### Women Should Overcome 'Woman Driver' Reputation

NEW YORK (UPI) — It's high time the women with a low opinion of her driving ability shifted gears. After all, operating a car is no more complicated than running a washing machine.

The view that women should shed their inferiority complex as drivers comes from a woman who's won several dozen trophies at racing sports cars, has motored over most of the northern hemisphere and Europe, and now serves as a consultant to a petroleum products company.

"A woman who lacks confidence in her driving may actually be incompetent," said Denise McCullough. "But she mustn't get trapped into thinking that she can never become competent. After all, a modern car has no more complicated controls than a modern range or washing machine. But knowing these appliances are clearly elements of a woman's domain, she knows she can master them, and she does. She should come to feel the same way about a car."

**LOSE LABEL**  
Actually, Miss McCullough holds that it's time to stop the "woman driver" label and its derivative connotation. For today, every third driver on the road is a woman and the ratio rapidly is moving to 50-50.

Miss McCullough argued that women have some qualities which can make them better drivers than men. The woman is more willing than men to listen and learn. She is more observant in detail — at 25 miles an hour she may see that a suit in the window has been

marked down a third. But that same power of observation also can spot a car door opening into traffic, a ball rolling into the street and little legs — just visible behind the bus — about to dart into traffic.

Miss McCullough spells out her views and advice on driving in a new book, *Are You a 'Woman Driver'?* (Grosssett and Dunlap), sponsored by an oil company. Her premise — "If women are poor drivers, it's because men taught them how to drive."

**POSITIVE PRIDE**  
She believes any good driver, no matter what the sex, is the one who takes a positive pride in handling a car well, has a social conscience behind the wheel, cares enough about driving to develop skills constantly.

Some of her suggestions in a potpourri chapter: The owner's manual is one of the most inexpensive, least read books ever published. Take time to read yours.

To smooth out driving on superhighways, see how long you can go without touching your brakes. Anticipate. Slow down early and learn to use your accelerator for avoiding trouble spots.

If you stop to pick up a passenger on the street, never lean across the passenger's seat to open the door without shifting into park or neutral. Your foot might slip off the brake and hit the accelerator.

The corners of your eyes are more sensitive to light than the center, and a sidelong look at things — particularly at night — can sometimes be more revealing than a direct stare.

**Straight A Students Not Good Cooks**  
TORONTO (CP) — Homemaking is being neglected to the point where a girl who gets straight A's in college may not be able to cook, says Mrs. Phil Carrier, national chairman of a consumer studies for the Consumers Association of Canada.

"It's sad that our costly educational system cannot turn out girls with a practical knowledge of how to market and prepare food," says Mrs. Carrier.

She would like to see children get early practical instruction in homemaking to teach them how to cope with the cost of living.

Both boys and girls would get courses from about nine years of age, compulsory across the board until Grade 12.

Bright students like her daughter, Judith, who was given some spare periods a week in her last year in high school, could easily handle the extra classes, says Mrs. Carrier. "Judith is a scholarship student at Trinity College at the University of Toronto but she has trouble opening a can."

The courses she is talking about would include not only practical knowledge about food buying and preparation, but also about such things as banking, credit buying, budgeting and even the operation of fire and postal departments.

"Even at nine years of age, a boy should be able to fix a toaster plug. Any girl of the same age should be able to make a simple muffin, rearrange furniture attractively and do a simple flower arrangement. Early accomplishment in such fields builds lifelong interest."

### NO ROOM AT THE PARTY

Who will remember them this Christmas? Needy Children Of Seoul Are Given Christmas Party

Laughter and squeals of delight come from the USC Social Service Centre. 60 of Seoul's smallest and neediest school children, eagerly devouring hot milk and cookies, enjoy their annual Christmas party. Outside the wind driven snow sweeps through the streets and often only an unheated squatters hut will greet their return. But this is all forgotten while for a few brief hours they are the honoured guests of the Unitarian Service Committee.

With the help of older school children, 60 parcels were specially gift wrapped and, beside each package placed two cardigans, heelless stockings, gloves and underwear, sent especially from Canada, together with a scribbler and pencils bought locally. Nothing here to set a Canadian child's heart on fire, but to little ones who must walk through the bitter winter cold to school in thin and threadbare clothes, for whom paper and pencils are unbelievable luxuries, these gifts are beyond price.

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
