

Bushirts Battle Bruins To 2-All Deadlock N.Y.

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Bruins overcame their own lethargy and scored two goals to lead the 2-2 National Hockey League tie with the fired up Bruins Wednesday night.

Among other things, the tie: 1. Extended New York's lead over Detroit to four points in their scramble for fourth place and the last playoff spot. 2. Extended Boston's winless string to 15 games, and 3. Stretched New York's home unbeaten streak to eight straight.

The last place Bruins, who haven't won since Jan. 27, struck for two quick goals in the first six minutes of play. Boston's goalie, Gerry Cheevers, made a brilliant save to keep the game developed into a full, evenly paced affair through the middle period before New York mounted its comeback.

Rangers clearly dominated proceedings in the final period and got their first goal on Dean Prentice's power play marked at 2:47.

Young Dave Balon capped the comeback with the equalizer at 14:38, a 35-foot flip to the near side of the net.

Jerry Toppazzini and Murray Oliver scored for Bruins in the first period, each converting his own rebound from the right lacrosse effort.

HAVE BRAWL

The third period, the only one in which the Rangers showed any enthusiasm, was enlivened by a brief brawl between Boston's Charlie Burda and New York's Irv Spencer. They came out swinging after a collision along the boards and each drew a five-minute penalty.

Less than four minutes was left to play when Burda and Spencer left the ice and the two teams finished with four skaters.

Toppazzini got his goal at 9:08, hanging in his own re-

bound after being set up by Leo Boliva.

Oliver's goal, which gave the Bruins a 2-0 lead, came only two seconds after the Bruins' Wayne Connelly had finished an interference penalty.

Maple Leafs Widen Gap In Edging Chihawks 4-2

TORONTO (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs defeated Chicago Black Hawks 4-2 in a bruising, penalty-filled National Hockey League game Wednesday night before a roaring crowd of 14,007. The win sent the second-place Leafs into a clear five-point lead over the third-place Hawks. This was an important game for each club as the 70-game schedule nears its end and it was another setback for the Stanley Cup champion Hawks who haven't beat Leafs on Toronto ice in two years.

The game started out as if it would be a war and referee Frank Udvart clamped down hard on any misbehaving players as he handed out a total of 26 penalties—14 to Toronto, including a 10-minute misconduct to Toronto's Frank Mahovlich in the first period and a rare

throwing of the puck forward infringement to Toronto goalkeeper Johnny Bower in the opening two minutes of the second session.

The Leafs, roaring back after a slump in recent weeks, never were behind. They led 3-1 after the first period and traded single goals with the Hawks in the second 20 minutes. That ended the scoring.

HULL GETS 40TH

Bobby Hull, Red Kelly, Mahovlich and defenceman Tim Horton scored for Toronto while Bobby Hull netted his 40th of the season in the first period and assisted on Chicago's second-period center by Eric Nesterenko.

The teams started out with Toronto leading 1-0 when Udvart called 11 penalties in the first period and a rare

crowd was in a continual uproar as players fought about the puck and laid on the wood and body.

Fairford opened the scoring at 5:47 when he beat goalkeeper Glenn Hall on a close-in drive after picking up the rebound on Bobby Nevin's shot. With Murray Halford serving a high-sticking infraction, Kelly made it 2-0 at 10:31 and less than four minutes later Hull got number 40 of the season when he tipped in a blue-line drive by defenceman Pierre Pilote.
