## A Woman Is Appointed To Federal Royal Commission

Mrs. W. R. Walton, jr., the first woman to have been appointed to a federal royal commission arrived in Charlottetown, Tuesday. The following is a short biographical sketch pertaining to Mrs. Walton.

Mrs. W. R. Walton, jr., immediate past president of the Canadian Association of Consumers, is now the chairman of public relations committee C.A.C.

Mrs. Walton is well known for her charitable activities and is one of Canada's outstanding athletes.

She has been on the board of directors of the Canadian Association of Consumers since its inception in 1947, and during the war served in a voluntary capacity as chairman of the speakers' panel of the consumer branch of the wartime prices and trade Board of the women's division of the Toronto victory loan committee and of the war saving stamp committee. She also served on the Toronto citizens' committee for troops in training and was vice-president of the Sports Service League which provided sports equipment and sports entertainment for troops in Canada and overseas.

Mrs. Walton was honorary-treasurer of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, national chapter of Canada, for seven years and is now first vice-president. She was national chairman of the I.O.D.E. committee in charge of raising \$105,000 with which to buy H. M. Queen Mary's carpet for Canada.

Mrs. Walton has been one of Canada's top-ranking tennis players and has been several times Canadian badminton singles champion and holder of the world's amateur badminton singles championship (1947). She is now national vice-president of the Canadian Badminton Association.

In 1947 she was awarded the Rose Bowl as Canada's outstanding woman athlete, and in 1950 was selected as one of the six outstanding women athletes in Canada during the past fifty years.

Mrs. Walton received her B.A. and M.A. degrees in Economics from the University of Saskatchewan. In 1953 she received the Coronation Medal. She is also national vice-president of the Canadian Association for Adult Education.

## Mary Martin Fink Will Adjudicate At Festival

Such a pleasant person is here to judge the dancing classes of the Prince Edward Island Music Festival! She is Mary Martin Fink, a western gal, having been born in Red Deer, Alberta.

Mary Martin Fink has been dancing since she was three years old. She has studied in Edmonton, Calgary, Seattle, Vancouver and Winnipeg. Her most well-known teacher has been Gwenneth Lloyd of the Royal Winnipeg Ballet.

Highland dancing is Mary Martin Fink's hobby but she likes all other types such as tap and ballet. Lionel Hampton, famous American negro band leader in Seattle, is very much interested in highland dancing. During Band Leader Hampton's professional engagement in Vancouver, he discovered Mary Martin Fink and invited her to Seattle to dance with his band as guest artist.

Mary Martin Fink's professional standing quite merited this recognition. She won the California State trophy in San Francisco in 1949 and again in 1950. She was the Pacific coast champion in Highland dancing in 1950 and has won many scholarships.

A talented sister, Loree Martin, competed at the Edinburgh festival in 1954 and won the British amateur open trophy for Overseas competition in highland dancing. The sister was in competition with entrants from all parts of the Commonwealth. This sister also took third place in tap at the Edinburgh Festival.

Mary Martin Fink had the lead last year in the Broadway version of Peter Pan presented in Nova Scotia. It was rather a coincidence that the famous actress on Broadway and the girl in Nova Scotia playing Peter Pan each had the same name — Marv Martin.

In private life Mary Martin Fink is the wife of Lieutenant-Commander Fink of Shearwater, Nova Scotia. Mrs. Fink has three little potential dancers, her young daughters. Their names are Mary Loree age five, Paddy-Jo age four, and Elizabeth age three.

Mrs. Fink is warmly congratulating Prince Edward Island on the great number of its dancing entrants. The larger neighboring province of Nova Scotia does not have a dance festival. This is Mrs. Fink's second visit to this province. She judged at the highland games two years ago.

Mrs. Fink is an attractive young woman five foot three with brown hair and hazel eyes. As one converses with Mrs. Fink one realizes dancing is more than a serious hobby or profession with her. It is most decidedly, along with the commander and the daughters, one of her true true loves!

## Storing Food Properly Pays Off In Nutrition

Recent studies in nutrition reveal that hundreds of thousands of American families fail to eat balanced meals.

