devastated by war, and that probably a great deal of Manila has been reduced to ashes accounts alone for the increase in price." It is not necessary to go so far as the Philippine Islands to find a reason for the advance in the price of binder twine in Canada.

Sir Wilfrid need not go outside of his own house to find the reason.

The advance is due to the fact that the Laurier Government has been fostering a monopoly in the binder twine industry in Canada; the Laurier Government has been selling the whole output of the Kingston Penitentiary to the Premier's friends, H. N. Bate & Sons, of Ottawa, at four and a half cents a pound; and the Laurier Government, having killed most of the Canadian binder twine factories by their tariff tinkering, have placed the farmers of Canada at the mercy of the Bates and their friends.

Sir Wilfrid need not go to the Philippines to ascertain the reason why the farmer has to pay thirteen or fourteen cents for binder twine, while Bate & Son can buy it from the Government at four and a half cents.

The war theory will appeal strongly to everybody who does not know anything at all about the matter, and will not take the trouble to think. The only trouble about the war theory is that the facts do not fit in with it. There has been no such advance in the price of manila (which forms about forty eight per cent. of the raw material), as would account for the manufactured article, binder twine, being doubled in cost. As a matter of fact, the Government paid four cents a pound for its manila and it is estimated that when they sold their finished product to their friends, the Bates, they made a reasonable profit of about a half a cent a pound. Mr. Henderson quoted to the House of Commons from the American trade returns and showed that the prices of manila ran as follows: in 1897, \$3.77 per hundredweight; in 1898, for nine months, the average price was \$2.09; in 1898, the average price \$5.83.

The direct and immediate effect of the abolition of the duty in 1898 was to increase the importation of binder twine from 2,364,840 pounds in 1897 to 8,710,243 pounds in 1898. In other words 5,345,403 pounds of binder twine were made for Canada in the United States that might just as well have been made in Canada. The Government are not perhaps so much to blame for destroying a Canadian manufacturing industry by tariff tinkering because it was part of their avowed programme to destroy Canadian manufacturing industries in that way.

Sir Richard Cartwright can triumphantly point to this as a case where they have fulfilled their pledge. They have lightened the farmer's burden by taking a half a cent a pound off his binder twine that he used to pay to the Dominion Treasury and substituted six or seven cents a pound which he now pays to Messrs. Bate & Son.

A Ruthless Act.

CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—A special despatch to the Chronicle from El Paso, Texas says: News was received from Montezuma, that when General Torres learned, that his nephew had been killed by the Yaquis, he promptly ordered that forty prisoners, who had fallen into his hands during the engagement of three weeks ago, should be put to death and they were accordingly taken out and shot.

Only twenty Indians were killed in the battle, but the official returns gave it, as accounting for the forty prisoners killed in battle.
