

Motorists Urged To Comply With Traffic Regulations

Complete co-operation of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in the Safe Driving Week campaign this week has been promised by Inspector G.A. Woodward, commanding "L" Division here.

In a brief statement he told The Patriot:

"The Royal Canadian Mounted Police are at all times willing and ready to lend their support to any program which has as its objective the prevention of Highway Traffic Accidents and the preservation of human life.

"Safe Driving Week, sponsored by the Canadian Highway Safety Council and endorsed by the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police is indeed a very worthwhile campaign. In co-operation with Mr. J.A. Gallant, Registrar of Motor Vehicles, who has been named Provincial Co-ordinator, we will assist in every way possible to ensure the success of this program.

"To this end, additional attention will be paid by the Royal

Canadian Mounted Police patrols to traffic travelling on our highways during the first week in December to ensure that the provisions of the Highway Traffic Act are being observed. In so doing, our aim is not to institute a great number of prosecutions, in fact, we would be most happy if it were unnecessary for us to prosecute any violating motorist during this Safe Driving Week.

"We would much prefer to have each and every motorist voluntarily comply with our traffic laws as such co-operation would do much to ensure the safety of our motoring public and our pedestrians.

"It is a well established fact that the last six months of any year are the most hazardous in terms of accident, injury and death upon our highways. Safe Driving Week, a program aimed at reducing traffic accidents and fatalities merits the full support of all motorists and of all citizens, whether or not they drive cars."

LOST BICYCLES POSE PROBLEM

During the past few days the city police have been running into a sore problem regarding storage space in which to store lost property.

Deputy Chief Sterna Webster, yesterday revealed that the police now have on hand 15 unclaimed bicycles and two tricycles, all in good working condition.

Should these articles not be claimed by the owners within a reasonable amount of time, he said, the department will be forced to dispose of them either by sale to local dealers or to individuals.

Union Officer Happy Over SIU Apology

The secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Transport and General Workers' Union (CLC) said here yesterday his union was happy that president Hal Banks of the Seafarers International Union had apologized for statements about the Labor Relations Board.

D. N. Secord said in an interview that the SIU "at long last" had published an apology in its publication the Canadian Sailor. Mr. Secord said he hoped the publication containing the SIU apology "is given as wide a distribution as the ones containing the original statement."

He said the integrity of the Labor Relations Board was never questioned by decent Canadians.

Police Court Deals With 12

He said that despite their election successes there is "no room for us Conservatives to lapse into complacency and smugness."

PLATFORM

In his election platform, Carr put himself on record as supporting a greater degree of decentralization of the YPC organization from head office, more representation of YPCs at international youth conferences, greater organization in rural areas, establishment of a periodic newsletter for the YPCs to give members a better understanding of political issues and a review of the YPC constitution.

Carr was born in Wheatley River, in 1929. He was educated in rural schools and Prince of Wales College, he taught in Island schools for three years and was school principal in a district school.

He is now provincial supervisor of the Sun Life Insurance Company, making his home in Charlottetown where he is married

with five children, including twin sons.

His first experience in politics came at the poll level at the age of 15 in the 1945 federal election.

Like his father and grandfather he served in later campaigns as poll chairman at Central By-By.

He played an extremely active part in the 1950 provincial election which saw the Conservatives win power after 23 years in opposition. He is a charter member of the P.E.I. YPC organization and was elected vice president of the 2nd Queen's YPC association in 1948, becoming president later. He has been an executive officer of the national party association since 1954.

In 1958 he was elected president of the provincial YPS.

Auctioneers and telephone attendants working in two shifts hope to keep the bids rolling to the assembly line at concert pitch and "knock down" bids announced in record time.

Slightly more than \$2300 in cash donations has been recorded.

"I am sure we are all proud and happy to be associated in this effort on behalf of crippled children and rehabilitation. It is one of the two major community service activities in which we engage as Rotarians", President Gerry Hartlen said.

(Continued from page 1) another will be given to Health Minister Dr. Hubert MacNeill.

NINE REASONS The petition lists nine reasons why the citizens of Brighton area are opposed to the council's disposal plan.