To quote one study: "Only six out of ten women have a good understanding of what constitutes a balanced meal; three out of ten have only a vague idea, and one out of ten would not even try to define such a meal."

**BASIC NEED**

The necessity for eating balanced meals regularly, three times a day, has often been emphasized in this column. I shall continue to emphasize it from time to time, for right eating is basic to right living.

One of the greatest nutritional deficiencies revealed by these studies is lack of Vitamin C, which is plentiful in fresh fruits and vegetables.

Many homemakers purchase sufficient quantities, and prepare these foods intelligently, yet lose the vitamin efficiency because the foods are not kept close - wrapped in polyethylene and under refrigeration.

Employees of many large supermarkets, through classes of the United Merchandising Institute, have learned how to package and care for fresh vegetables and fruits to retain nutritional values. After purchasing, this protective care is up to the homemaker. It pays off in good health and nutrition.

**Tomorrow's dinner:** Tomato Bouillon, cheese crackers, fish-vegetable grill, spring turnips, beet-egg salad. Deep-dish strawberry pies, coffee, tea or milk.

All measurements are level; recipes proportioned to serve 4 to 6.

**FISH-VEGETABLE GRILL**

Prepare fish: Add 1 tsp. Worcestershire to ½ c. milk, 1 tsp. salt and ¼ tsp. pepper. In this, dip 6 serving portions of fish fillets, any kind. If frozen, half-thaw. Dust all over with ready pancake mix.

Fix vegetables: Slice 2 large Spanish onions ¼ in. thick. Dust with salt. Brush with soft butter. Fit each slice between 2 matching slices, cut from 4 large potatoes. Dust with salt and dot with butter.

To cook: Line a broiling pan with aluminum foil. Brush with

oil. On this arrange the fish and vegetables.

Broil 15 to 20 min. 4 in. from the source of heat. Turn once with tongs. Brush the fish with melted butter, seasoned with Worcestershire.

Serve bordered with the vegetables.

Deep - dish strawberry pies: Make up ½ recipe American pie pastry. Combine 1 qt. sliced fresh California strawberries, 1-3 c. flour, 1 c. sugar and ¼ c. lemon juice. Divide among 6 (5 oz.) baking dishes or use aluminum foil disposables. Dot each with 1 tsp. butter or margarine.

Roll the pastry ¼ in. thick and top the pies. Trim and flute the edges. Prick the tops. Dust with granulated sugar.

Bake 20-25 min. in a hot oven, degrees F., or until browned.

**TRICK OF THE CHEF**

When preparing beet-egg salad add a little chopped dill pickle.

## Lowell Tech Pair Fired

LOWELL, Mass. (AP) — Dr. Martin J. Lydon, president of Lowell Technological Institute, Saturday announced that Dr. Elias Snitzer of Lowell and David Fine of Henniker, N.H., had been discharged from the faculty.

The decision came after a closed meeting of the trustees Friday. Both men were under suspicion since March 14 when they were called before the House of Representatives committee on un-American activities in Boston.

Snitzer had declined to answer about Communist party membership after 1946. He said he was not now a Communist and added he promised school officials he would not engage in any activity that would reflect on the institute.

Fine invoked the U.S. Constitution's fifth amendment on grounds of possible self-incrimination. He said he was willing to discuss his activities since he moved to New Hampshire five years ago, but refused to tell the committee of any Communist affiliations prior to September, 1953.

## EXPECTS 6,000,000 JOBLESS

WASHINGTON (AP) — George Meany, AFL-CIO president, said Monday he is quite sure unemployment in the United States will go close to 6,000,000 in June unless some miracle happens. Meany gave the estimate to reporters after a closed meeting of the AFL-CIO general board, comprising representatives of AFL-CIO unions. The latest government count was 5,200,000 unemployed in March.

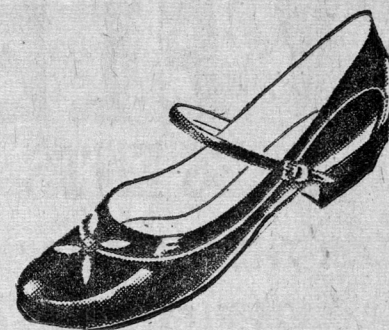