(1) "Extensive flats are exposed at low tide; (2) "Very small channel with a consequent lack of sufficient flow to take care of sewage disposal; (3) "There is no continuous flow of water in the small channel 1/2 the sea as the river is tidal and the direction of flow in the channel changes with the tide and sewage would thus tend to flow back and forth; (4) "The danger of contaminating the shore waters for the hundreds of swimmers who come from the Spring Park School District and the Upper Queen Street area, ward six and the Brighton area, is most serious. Swimming classes are conducted by the Red Cross and Water Safety in this area also; (5) "Prevailing westerly wind would carry offensive odors over a large residential section;

(6) "The west section of the city is entirely residential; (7) "Charlottetown is a tourist centre. We should preserve our natural advantages; (8) "It would also affect the cottages and properties at Lewis Point, and York Point; (9) "We feel that the amount of sewage drainage into North River at the present time is considerable and that it would be disastrous to add more pollution to this water."

ALL RESIDENTIAL The petition asks that the council reconsider the proposed plan and either treat the sewage before disposal or carry all drainage to the central part of the harbor.

The plan approved by the health department provides sewer drain

age for the area by means of an interceptor pipe and two outfalls emptying into North River.

The interceptor pipe would run along the river between Brighton Road and Kirkwood Drive. A large outfall would empty into 20 feet of water while a smaller outfall with a wire trap would be installed at Kirkwood Drive.

The health department passed approval on the plan but expressed some doubts as to the advisability of dumping raw sewage into a body of water not specifically meant for that purpose.

The department noted at the time it had received some complaints.

Springhill Mining License Requested By Company

HALIFAX (CP)—Coal mining appears certain to return to Springhill, Mines Minister E. A. Manson of Nova Scotia announced Monday.

Springhill Coal Mines Limited, headed by D. Owen Hartigan of Sydney Mines, N.S., has formally applied for a licence to operate a mine with a potential production of 500 tons a day.

"I anticipate that formal approval by the Nova Scotia government will be given... at the next meeting of the provincial cabinet, enabling preparation of the formal agreement," Mr. Manson said at a press conference. The cabinet meets Thursday.

While few men are expected to be employed in initial stages of production, the working force could reach 150-200 men after full development.

MAYOR PLADS The mine announcement answers the pleas of Mayor Ralph Gilroy and the 800 men left without jobs when the 2,000-ton-a-day No. 2 colliery of the Cumberland Railway and Coal Company closed after an upheaval killed 75 men last year.

At the same time, Mr. Manson said he is asking the RCMP to see that illegal or bootleg mines in the coal town are closed "immediately." The minister said Dan Murray, chief inspector of mines, has pointed out the mines endangering the approximately 50 men digging coal illegally in a number of home-made pits. He said that despite warnings and orders from the mines department the pits continue to operate.

"We are about to ask the

RCMP to discontinue the operations. If the miners do not comply, we will have no alternative but to move bulldozers in to close them."

Asked if his department planned to prosecute illegal operators, Mr. Manson said: "We're not looking for prosecutions. We don't want to put any body in jail. We just want to save their lives."

"WONDERFUL LIFT" Mayor Gilroy, who lost his job as a security officer Monday after Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation announced it was finishing its last work in the town, said the announcement of the new mine is "a wonderful lift to the economy of Springhill."

Springhill Coal Mines will be forbidden to go below 4,000 feet straight down. The No. 2 colliery was about 4,300 feet deep.

But, Mr. Murray said, the "pitch levels off at about 500 feet" in the seam to be developed and slopes only at about 10 degrees which would keep the miners relatively close to the surface.

The company will tap No. 3 seam which Mr. Manson said has never been fully exploited before. Tests after the 1953 disaster to determine the quantity and quality of coal in the Springhill field found 2,000,000 tons on seams 6 and 7.

"We did not complete the entire exploration of No. 3 because we found an outcrop. We found 5,000,000 tons of coal..." Mr. Manson said. In some places the seam is 6 1/2 feet thick.

PROVIDE LOAN

The Nova Scotia government is prepared to assist the company with a \$500,000 loan. Initial costs in bringing the mine into preliminary production are expected to be \$20,000. The company will provide its own working capital. "Early development work will start as soon as an agreement is drawn up and the equipment procured," Mr. Manson said. Until the company proves it is an "operating entity," work will proceed on "a continuing permit." If things work out as expected, a lease will be offered. Markets are expected to be found in southeastern New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.
